## Run-Off Election Tuesday, April 12

Callahan County voters will again go to the polls in the Democratic Party's Run-Off Election set for Tuesday, April 12.

Locally, that election will feature a run-off between Callahan County Commissioner Precinct #2 candidates Bryan Farmer and Terry Ellis. Also Callahan County Commissioner Precinct #4 candidates Charlie Grider and Kenneth Sowell will face-off in the run-off election.

The polls for the Democratic Party Run-Off Election will be open Tuesday from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m.

County voters can still cast their ballots in the run-off election by early voting. Early voting in the party's run-off election will conclude on Friday, April 8. The early voting locations will remain the same as in the Democratic Primary Election in March at Clyde, Baird and Cross Plains. The hours to vote by early ballot are during business hours.

Registered voters in Callahan County

will be able to vote by early ballot at the Clyde Justice of the Peace office on North First Street in Clyde and at the Cross Plains Justice of the Peace office. Early voting at the Callahan County Courthouse in Baird will also be taking place in the county clerk's office.

Persons who did not vote in the primary elections will also be eligible to vote in the run-off election; however, those who voted in the primaries will only be allowed to vote in the run-off if they voted in the Democratic Primary. Those who voted in the Republican Primary are not eligible to vote in the run-off election.

The voting locations for the April 12 run-off election will remain the same as in the March 8 Democratic Party Primary Election.

## Crime Stoppers Address Minor's Abuse Of Alcohol Locally

The local Crime Stoppers Board met in a reorganizational meeting on March 31, in the Buffalo Room at Dairy Queen. During discussion of local problems and solutions to them, it was decided that one of the major contributing factors to local problems is the purchasing of alcohol by adults and making it available to minors.

Therefore, it was decided to make the penalty for this offense made known to the general public as follows:

Sec. 106.06 of the Alcoholic Beverage Code: PURCHASE OF ALCOHOL FOR A MINOR; FURNISHING ALCOHOL TO A MINOR.

(a) Except as provided in Subsection (b) of this section, a person commits an offense if he or she purchases an alcoholic beverage for, or gives, or knowingly makes available an alcoholic beverage to a minor.

(b) A person may purchase an alco-

holic beverage for or give an alcoholic beverage to a minor if he is the minor's adult parent, guardian, or spouse, or an adult in whose custody the minor has been committed by a court, and is visibly present when the minor possesses or consumes the alcoholic beverage.

(c) A violation of this section is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not less than \$100 nor more than \$500 for the first offense.

This offense come under the Fine Enhancement Statutes and will be \$1,000 on 2nd conviction.

CRIME STOPPERS WILL PAY A \$100 AWARD to anyone who provides a tip that results in the arrest and conviction of anyone who makes alcoholic beverages available to a minor.

Judge Rolan Jones was certified at a recent 20-hour Justice of the Peace Seminar held March 21-25 in Dallas. The seminar was sponsored by the Justice of the Peace and Constables Association of Texas and is conducted by the Texas Justice Court Training Center headquartered at Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos.

The seminar is one of many held statewide to allow Justices of the Peace to meet their Continuing Judicial Education requirements as set forth in (Art. 27.005) Texas Government Code.

Judges were allowed to select areas of study that closely matched their courts activity. Topics covered were as follows:

Criminal Complaints, Traffic Law, Rural Court Financial Management, Criminal Law - Filing thru Appeal, Juvenile Law, Civil Law, Magistrate Warnings, Contracts and Torts, Rules of Civil Procedure, Justice Civil vs- Small Claims Court, Alcoholic Beverage Laws, Forcible Entry and Detainer, Bond Setting and Forfeiture, Post Judgement Remedies, Jurisdiction and Venue, and Judicial Ethics.

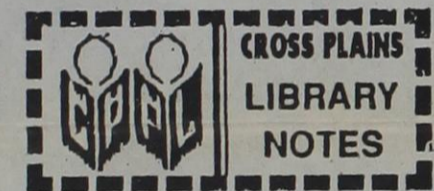

**95,000 Volunteers To Scour The State Saturday, April 9**

ABILENE—It's time to take out the trash in Texas. On Saturday, April 9, 25 Callahan County Adopt-a-Highway volunteers will join 95,000 Adopt-a-Highway and Keep Texas Beautiful volunteers from across the state to help ready the Lone Star State for another colorful wildflower season by participating in the ninth annual "Great Texas Trash-Off."

This event, which is part of the Texas Department of Transportation's (TXDOT) "Don't Mess with Texas" antilitter campaign, is considered the largest one-day cleanup in the nation.

This year, TXDOT is adding a new twist to the event by encouraging all Texans to kick the littering habit for at least 24 hours in observance of Trash-Off day.

In Callahan County, two Adopt-a-Highway groups, the Eula Baptist men and Proud Citizens of Dudley, will scour the county roadways for litter while Keep Texas Beautiful groups spruce up city streets and parks.

For the fourth year in a row, Trash-Off sponsor Coca-Cola is providing the Texas-sized garbage bags. Last year

marked the largest Great Texas Trash-Off in the history of the Don't Mess with Texas campaign, with 85,000 volunteers picking up more than seven million gallons of litter across the state. That's enough garbage to fill the beds of 17,000 pickup trucks.

Since the Don't Mess with Texas and Adopt-a-Highway programs were launched in 1986, the state has seen a 72 percent decrease in roadside litter. Keep Texas Beautiful, Inc., a grassroots partner of TXDOT's antilitter program, is a non-profit, environmental umbrella organization consisting of a network of private citizens, communities, industries, civic groups, schools and government agencies.

**Free Income Tax Service**

By PAUNIECE OGLESBY

Through the Tax-Aide program, volunteers provide free personal income tax assistance to the Senior Citizens, low-income families and the general public with basic tax returns, individuals with complicated tax returns will be advised to seek professional tax assistance.

Volunteers are specially trained, in cooperation with the U.S. Internal Revenue Service (IRS), to understand those provisions of the tax code that affect Senior Citizens as well as the low and middle income families. Tax-Aide volunteers provide personal, one-on-one assistance to help you complete your federal tax returns, including special rebate programs.

Tax-Aide volunteers are available from February 1st to April 15th each year. There will be two volunteers working the Cross Plains area using the Multi-Purpose Center on East 8th Street as their headquarters. Tax returns will be prepared by APPOINTMENT ONLY, so you will need to call the volunteers personally for appointments. Volunteers are Pauniece Oglesby 725-6772 and Susie Rogers 725-7552. Mrs. Oglesby prefers to volunteer on Tuesdays, but will make appointment on other days if necessary. Mrs. Rogers wishes to volunteer on Tuesdays also.

When you meet with a Tax-Aide volunteer, you should bring the following: (1) a copy of last year's (1993) income tax return, (2) any W-2 forms you have received showing your income from working, (3) all 1099 forms you have received which show the interest and/or dividends, (4) all 1099-R forms which show all pension monies paid to you, (5) form SSA-1099 which shows the Social Security paid to you, (6) records of any other income you have received, and (7) receipts or cancelled checks for any of your medical/dental expenses and any contributions you have made to charities.

This is a community service available to those stated above and the Tax-Aide volunteers are eager to be of assistance, so please call for an appointment and let us help you.

I heard someone say: "People used to get married 'for better or for worse' — now they get married 'more or less!' Well it's that kind of attitude, that kind of weak foundation, that caused many of the over one million divorces in the United States last year. I make no bones about it — I'm not a "marrying Sam"! If a couple won't set aside from two to six hours for premarital counseling, I don't want to be "a party to the crime" — because I want to be able to detect if there's the attitude of getting married "more or less" instead of "for better or for worse," and change it if possible — and if not, then discourage them from marrying. I want to be able to warn the "candidates" for marriage that sixteen percent of all divorces occur within the first year of marriage and share with them some "tools" and techniques and guidelines which will help prevent their marriage from ever being one of those kind of statistics.

A book entitled How To Be Happy Though Married is good and has a lot of good suggestions for even good marriages. But the title seems to indicate that it's the exception, rather than the rule, to be happily married. We need to remember that after God had created man alone He said, "It is not good," Genesis 2:18. 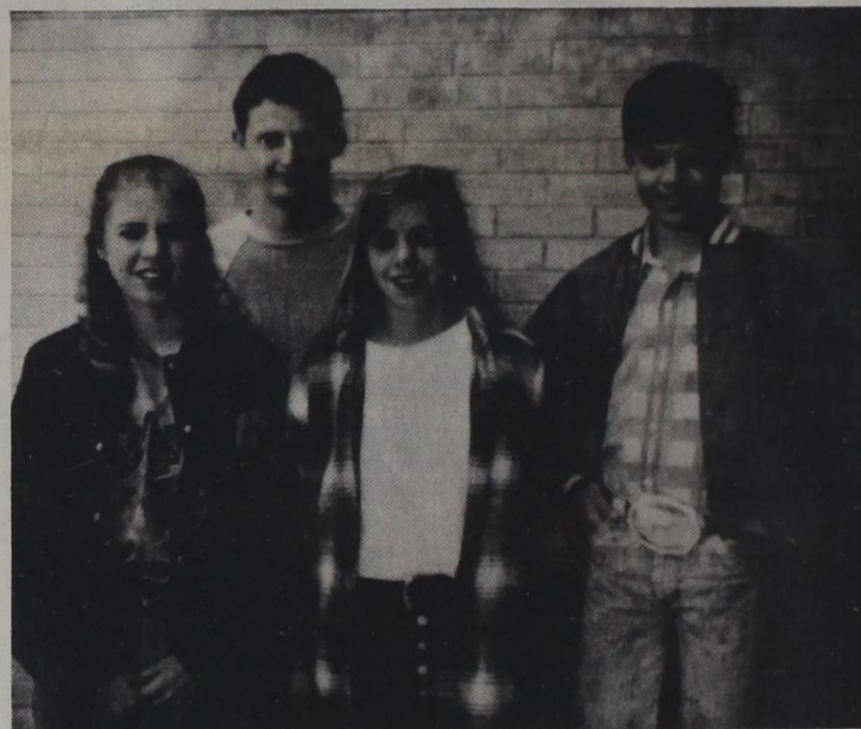

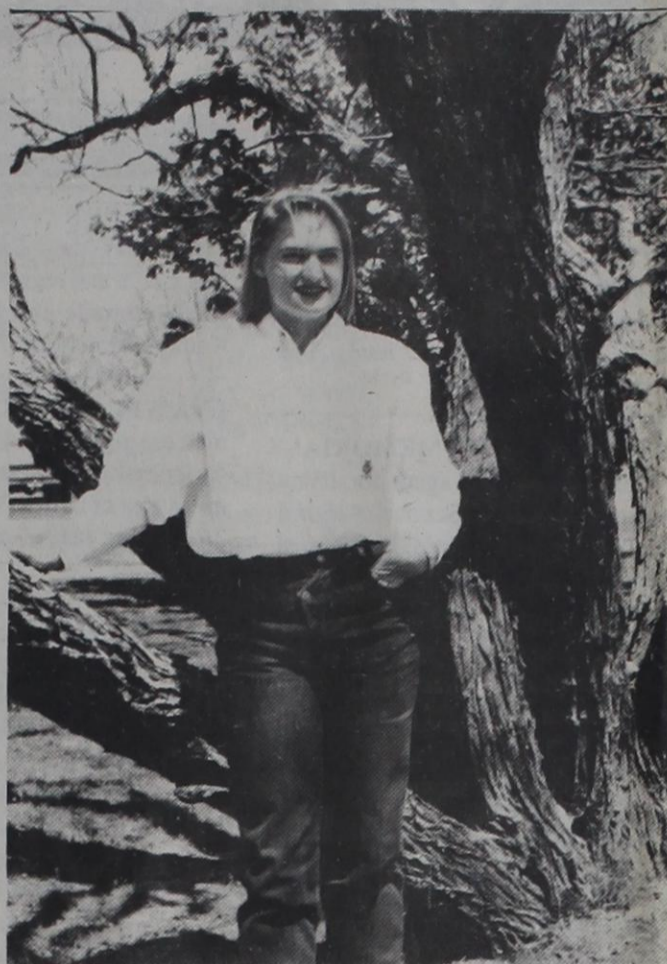

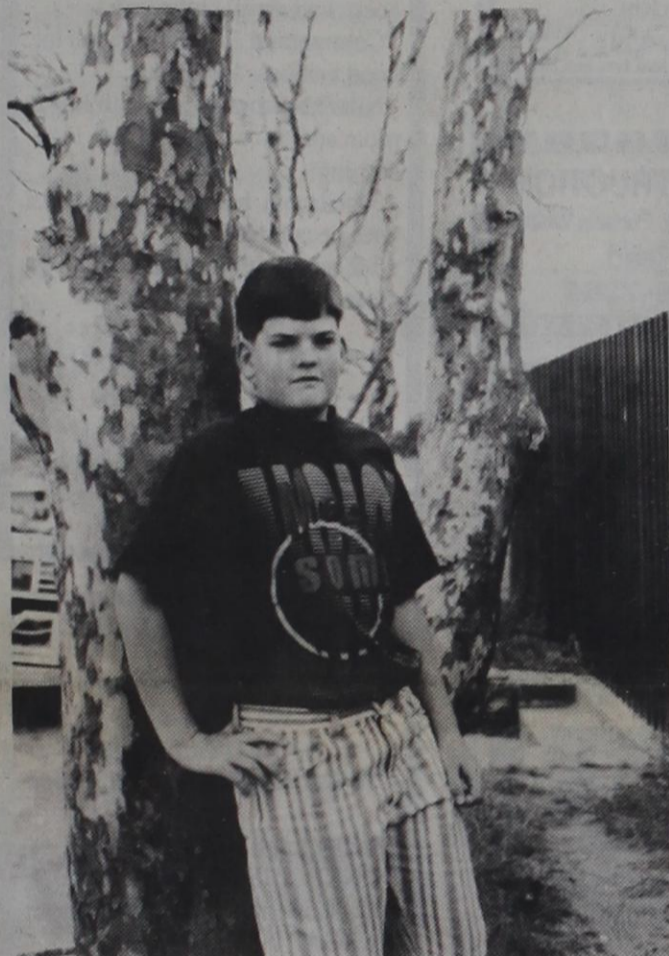

## Special Tax Credit For Low-Income Families Available

By Paunice Oglesby

Millions of low-income families with children aren't claiming the special tax credits, worth up to \$2,500, that they are entitled to. Many workers who miss out on this credit earn so little they had no tax withheld from their paychecks and were not required to file a return. Workers who lost their jobs or only worked part-time may be eligible for this credit.

You may be eligible for this credit if you worked during the year, had at least one child, and your earned income was less than \$23,050.

Working families with wages between \$5,400 and \$13,000 can qualify for a credit of at least \$1,000. There is also additional credit of up to \$321 for a child born in 1993 and another for help to buy health insurance.

The Earned Income Credit was provided to give low-income parents an extra incentive for working and staying off welfare rolls.

Earned Income Credit is the only credit that is refundable. That means it can go to a family whose income is so low that it owes no tax but can receive a refund check of up to \$2,500.

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# FmHA NEWS

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) will begin accepting nominations April 1 for election of area committee members under new rules that make it easier for farmers to qualify as candidates and to vote, Bruce R. Bailey said today.

FmHA county committees perform a variety of duties for the U.S. Department of Agriculture's credit agency, including deciding whether an applicant is eligible for a farm loan.

"One important change broadens the definition of a farmer to anyone who has an interest in a farm in the county as owner, tenant or sharecropper," Bailey said. "The new definition also includes the spouse of an eligible farmer. An old requirement that more than half of the candidate's income must come from the farm operation has been dropped."

"The nominating period has been extended to 45 days from the previous 25 days, thus allowing more opportunity for people to run for the committee," Bailey said. "At least three eligible farmer voters, including the nominee, must sign the petition."

Two of the three committee members are elected by Farmers in the county, and one is appointed by FmHA. One of the elected seats is to be filled for a three-year term at this year's election, which is scheduled for June 30.

"Another important change this year is that one member of the committee can be an active FmHA farm borrower, or be eligible for an FmHA farm loan," Mr. Bailey said. "Previously, this was not allowed."

Anyone interested in running for the committee can obtain a petition and other information from the FmHA county office at 3400-B S. 14th St., Abilene, Texas, Bailey said.

## NOTICE OF RIGHT TO NOMINATE BY PETITION

The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) is accepting nominations for County Committee elections for Taylor, Runnels and Callahan counties. This notice is issued to inform eligible voters of the right to nominate candidates by petition. Copies of the petition and instructions on its completion can be obtained from your local FmHA office.

Persons nominated should have an interest in a farm as an owner, tenant, or sharecropper within the county or area in which activities of the county or area committee are carried out. They must be citizens of the United States or aliens lawfully admitted to the United States for permanent residence, and be well qualified for committee work. Spouses of those persons who meet the eligibility criteria are also eligible for nomination for election to the county committee. Nominations must be received in the Abilene County Office at 3400-B S. 14th St., Abilene, Tx no later than May 19, 1994. FmHA committee elections are open to all eligible voters without regard to race, color, religion, national origin, age, political affiliation, marital status, sex, and/or handicap.
