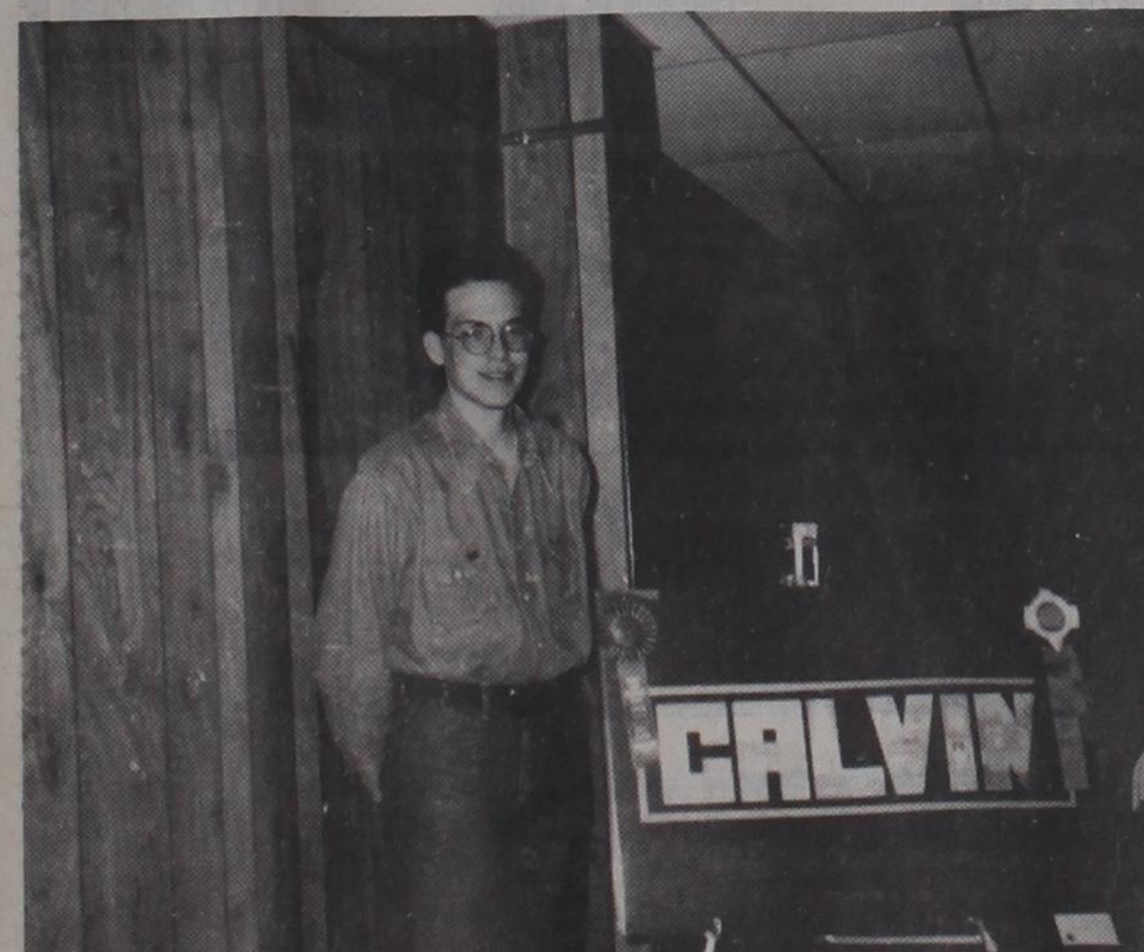

One Cub Scouting purpose is showing how to be helpful and do one's best. Boys participating certainly did this and with the communities help have shown we can make a difference.

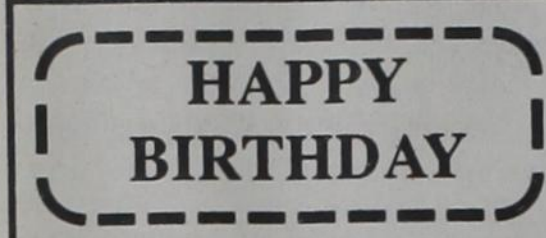
Rita Sanders

GARDEN TIPS

FROM THE
Cross Plains Garden Club

All houseplants should be inside or in a protected place by now. They won't require as much fertilizing until warm weather returns unless they are in a sunny window.

Daffodils can be planted right now, just be sure they are planted deep enough. Also, some wildflowers should be planted before winter.

After the "fall blooming perennials" quit blooming, clip them back, chrysanthemums to about 4 inches and asters to 8 inches.

If you are considering planting a shade tree, this fall is the best time. Pecan trees make a lovely shade plus delicious nuts. Wichita and Western are just two that grow well in our area. Some other long lived shade trees for our area are Shumard Red Oak, Chinquapin Oak, bur oak, live oak, Sawtooth Oak, and Southern Red Oak.

If you are putting in a new lawn, Titan Fescue can be planted this fall. It's a permanent year-round grass, the ideal planting time is now. It's a fine blade, deep rooted, dwarf grass developed especially for our part of the country. If you decide to plant new grass, do it soon and be sure to use 18-6-12 new lawn starter fertilizer according to label directions to get it off to a good start. There are several products to choose from our winterizing established lawns. Be sure to follow label directions.

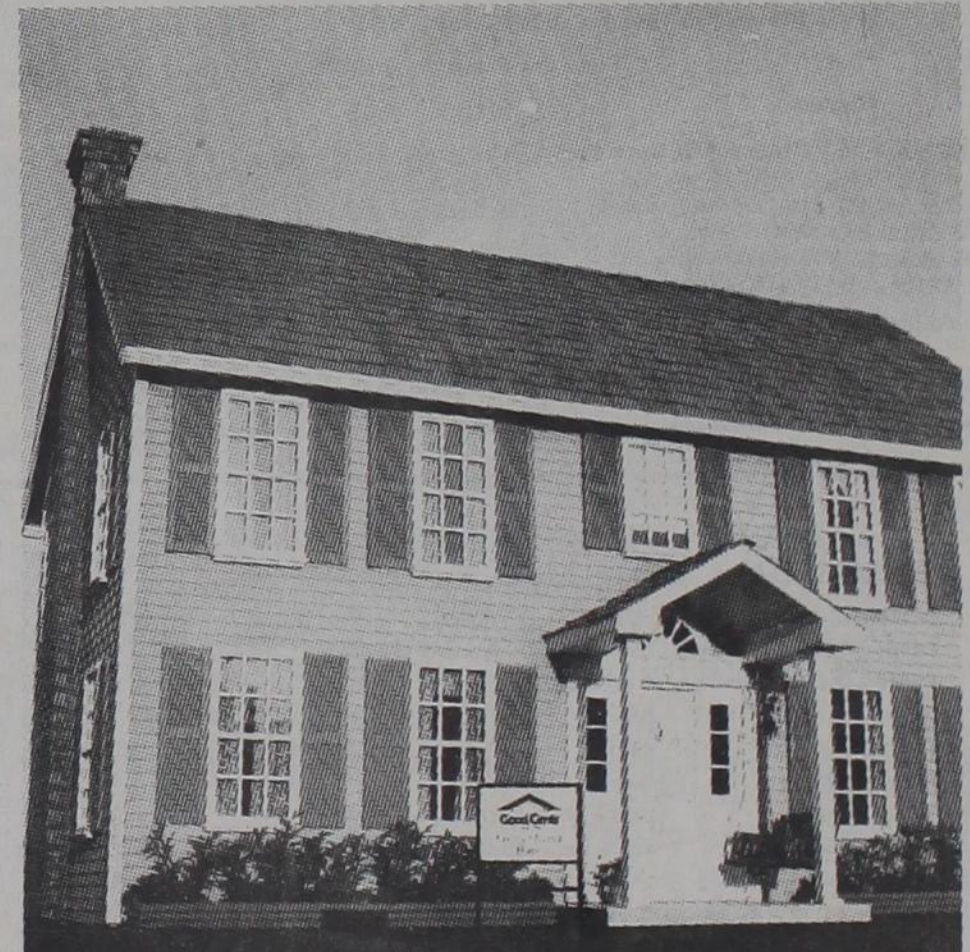

Chris Potter looked excellent before going down with a knee injury in off-season. He should be ready by the first game.

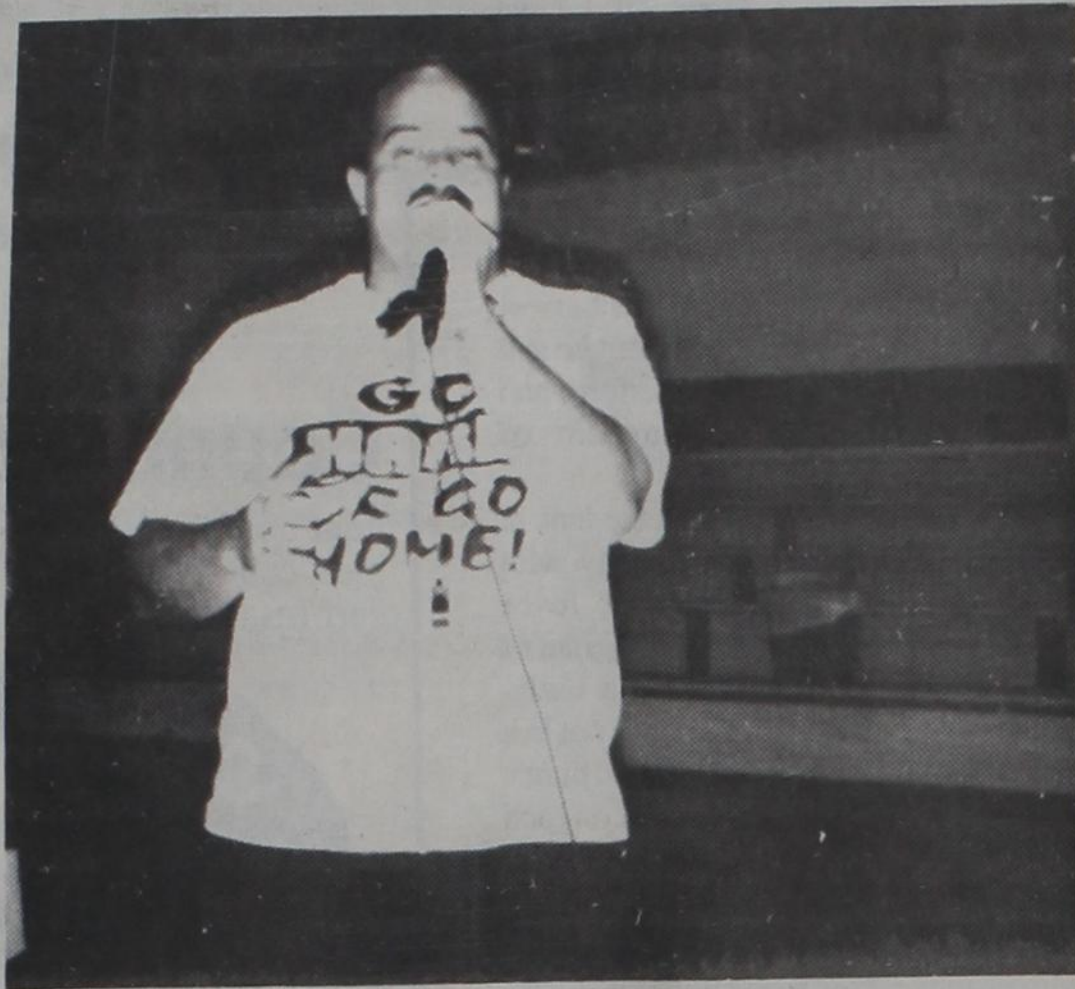
Senior transfer Brandon Finn also should help the Buffs with his overall athletic ability.

Jared Harris and Terry Shults are expected to move up from last year's J.V. Mike Tollett showed promise in this fall's off-season program.

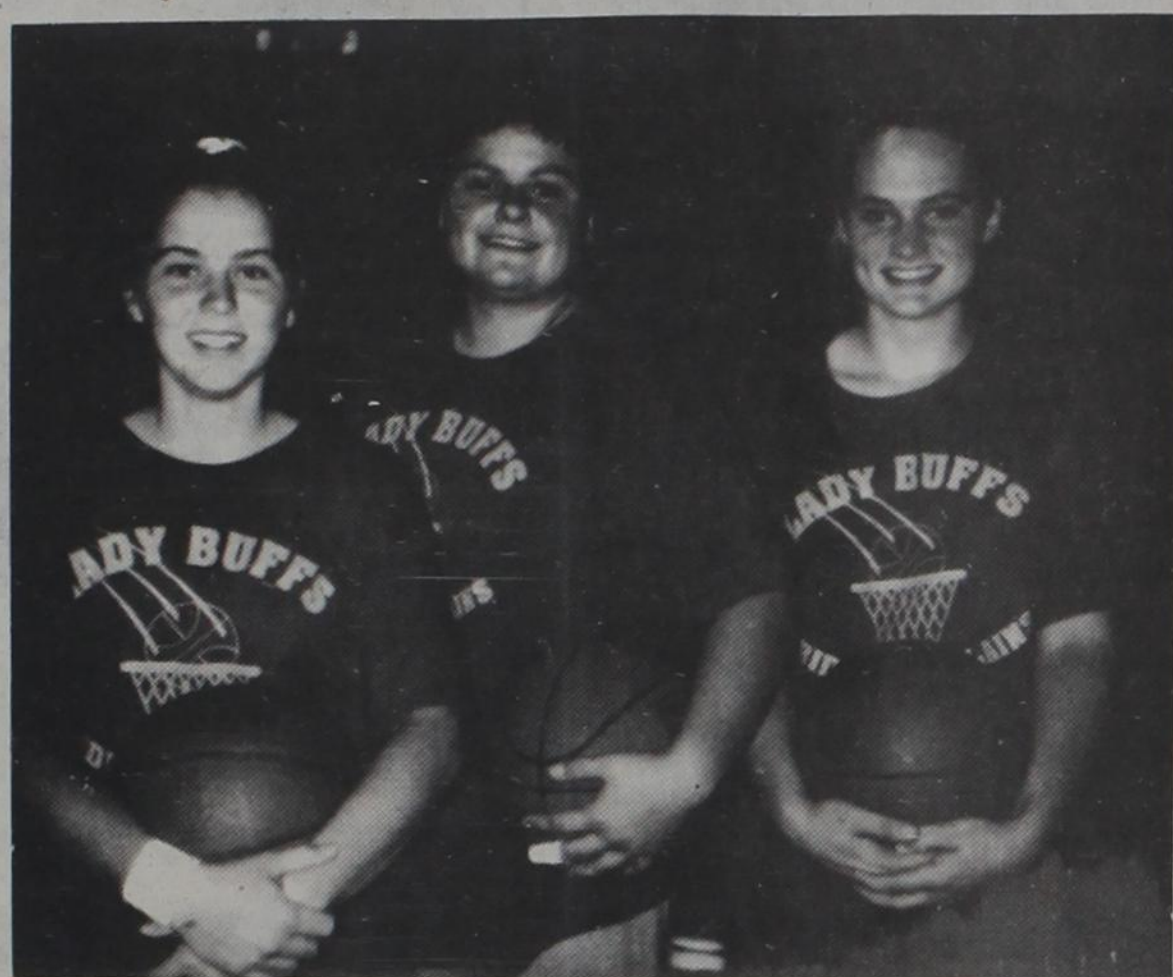
The Buffs open up on the road this Saturday with a scrimmage at Santo.

Lump-In-The-Throat-Story: My first year at Cross Plains was difficult. A much loved teacher had retired, and the students wanted her back. I had been out of teaching to have my family and had lost the "teacher touch." Things did not go well at all. Instead of an educational setting, my room was a battlefield. My students and I suffered. The next year — approximately 6 weeks into school — those same students (now freshmen) came to me and apologized. The eighth grade lessons were more advanced. I tested both classes in the same day. All of the eighth graders made 100. All of the seventh graders made failing grades. Yes, I had given the eighth grade the "easier" seventh grade test and the seventh graders the "harder" eighth grade test. Needless to say, we re-tested.

Bus tips

The Texas PTA during School Bus Safety Week last week offered a list of tips for eliminating preventable accidents and enhancing the security of student transportation. Following is some of the advice:

- Leave home early enough to arrive at the bus stop several minutes before the bus is to arrive. Avoid running to the bus stop or being shuttled to the bus stop by parents.
- Wait for the bus in a safe place off the roadway. Avoid horseplay and always respect the privacy and property of others.
- Respect the "danger zone," a 10-foot wide area surrounding the bus on all sides. When waiting to board, remain far enough away from the bus that you can clearly see the driver's face. That's usually about 10 giant steps. When you are sure the driver has seen you, approach the bus in a single line without running or pushing.
- When it is necessary to cross the street upon boarding or leaving the bus, walk far enough away from the bus so you can see the driver's face. Wait for the driver to signal that it is safe for you to cross.
- Enter the bus in an orderly manner. Go directly to an available or assigned seat. Remain seated and facing forward at all times while the bus is moving.
- When the driver gives you instructions, follow them.

State Bound Runners

This is the fifth year in a row that Cross Plains' Cross Country Coach Mack McConal has taken at least one runner to the state level of competition in Cross Country. This year, he had two high school girls qualify, coming out of the Regional competition, which was held last weekend.

All the hard work and miles and miles of running that the Cross Country runners do all during the season pays off in the end. Junior Angie Phillips and Senior Connie Steele placed 6th and 7th respectively at the Regional meet held on Saturday, November 6, in Arlington. Angie's time of 13:01 was slightly better than her average for the year. Connie's time of 13:02 was also better than her average. The two girls ran right together during the entire two mile course. The top ten girls advance to state.

Amanda McGuire (a freshman) also ran in the Regional meet as a result of her good finish at the District meet. Amanda ran a very strong race for her first time in Regional, finishing 41 in a field of 117 runners. She kept up a good steady pace during the entire race, even though the weather was uncomfortably cold and with a chilling wind. Amanda's time was 14:32.

In the boys division, freshman Justin Richey qualified as an individual for the Regional competition. In junior high, the boys run a 1-mile course, sometimes 2; but, at the high school level, the boys jump up to a 3-mile course. Justin (who had played in the Baird/C.P. football game the night before and had to travel to Arlington after the game) finished a very respectable 51st in a large field of 132 competitors...with even a strong sprint at the end, passing up several runners and giving him a time of 20:17.

State competition will be held on Saturday, November 13, at Georgetown. The group will leave campus on Friday morning and stay the night, which will allow them time to become familiar with the course the day before and get a good night's rest.

Elks National Foundation Grant Available

Students planning to pursue a postsecondary vocational/technical course in a school or college leading to an associate degree, diploma, or certificate, but less than a baccalaureate degree, are eligible to compete for \$2,000 grants offered by the Elks National Foundation. The Elks National Foundation Trustees have set aside \$788,000 for the grants for the 1994/95 — 1995/96 school years. Each grant is for \$1,000 for each of the two years.

A total of 394 grants are available, at least one per state, with additional grants allotted according to Elks' donations within each state. One grant will be offered to a student from Puerto Rico and one to a student from Guam or another Pacific Island.

Although graduating high school seniors are eligible to apply, older students who desire training or re-training are also encouraged to apply for these grants. A high school diploma or GED is not required. Students who plan to transfer to four-year colleges or universities are not eligible.

Applications are available from financial aid officers at community, technical, and junior colleges, as well as local Lodges of the B.P.O. Elks of the U.S.A. Application deadline is November 19, 1993, and applications must be submitted to the student's local Elks Lodge. (If you need assistance in locating the nearest Elks Lodge, consult your local telephone directory or contact the Elks National Foundation, 312-929-2100.) Each state's applications will be judged by a panel selected by the Association of Community College Trustees (ACCT).

G/T Nominations

The gifted and talented program for the school district is a Kindergarten through 12th grade program. The emphasis for this program is on reading skills. Identification for G/T is in the spring.

Students who are nominated take a series of tests in order to be identified. To measure intelligence, the district is using a test called Structures of the Intellect. The test consists of approximately twelve parts that measure different areas of intelligence — it does not give a single intelligence score — instead, we are looking for several areas of strength.

This test also measures creativity. We watch this score closely, since creativity is often another indication of giftedness. Parents and teachers are sent questionnaires. Their opinions are good indicators of whether or not giftedness may be present.

Kindergarten students produce a portfolio of work under the direction of the G/T teacher. Older students are required to produce writing samples. These work products are scored. Test scores, parent/teacher questionnaires, and the work products are all put together on a profile sheet.

The district has a G/T committee. It is composed of principals, the G/T coordinator, a classroom teacher, and the G/T teachers. The G/T committee reviews the profiles of each student nominated for tested. Obviously, the district is looking for the highest scores in each area. Students must meet district criteria in at least three of the five areas. Parents are notified of the results.

In the fall, the district requests nominations from the teachers and the counselor. The district would also like nominations from parents and the community.

If you have a child, or know of a student in Cross Plains that you would like to nominate for testing for this program, please fill out a nomination form that is available at the elementary or high school. The nomination period will end on November 30.

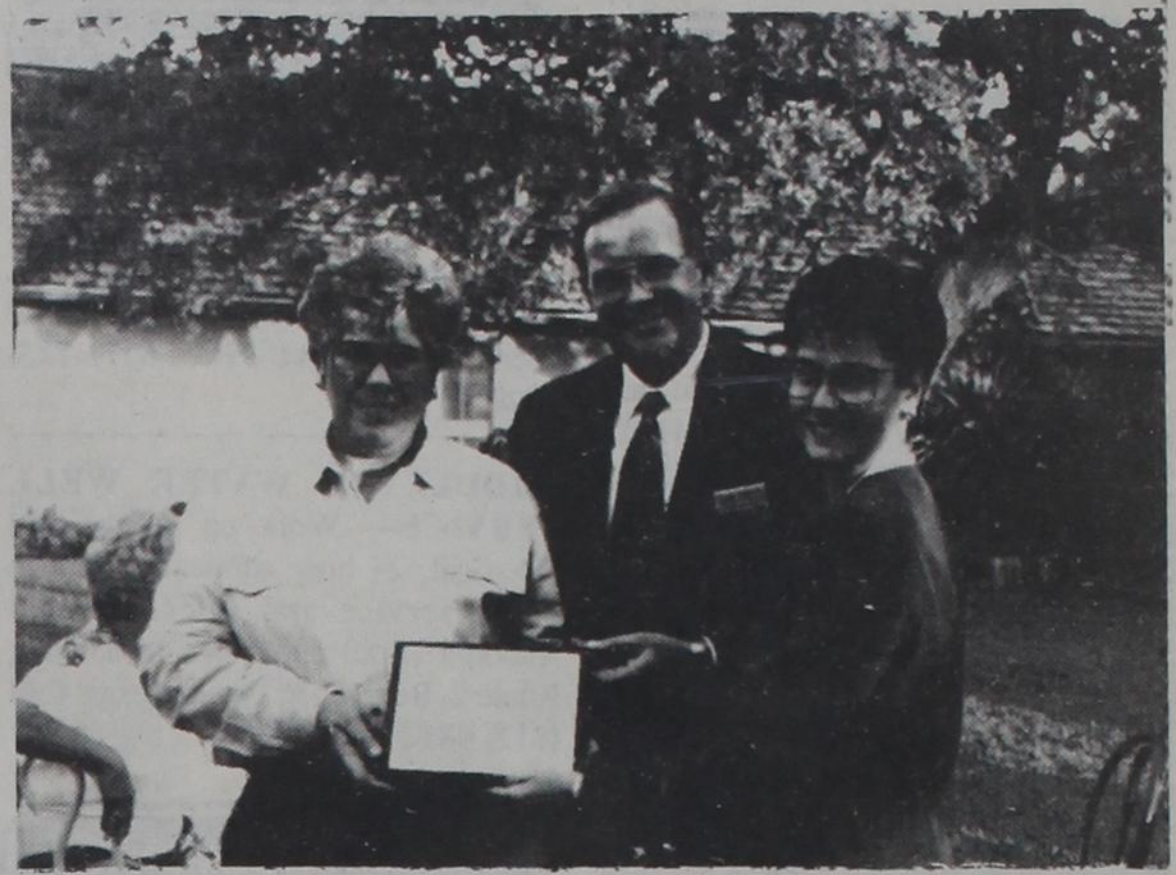

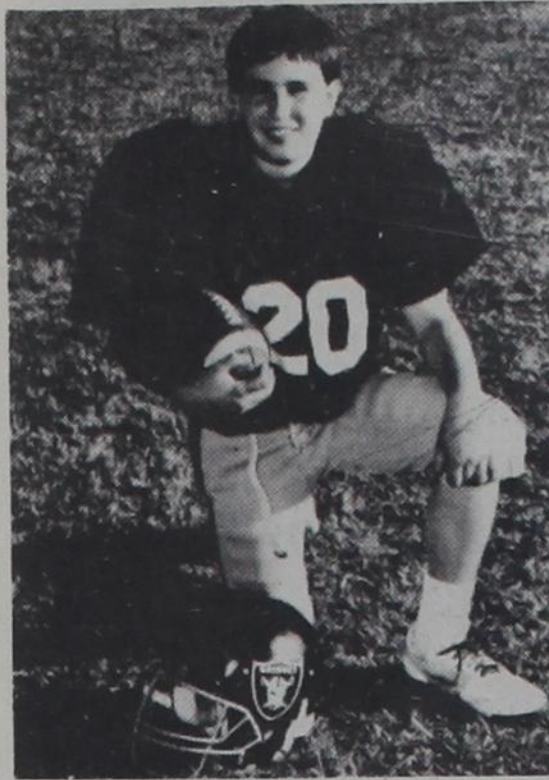

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Editor:
I would like to tell you how much I enjoyed the history of the Baptist churches in Cross Plains, written by Jack Scott. I've always appreciated his writings through the years, and will never forget when he was our editor here. But I was especially pleased to read this one because I have been wanting to get the history of the churches at Pioneer for some time now; and since the idea of putting Pioneer back on the map, as it were, introduced by the Good Old Days, headed by Nelda Weiss and Barbara Powell, I have greater hopes of this dream coming to pass.

I am interested in everything about Pioneer. I was born and raised there and have lived in and around there most all of my 92 years. The churches in Pioneer have been of the utmost importance to me all these years. The Baptist, Methodist, and Church of Christ, while the Presbyterians never had a church in Pioneer, there were also good friends of mine that belonged to the Presbyterian Church. I mention these four churches because back then, approximately 1904 to 1910 before the railroad came, these were about the only churches most of us knew about. Everyone was welcome to attend any of these churches services, regardless of church affiliation. Every summer they held camp meetings together, revivals, etc. I loved all these churches and people and still do, but the purpose of writing this is to let you know that amid all these plans that the club has, I wanted to point out to you that may not know that there are still two churches in operation in Pioneer: the Baptist and the Pentecostal. The Baptist Church is in the south central part and the Pentecostal Church is across the street from the Pioneer Club House. We plan on having these churches open December 4, 1993, the day of the planned celebration.

We hope to have pictures and different things of interest about our churches and Pioneer. Some one will be at the churches to answer your questions about the history of Pioneer churches. There has always been a Baptist Church in Pioneer, but the Pentecostal Church was built in 1926. You can find out a lot about it if you walk over a few hundred yards from the club house. 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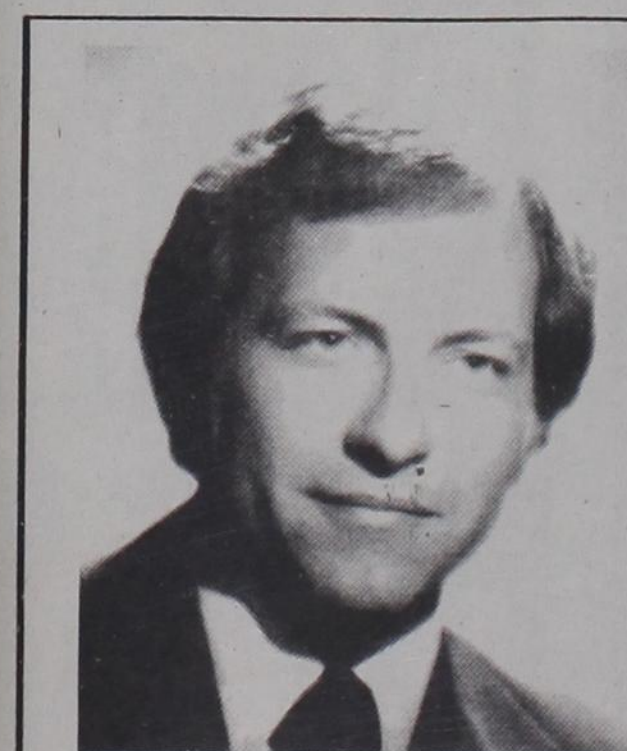
Cody Pancake Completes Marine Training

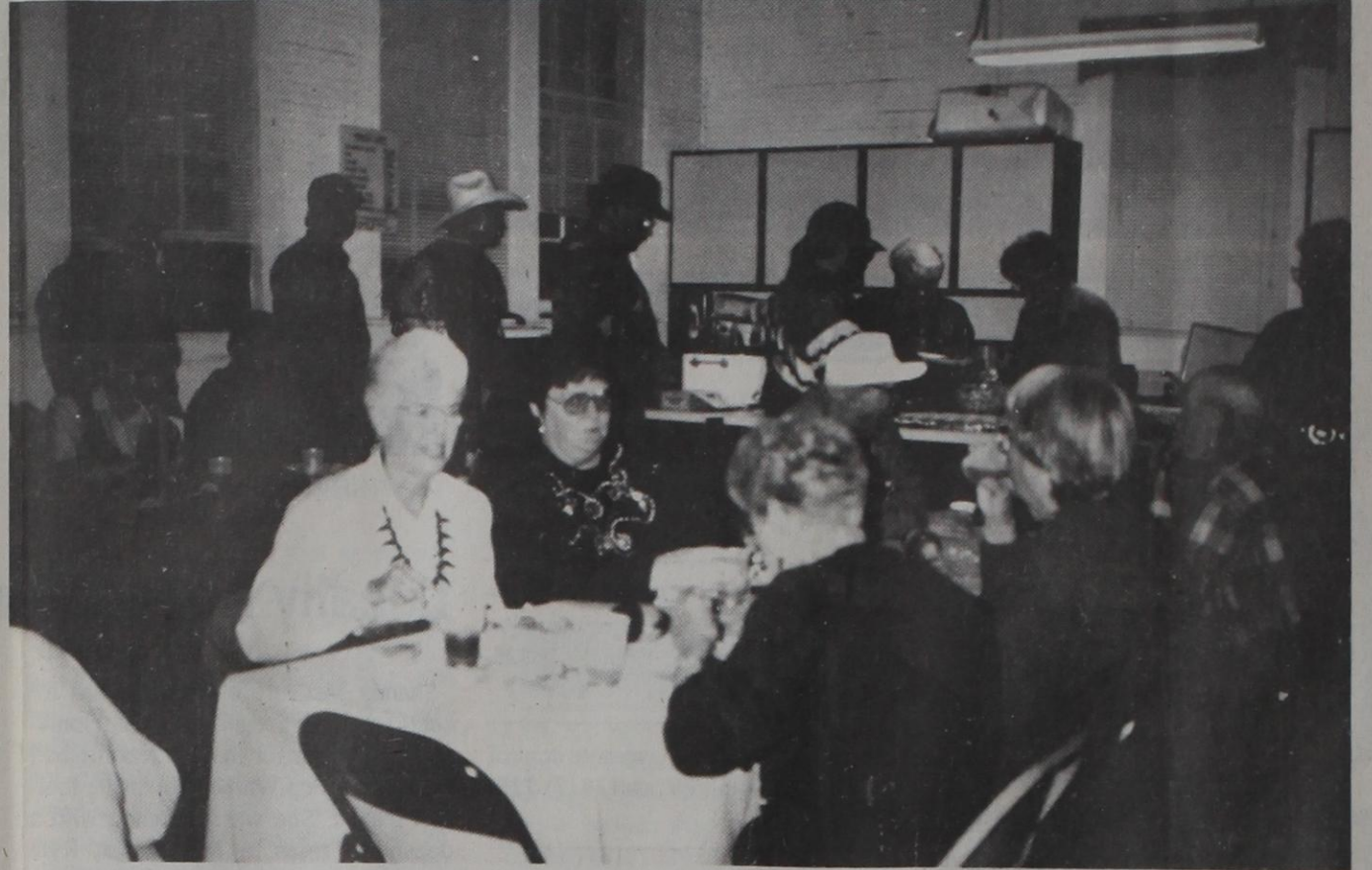
