State Assistance For Tornado Damage

State Senator Bill Sims (D-Paint Rock) and Representative John Cook (D-Breckenridge) will be in Cross Plains on December 15, to announce that long awaited financial assistance is going to be available to repair tomado damaged and destroyed residences; a tornado swept through Cross Plains and the Cottonwood Community in late May. The press conference will be held in the Buffalo Room at the Dairy Queen at 10

Two Disaster Relief Grants, each in the amount of \$350,000, from the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs have been awarded to Callahan County and Cross Plains respectively; the decision to make these allocations was made only recently on December 5. Representative Cook said, "I am so pleased that this assistance could come through. Natural disasters of this sort are particularly devastating to rural areas because we just don't have the personnel and resources on hand to seek help."

In a letter to Department of Housing and Community Affairs officials thanking them for surveying the damage that still remained in the area, Senator Sims stated that although he realized that several months had elapsed since the tornado struck that people were still living in unsafe conditions. Commodity Recertification For Callahan Announced

It is that time of year that CTO must recertify its clients who participate in the TEFAP Program.

TDHS guidelines state that to receive USDA commodities, Households must apply once a year in the contracted area where they live.

Maxine Dimitri, center director, and CTO staff will assist clients in filling out their applications at the following dates and times and places: In Putnam, December 20 from 2:30 - 4:00 p.m.; in Baird, December 21 from 9:30 - 12:00 p.m.; in Clyde, December 21 from 1:30 -4:00 p.m.; and in Cross Plains December 22 from 9:00 - 12:00 p.m.

Clients must provide proof of identity. residency and income. This year, TDHS is requiring that any individual who wishes for someone else to pick up their commodities to submit proof that they are handicapped. Exceptions may be made for elderly shut-ins. CTO will verify this information Proof of Income, Copies of AFDC, Food Stamps, SSI, MAO, Driver License, Utility Bills.

16 for Martin Luther King Day, February 20 for President's Day, May 29 for Memorial Day, July 4 for Independence Day, September 4 for Labor Day, October 9 for Columbus Day, November 23 and 24 for Thanksgiving and December 25 for Christmas Day.

Other items brought before the commissioners' court meeting included:

-Commissioners met with Mrs. Bradina Benson in reference to delinquent taxes on property she is purchasing. Mrs. Benson sought an adjustment of some \$580 in penalty and interest on the delinquent taxes on the property. However, county commissioners voted not to grant the request.

-Commissioners met with County Sheriff Eddie Curtis in regards to the purchase of a telephone system for the sheriff's department. The item was tabled from the November 14 commissioners' meeting. Commissioners voted not the grant the request for a new phone system for the sheriff's department.

County Judge Bill Johnson said the county commissioners felt it was not necessary to purchase a new phone system, but instead, the sheriff's department should continue to use the current telephone system.

-County Extension Agent Greg Gerngross gave commissioners a presentation and slide show on a recent Texas Natural Resources Field Day held at the Tim Broadfoot Ranch south of Clyde. Gerngross reported that nearly 500 school children from the four county school districts attended the field

-Commissioners met to discuss approving a new policy on continued insurance coverage for disabled county employees.

Judge Johnson said commissioners voted to table the item until the December 6 called meeting. Johnson said more information will be obtained from other Texas counties as to their policy on continuing insurance coverage for disabled employees.

Johnson went on to say commissioners are seeking to set a policy in which insurance coverage will be continued on a disabled county employee for a certain number of days. He said that way the employee won't have to reapply for insurance coverage before going back to work for the county.

-Commissioners voted to authorize the county judge to advertise for audit proposals for the 1994-95 fiscal year. Jon Hardwick of Baird performed the independent county audit last year.

-Commissioners met with County Attorney Allen Wright. Wright met with commissioners seeking permission to move the county attorney's office from the second floor to the third floor of the county courthouse in Baird.

Wright stated to commissioners he wanted to move to the third floor where there is more office room.

The

County commissioners voted to turn down Wright's request to move his office to the third floor.

Judge Johnson said commissioners

felt the county attorney and county judge's office should continue to be located next door to each other. Johnson said by keeping the county attorney's office on the second floor, it would be in close proximity to the county courtroom as well as county library. Judge Johnson also explained the at-

torney and judge's secretaries also help answer the telephone for each others office and by having the offices next to each other, they could continue to do so.

-Commissioners also voted to pay the approve bills and approve the minutes from the previous commissioners' court meeting.

A called meeting of the Callahan County Commissioners' Court is set for 9:30 a.m. Tuesday, December 6 at the commissioners' courtroom on the second floor of the county courthouse in Baird.

CALLAHAN COUNTY FSA NEWS

1994 DISASTER PROGRAM

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The county office will attend a training session the week of December 12; therefore we are requesting you wait until the week of December 19 to call for an appointment for making your disaster application. The 1994 disaster program is similar to those in the past in which farmers with crop insurance who suffered crop losses greater than 35 percent of normal production (or 40 percent for those without crop insurance) will be eligible for benefits. Before making an appointment, gather the following items as they apply to your situation since they will be required to

complete the disaster application. 1) If insured, bring CCC-440 from your insurance company showing policy number, acres, premiums and indemnity paid, etc. Also bring any insurance crop appraisals and/or production worksheets.

2) Bring production for each crop affected. To be accepted, the production must be VERIFIABLE, that is showing buyer, seller, weights, dates, farm, etc. You need to be able to show which acres were not harvested, if any. You must submit all crop production for other farms, including those in other counties, for the crop requesting disaster benefits.

3) The farm operator must sign the disaster application in all cases. Landlords must also sign applicable forms if power of attorneys are not on hand. All signatures must be obtained before the application will be approved.

4) Crop quality adjustments may be paid if the crop has poor quality. Grade sheets, such as, peanut ASCS-1007's must be supplied to the office if requesting quality adjustment payments.

If you have been through a disaster sign-up before, you know what a lengthy process it can be. Remember, it will save you time to have the necessary documents in hand when you phone for your appointment. As always, we appreciate your cooperation in this effort.

WOOL AND MOHAIR PROGRAM

Wool and Mohair producers are reminded that all sales receipts need to

be filed by January 31, 1995 for wool and mohair sold in 1994, if you wish to receive an incentive payment.

ARP (Set Aside) for 1995

The tentative cotton ARP for 1995 is 7.5%. The USDA however can alter the percent on cotton until January 1, 1995 if conditions warrant a lessor or greater percentage. The ARP for wheat, grain sorghum, barley, and oats for 1995 are all zero.

ASCS BECOMES FARM SERVICE AGENCY

Many producers who have called this office may have been surprised to hear us call ourselves the "Farm Service Agency" or "FSA" when we answer the telephone. The ASCS has become the FSA, and encompasses all of the commodity support and basic conservation programs of the ASCS, plus the risk management programs of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC) and the farm lending activities of the Farmer's Home Administration (FmHA). So producers - please don't hang up when you hear us say "FSA" instead of "ASCS"!

COMMUNITY COMMITTEE

ELECTION POSTPONED The reorganization of USDA has prompted the Secretary of Agriculture to postpone the community committee elections for one year. Current COC members have been designated as Acting County Committee members until the election is held. Please look for details later, but postponement will allow the USDA to better evaluate the makeup of the future committees throughout the United States.

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

News For Veterans-

BENEFITS FOR CIVILIANS—Secretary of Veterans Affairs Jesse Brown has announced that two civilian groups that provided critical support to US military efforts during World War II have been granted Veteran status and are potentially eligible for VA benefits.

A recent decision by the Secretary of the Air Force certified the service of members honorably discharged from the US civilian flight crew and aviation ground support employees of Northwest Airlines who served overseas under the Air Transportation Command from December 14, 1941, through August 14, 1945, and US civilian female employees of the US Army Nurse Corps who served in the defense of Bataan and Corregidor from January 2, 1941 to February 3, 1945.

These newly designated Veterans, or their survivors, can apply for the same benefits currently available to other World War II Veterans, including service-related disability compensation, pension, medical care, certain survivor's benefits, V A guaranteed home loans, and burial benefits.

To receive a discharge certificate, application must be made on DD Form 2168, which is available from the U S Air Force or from your local V A Regional Office (Waco, TX). The completed form should be sent to HQ AFMPC/DPMAR2, Randolph AFB, TX 78150-6001, ATTN: Sgt White.

Some documentation is required with the application. For further information, contact Lt Col. Robert Dunlap, Secretary of the Air Force Personnel Council (AFPC), 1535 Command Drive, 3rd Floor, EE Wing, Andrews AFB, MD 20331-7002; telephone 301-981-3504/5750. The telephone for the V A Regional Office in Waco, TX is 800-827-1000.

Speaking of Bataan and Corregidor, a new book has come on the scene that reveals the horrible treatment dealt out to white prisoners of war by the Japanese. Almost as bad is the poor treatment of American POWs by their own government as a cover-up for

General MacArthur and other Allied leaders. The author notes with bitter irony the refusal of the US or Japanese government to provide any compensation to these victims of Japanese policy while the US government provided \$20,000 to each Japanese interned in the US during World War II.

"Prisoners of the Japanese: POWs of World War II in the Pacific" by Gavan Daws (Morrow, 448 pages, \$25) should be required reading for every history student. The persistence of the survivors of Japanese genocide in bringing their vile suffering to public knowledge is an acute embarrassment to the curators of the Smithsonian Institution and other purveyors of the politically correct myth that Japan was a victim of American racism and imperialism. One wonders when Mr Daw's excellent book will make its way to the Smithsonian's gift shops????

These funds of financial assistance was approved subject to the terms of a letter of condition executed by the Callahan County WSC board of directors and the Rural Economic and Community Development on November 15, 1994.

The Callahan County WSC was organized in 1978 for the purpose of securing a rural water supply system for rural residents of Callahan County. In 1981 the water supply system was incorporated and the search for water and funding became futile and very lengthy. When Clyde and Baird turned to Abilene for the purchase of water, despair became hope to the Callahan County WSC. Finally in 1992, contracts with Abilene to the cities of Clyde and Baird for purchasing water from Abilene, was approved. Along with the approval was the right for Clyde and Baird to issue water purchase contracts with Callahan County WSC for rural water service. Finally, after sixteen years of frustration, despair and hope becomes the reality of water service to many rural residents of Callahan County.

The Callahan County WSC water district approximate boundaries extends from Hays Road, north of I-20 to 3 miles north of Clyde then east to the north and west city limits of Baird. South of 1-20, the limits extends from the east city limits of Clyde to the west city limits of Baird and being approximately 5 miles south of I-20 in this area.

Other areas to be served by the system includes the area along US 283 north

and south of Baird to St. Hwy 36. The rural communities of Belle Plains, Admiral and Rowden will also be served. The system will serve more than the 475 customers already signed for meters with 117 miles of water lines.

Callahan County WSC is still receptive to those who want rural water service. Warren said, "We will take applications in chronogically order as they come in at the same rate of \$200.00 per meter. We'll serve who we can with this pipeline system and the loan money thus approved. Some areas outside of the main line system may not be feasible to serve, the cost of extending these lines and/or elevation differences may be too costly to incorporate within the available funding program".

this Christmas season. Poinsettias grow best in a cool room with ample light (but not direct sunlight), little moisture and humidity, no cold drafts, and no drying heat. Some may last as long as three or four months. Patient gardeners even nurse poinsettias along year to year.

Each year, greenhouse operators in Texas grow, market and show off hundreds of thousands of poinsettias--for good reason. They're the nation's bestselling potted plant and the most popular Christmas flower, despite a brief buying season that lasts about two months.

Poinsettias grow year round in their native tropical habitat in Central America and Mexico. Thanks to South Texas' winter warmth, they also flourish in the Rio Grande Valley, where some specimens mature into herbaceous shrubs as high as 10 feet tall.

For centuries, the Mexican people called the poinsettia Flora de la Noche Buens, or "Flower of the Holy Night", which they used at Christmas to decorate homes, churches and Nativity proces-The Latin species name for poinsettia.

Euphorbia pulcherrima, means "most beautiful". Originally called "crimson spurge" in the United States (a spurge being any member of the large family of milky-sapped plants called Euphorbias), the plant received its more popular name, "poinsettia", in honor of the first U.S. ambassador to Mexico, Joel Roberts Poinsett. An amateur botanist and plant collector, Poinsett gathered samples of

According to a recent national pole, half of Americans mistakenly believe poin-

settias are toxic. "It's a testament to the persistence of myths," says Paul Bachman, marketing chairman of the Society of American Florists. "Poinsettias simply are not toxic. That was proven 23 years ago in scientific tests, and we want to set the record straight. "In fact, no other consumer plant has been as widely tested as

the poinsettia. That's not to say you should make the plant one part of your Christmas dinner, though. Like other non-food items, if ingested, the poinsettia may cause some stomach discomfort--but nothing more.


