Enrollment Up In All County Schools

Student enrollment at Clyde CISD this year is up 21 students from last year, according to Clyde school officials after the first week of school.

Clyde CISD Superintendent Tony Reed said first week enrollment at Clyde CISD this year was 1,532, up 21 students from 1,511 during the first week of school in 1993.

Enrollment is up at both Clyde and Hamby Elementary campuses, while student enrollment is down three students at Clyde High School.

Hamby reports an enrollment jump of four students, to 95 the first week of school, Reed said.

With the addition of Clyde Intermediate School, enrollment at Clyde Elementary is actually down from 621 to 536, however the school has one less grade. The same goes for Clyde Junior High, which lost the sixth grade enrollment to Clyde Intermediate.

Supt. Reed reported 107 students enrolled in kindergarten this year at Clyde Elementary, which is high than last year when 87 registered. The increase in kindergarten came about after all-day kindergarten was added at Clyde Elementary.

Reed said as of last Friday, all elementary grades were below the 22 to 1 student to teacher ratio per classroom required by the state. He did say there are several grades which are close to the 22 to 1 ratio at Clyde and Hamby. Reed said kindergarten at Hamby Ele. has 21 students and the Hamby fifth grade has 19 students.

The kindergarten and third grade classes at Clyde Ele. are also nearing the magic 22 to 1 number, Reed said.

The Clyde superintendent went on to say he expects enrollment at Clyde CISD to gradually increase between now and labor day and expects Clyde to have between 1,540 and 1,550 students by labor day.

Enrollment at Eula ISD has increased 47 students from last year, Eula Superintendent Ted Bedwell said Monday.

Bedwell reported 558 students at Eula the first week this year, up 47 students from 511 students last year.

Enrollment at all three campuses at Eula is up from last year, with Eula High School showing the largest jump of 22 students, from 135 last year to 157 this year.

Bedwell added the 157 students in high school this year is well above the Class A enrollment breaking point of 144 students. If enrollment stays above 144 students for the next two years, Eula would move up to Class AA during the next district realignment.

Baird ISD reports enrollment up 12 students, from 491 last year to 503 this year. The Baird superintendent said first day enrollment at Baird this year was the same as the first day of school last year. Cross Plains ISD is up three students,

school officials reported. Cross Plains enrollment this year is 454 students, up three from 451 reported during the first week of school last year.

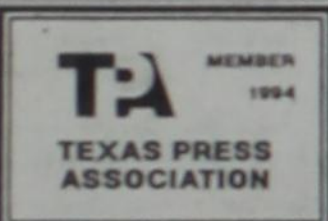

ABILENE—Dr. Albert M. Kincheloe had an official ribbon cutting ceremony at his office at 4102 Buffalo Gap Road, Suite A-1, August 23 at 10 a.m.
A Cross Plains native, Kincheloe attended medical school at North Texas Health Science Center in Fort Worth. After his internship at the Dallas-Fort Worth Medical Center, he opened the Mansfield Family Clinic in Mansfield, specializing in industrial medicine, family practice, diagnostic medicine, minor surgery, pediatrics and osteopathic manipulative therapy.
In 1985, he moved his private practice to Arlington where he dealt with more than 8,000 pre-menstrual syndrome patients and a broad spectrum of gynecological problems, as well as dealing with nutrition.
Kincheloe then opened a rural family practice in Crane in 1992 where he was on staff of Crane Memorial Hospital. He moved to Abilene August 1 and joined the staff of Abilene Regional Medical Center. He is board certified in family practice, advanced cardiac life support and advanced trauma life support.
Kincheloe has more than 5,000 hours of emergency room coverage and has worked as team physician for the Crane sports programs. The nationally-viewed program is live with 1-800 numbers for viewers to call in with medical questions.
He and his wife, Cheryl, have two sons, Chris, 20 and Jim, 18.

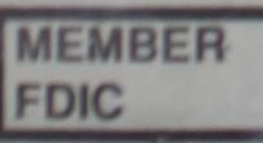

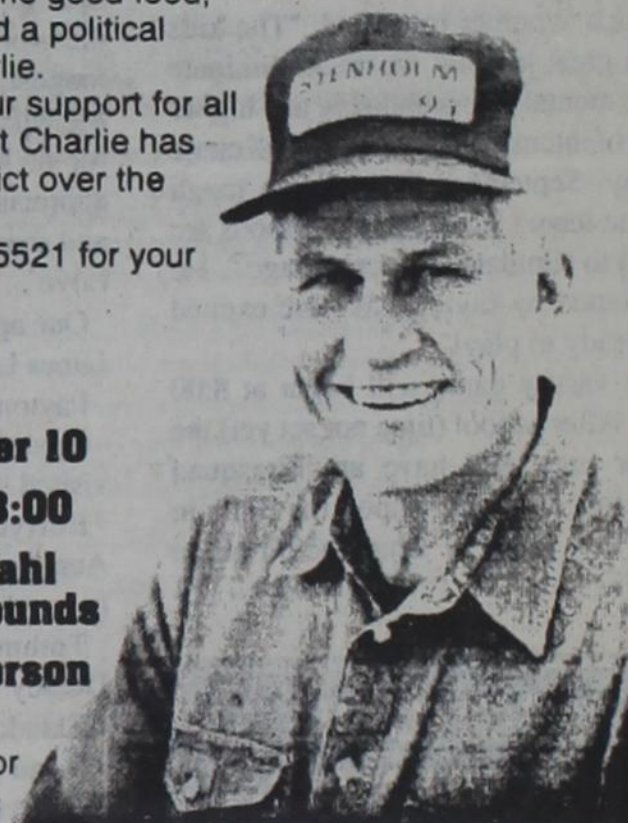

The story is told of two men, one of huge stature, the other was very small. The small man, admiring the physical size of the other, said, "If I were as big as you, I would go bear hunting with a stick — I'd go into the woods and find the biggest bear there, and tear him limb from limb!"

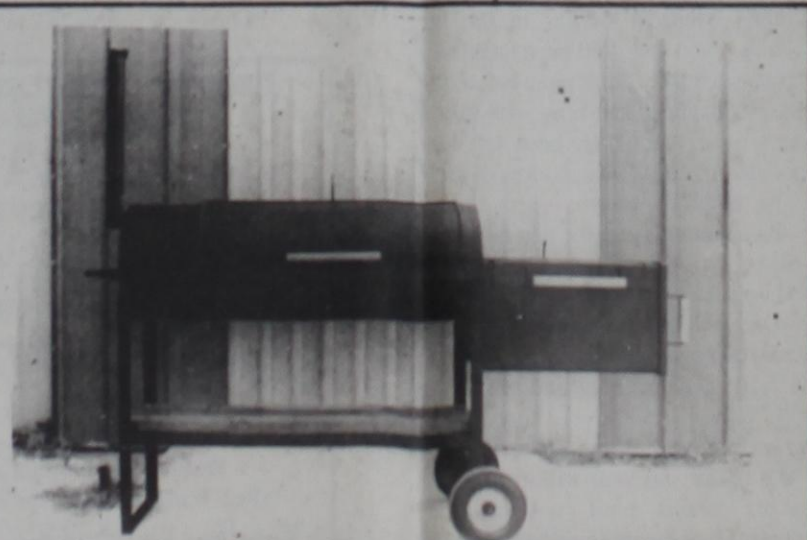

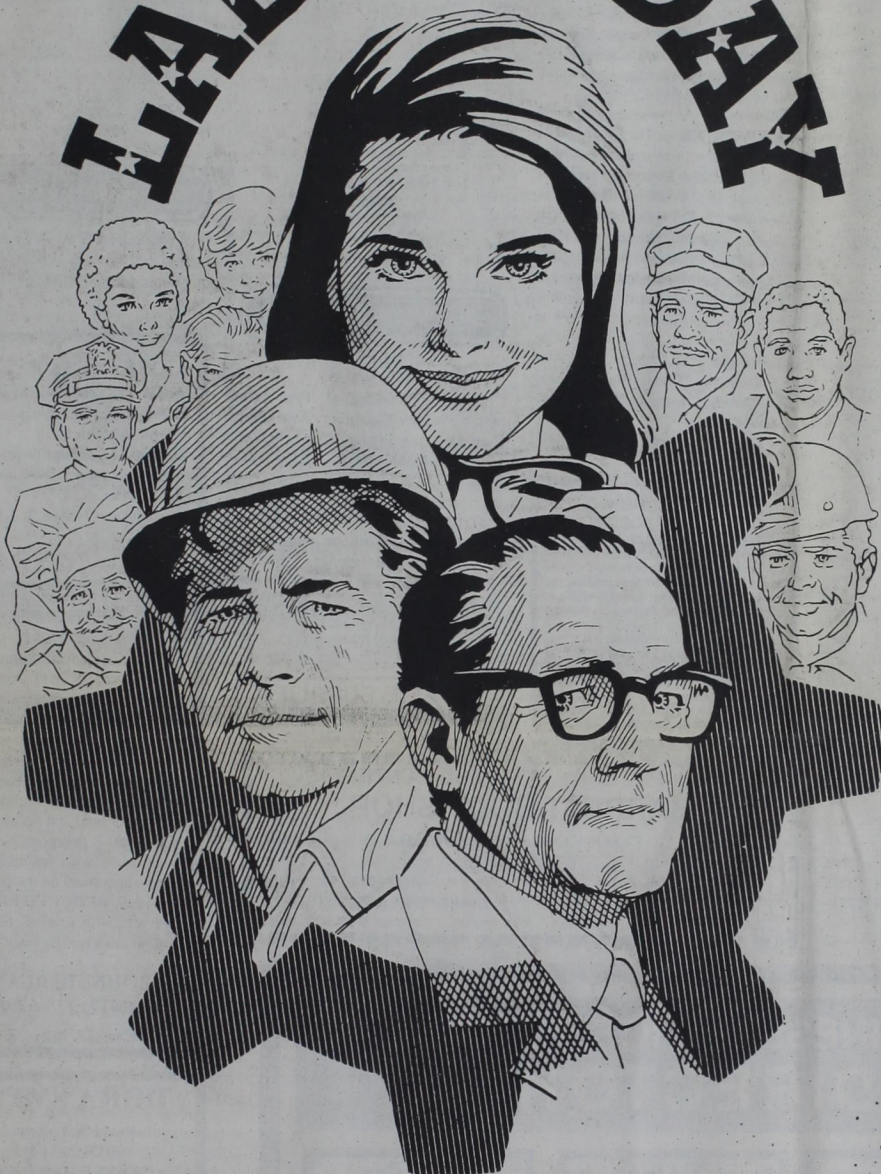

News For Veterans

CSO TRAINING—Your County Veterans Service Office will be closed August 29 & 30 for the statewide annual training conference. Attendance is required of all County Service Officers in order to maintain certification with the Texas Veterans Commission.

HAVEN HOUSE—In November, Haven House of Big Spring will celebrate its third anniversary. The home was donated by Paul and Lona Hood, when they no longer needed it for their parents. Lona Hood was a former employee of the Big Spring VA Medical Center & saw the need for a lodging place for wives of Veterans who were in the hospital. There is no charge for staying at the Haven House although donations are accepted. More than 300 female family members or friends of hospitalized Veterans have stayed there. Many Veterans groups, civic and community groups have supported Haven House with donations of money, food, and other supplies.

Q & A—Q - I understand the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) is required by law to recover costs from health insurers for non-service connected medical care provided to Veterans covered by private insurance policies and plans. Since I don't have medical insurance, will I lose my eligibility to receive VA care? A-No. Whether or not you have insurance does not affect your eligibility for VA care. Neither does it have a bearing on your income level that determines your category of eligibility under the VA means test. VA does not consider insurance as income.

Q-Will my insurance costs go up because VA bills my insurance for my medical care? A-To date, there have been no instances reported of insurers premiums being raised due to claims being filed by the government. Health insurance is intended to cover medical services listed in your policy. The premiums you, your spouse or your employer pay are for those services. Since you are using your policy to allow VA to recover costs, the insurance is being used as intended.

County Farm Businesses Can Apply For SBA Loans


FORT WORTH—Businesses depending on farmers and ranchers in Callahan and Shackelford Counties can now apply for low interest Economic Injury Disaster Loans from the U. S. Small Business Administration (SBA). These loans are available to help businesses meet normal operating expenses that cannot be met due to the effects of a disaster. Drought which occurred from November 1, 1993 through April 15, 1994 caused many farmers and ranchers to experience reduced incomes which may have had an adverse economic effect on businesses depending upon these producers. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible for this loan program but may be eligible for disaster assistance through other Federal agencies. However, nurseries that are victims of drought disasters can apply.

To obtain an application or receive additional information, interested business owners may call the SBA toll-free at 1-800-366-6303 or TDD 817-267-4688 for the hearing impaired. The deadline for filing applications is March 13, 1995.


Due to the drought, many producers experienced crop losses and were not able to purchase goods and services at normal levels. Businesses that are dependent upon these producers may have experienced decreased sales, reduced gross profit margins, increased accounts receivable or difficulty in moving inventories at normal levels. To the extent these problems have caused the business difficulty in meeting its normal obligations, these loans may be of assistance. The loan can help a business meet installments on long-term debt, accounts payable and overhead expenses that would have been met had the disaster not occurred. Refinancing of long-term debt, however, is not eligible under this program.

The loan is designed for those businesses with substantial disaster-related needs and is intended to supplement monies the business owner can provide from other sources.

Loans may be approved for up to \$1,500,000 for actual disaster-related financial needs of the business. Interest rates are four percent (4%) and terms may extend to thirty (30) years, depending upon the repayment ability of the individual applicant. To qualify, businesses must be small by SBA's size standards. Businesses which can meet their financial needs through other sources are not eligible.
