Congressional Candidate Phil Boone Visited Cross Plains Review

Congressional Candidate Phil Boone made a nine-city media trip around the 17th Congressional District Wednesday, August 3, to bring attention to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Department's proposed plan to designate land in 33 Texas counties as "critical habitat" for the golden-checked warbler.

The Fish and Wildlife Department estimates that 16,000 pairs of the songbird, designated as an endangered species, remain in Texas. The bird breeds in the mixed cedar woodlands of Central Texas.

Boone contends that the proposed designation would infringe on private property owners in the designated areas, especially ranchers, who could be prohibited from clearing cedar on their land.

Boone feels that concern for the songbirds takes precedence over the rights of property owners in Bandera, Bell, Bexar, Blanco, Bosque, Burnet, Comal, Coryell, Edwards, Erath, Falls, Gillespie, Hays, Hill, Hood, Johnson, Kendall, Kerr, Kimble, Lampasas, Llano, Mason, McLennan, Medina, Mills, Palo Pinto, Parker, Real, San Saba, Somervell, Travis, Uvalde and Williamson Counties, and the federal government has clearly lost perspective.

Boone said, the golden-checked warbler is just one example of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's growing disregard for the rights of property owners. "The real endangered species is our rights and freedoms," Boone said. "They're under attack every time Congress goes into session."

"Our government needs to stop creating regulations that strangle our responsible and law-abiding citizens," he said. "We need to change our focus to punishing those who are irresponsible and break the laws."

"The warbler has been a wake-up call for a lot of Texans," Boone commented. "I think we'll see a lot of people realize from this that we have to demand changes in the way our Federal Government does business."

First Old Settlers Reunion Got Hico Man Back On Run

Junior Lee woke up the morning of the first Hico Old Settlers Reunion Run in 1986 and proclaimed he would run the 5K race.

"My wife said, 'What are you stupid? You haven't even trained or anything.'" Lee said.

Two hours later, he was on a starting line for the first time in 16 years. He would finish the race about mid-pack, but others took him about as serious as his wife.

"He came up to me after the race," said

Andy Vallejo, who won that first race and four other Old Settlers Runs. "I thought, 'Who is this old fat guy?' He looked like Bart Simpson's father."

One year later, the old fat guy was breathing down Vallejo's neck a mile into the second annual race. Lee had trimmed 40 pounds off his 210 pound frame, and the enthusiasm he had lost from a successful college track career had been restored.

Lee, now 46, set a State Class A record in winning the 1966 state mile in 4:25 as a senior at Cross Plains High School. He lowered that to 4:05.6 at Howard Payne University and his 13:48 for three miles was one of the best times in the nation. But he gave it up after graduation in 1971.

"I was sick and tired of all the hard work," he said. "I never thought I'd ever run again."

He didn't for 16 years. He taught school in San Angelo, worked in the oil fields and then moved to Hico and took a job as an armed security officer at the Comanche Peak Nuclear Plant. He met local runner Sherill Johnson, who told him about the Old Settlers Run. Except for a few softball games, his first step from the starting line was his first stride in 16 years. But he hasn't stopped since.

When the pounds came off, so did the seconds. He has dominated masters running in the Fort Worth area since turning 40 in 1987. He has run a 4:30 mile, a 15:09 5K, a 31:54 10K and a 2:40:41 marathon. He has lost only one masters race—to Denton's Ben Moturi—this year and won five overall races. But his special race is the Old Settlers Run, because that gave him his re-start.

Lee finished fifth the next year and never has finished worse than sixth. He finished second one year to former University of Texas runner Paul Stoneham.

The race is special not only because it is held in Lee's hometown. The course winds through the Hico neighborhoods, and almost everyone sits or stands in their front yards and cheers on the runners. Some even turn on their sprinklers and water the competitors. It is a part of the celebration of the area's first settlers, and a huge festival and dance is held after the race.

The eighth Old Settlers 5K Run will be held Saturday, and Junior Lee will be on the front row. Now that Lee has found running again, you can bet he will be back there for many years to come.

"If it hadn't been for that first race, I might not have gotten back into running," he said. "But now I'll stay competitive as long as I can and keep running the rest of my life."

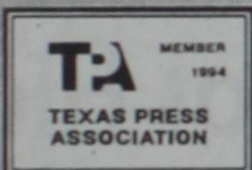

Kate McCarty Celebrated Her 90th Birthday

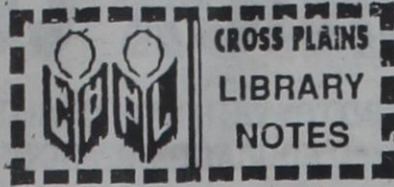

CITY COUNCIL MINUTES

July City Council Minutes

This was a regular meeting of the Cross Plains City Council. All members were present.

Ray Purvis moved to accept the minutes of the previous meeting as read. Leon Nixon seconded and motion carried.

Ray Purvis informed the council that the Masonic Lodge settled with the insurance company on their building and that the Lodge and the Medical Clinic were in agreement to sell to the clinic the top portion of the building for \$1.00. The council asked Debbie to check with the Texas Municipal League on the legality of the city selling the bottom half of the building to the Medical Clinic. Jerry Cassle moved to sell building to the Brownwood Regional Medical Center for \$1.00 plus closing cost pending approval from Texas Municipal League and agreement with Brownwood Regional Medical Center. Ray Purvis seconded and motion carried with Gary Childers abstaining from voting.

The council discussed the sewer line from Avenue A to Dale Mitchell's property. By general consent the council agreed to table the discussion until further information is presented by Mr. Mitchell.

Don Griffith informed the council that the patrol car is currently back in the shop with the same transmission problems as before. He informed the council that Weatherby's had loaned us a pickup to use until they fix the patrol car. He also informed the council that he had some reports available if they would like to look over them. He stated that he had done a comparison with Cisco as to the number of calls for service as compared to Cross Plains and that their calls were approximately twice the number of calls as for Cross Plains, however, they have 7 officers as compared to Cross Plains' one officer.

Ray Purvis moved to pay the bills. Leon Nixon seconded and motion carried.

Jerry Cassle moved to adjourn. Ray Purvis seconded and motion carried.

August City Council Minutes

This was a regular meeting of the Cross Plains City Council. Members present were Mayor Gene Dillard, Ray Purvis, Gary Childers, Ray Womack, and Jerry Cassle. Leon Nixon was absent.

Gary Childers moved to accept the minutes of the previous meetings as read. Jerry Cassle seconded and motion carried.

Monty Richards met with the council to discuss the baseball field currently being used for teenage baseball. He discussed the fact that high school baseball will begin this year and that he had been elected as President to the Athletic Booster Club and would like to begin preparing for the spring games so that work that needs to be done can be completed. He informed the council that the Booster Club and the school would be doing work on this field and that both organizations were in hopes that the city would be able to help get the fields in shape for the high school program in the spring. He informed the council that he would put together some information concern what work needed to be done and an approximate cost for these projects and meet with them again when he is on the agenda.

Billy Jacobs met with council to discuss the stand pipe project. He presented the council several maps to review concerning the pressure that will be provided once the project is completed. He discussed with the council what site would best suit the current needs for the city. By general consent the council agreed to look at several sites in town and meeting again to decide where to locate the tank and possible installing an elevated tank as proposed to a stand pipe.

A public meeting was held to inform citizens that the city intends to apply for grant funds. Citizen participation was low at the meeting. However, the council informed the citizens present what monies were available from the state and what projects were eligible. Jerry Cassle moved to have water and sewer as the priority projects for this year's grant. Gary Childers seconded and motion carried.

Gary Childers moved to have the city's matching contribution at 10 percent. Ray Purvis seconded and motion carried.

Jerry Cassle moved to appoint Debbie Gosnell as the official to attend the Regional Review Committee meeting for the grant. Ray Purvis seconded and motion carried.

Dale Mitchell met with the council to discuss the sewer line to his property. He stated that he had talked with Gene Rhodes and that Gene had indicated that he would give Dale an easement across

this property for him to lay his portion of the sewer line. Gene also indicated that he would like for the county to annex this as a county road. Dale stated that he intended to talk with the county commissioners to see if they would be interested in making this a county road. After careful consideration, Jerry Cassle moved to allow Dale Mitchell to tie onto the city sewer line at the city limits. Each resident that is allowed to tie onto this sewer line will be responsible for paying a monthly sewer service charge at each tap. The sewer line past the city limits will be provided and maintained by Dale Mitchell. It is agreeable with Dale Mitchell that if any resident does not keep his/her sewer charge current, service will be disconnected at the city limits. Ray Womack seconded and motion carried with Jerry Cassle, Ray Womack and Ray Purvis voting for and Gary Childers voting against.

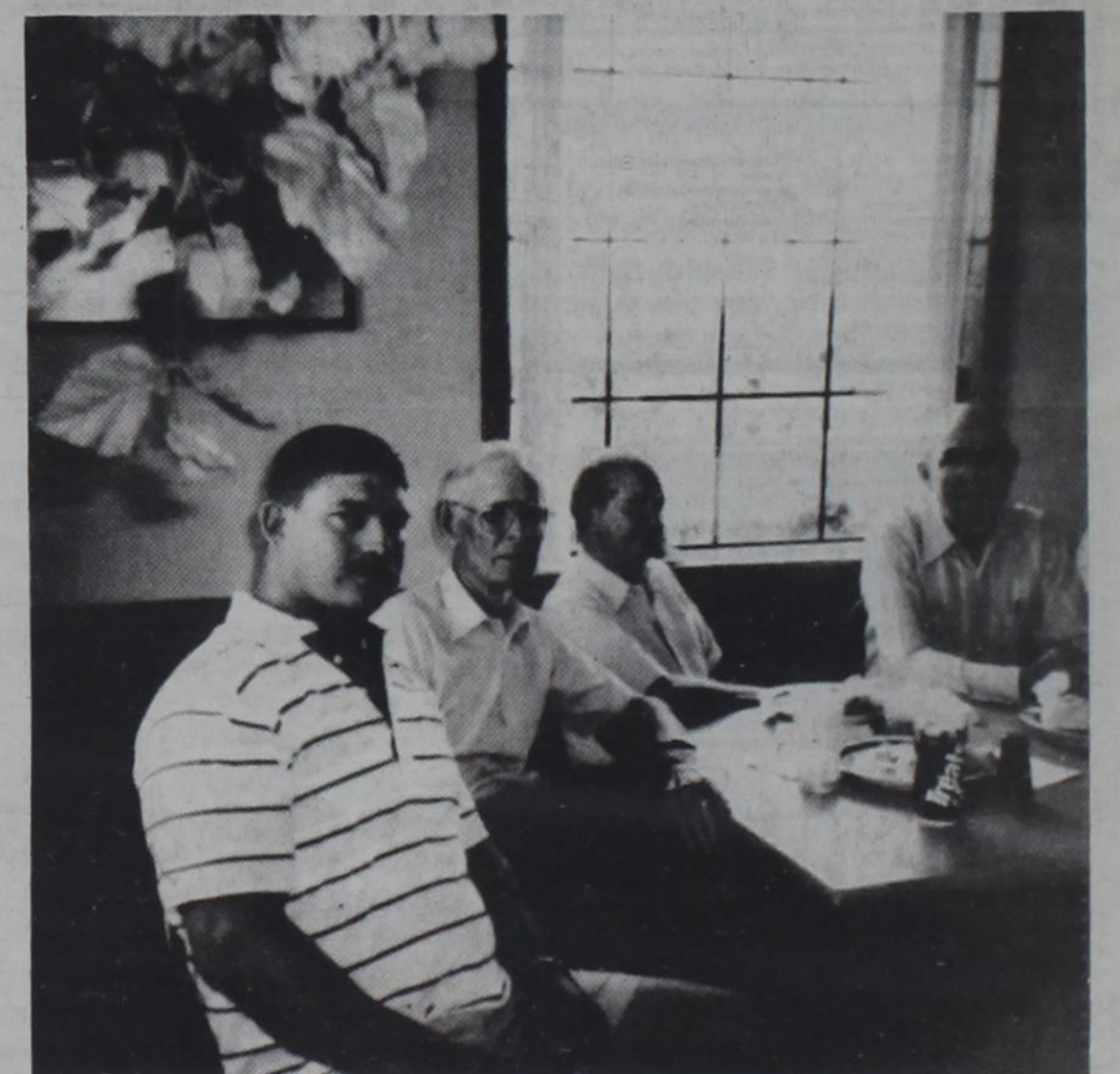

The Cross Plains school serves meals each school day. Children may buy lunch for _____ and breakfast for 50c. Children may also get meals free or at a reduced price.

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for your children, your children can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart below, your children can get free meals or reduced-price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced-price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is 40c for lunch and 30c for breakfast.

TO GET FREE OR REDUCED-PRICE MEALS FOR YOUR CHILDREN, YOU MUST COMPLETE AN APPLICATION AND RETURN IT TO THE SCHOOL. WE CANNOT APPROVE AN APPLICATION THAT IS NOT COMPLETE.

HOW TO APPLY

If you now get food stamps or AFDC for the children you are applying for, the application must have the children's names, a food stamp or AFDC case number for each child, and the signature of an adult household member. If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income, and an adult signature. If you do not list a food stamp or AFDC case number for all children you are applying for, then the application must have the children's names, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member, and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

Verification: Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your children should get free or reduced-price meals.

Fair Hearing: You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing:

Reporting Changes: If your children get free or reduced-price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

Confidentiality: School officials use the information on the application only to decide if your children should get free or reduced-price meals.

Reapplication: You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change in status, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or AFDC for your children, you may then complete an application.

Handicapped: Meal substitutions at no additional cost for children who meet the definition of "handicapped" will be served, provided a physician has submitted a statement attesting to this fact and prescribing a substitute.

To avoid this interaction take thyroid pills and iron (including vitamins containing iron) at least 2 hours apart. Thyroxine is just one of many medicines that iron binds onto and inactivates. Always let your doctor and pharmacist know what medications and over-the-counter medicines you are taking.
