

### **CROSS PLAINS, CALLAHAN COUNTY, TEXAS 76443**



Eddie Curtis captured 54 percent of the vote to win re-election to the post of Callahan County sheriff from General Election results Tuesday, November 5.

Curtis, the incumbent Democrat, won four of the five voting precincts and 54 percent of the vote to Republican challenger Paul Jaworski. Curtis totalled 693 votes in the county to Jaworski's 583 votes,

Curtis won the Baird, Cross Plains, Putnam and Oplin voting boxes, while Jaworski won the two Clyde and Eula voting boxes.

It appeared from the election results, Curtis can thank the voters in Baird for his victory. Curtis won the Baird box with 69 percent (553 votes) of the vote to Jaworski's 30 percent (240 votes). Curtis also won the Cross Plains box with 61 percent (350 votes) to Jaworski's 38 percent (217 votes).

Although there is not many votes in Putnam, Curtis won the Putnam voting box easily with 68 percent (56 votes) to Jaworski's 31 percent (26 votes).

the Clyde Lions Club. Curtis had 45 percent (367 votes) in the Clyde box.

The Republican challenger captured 58 percent (388 votes) in the Eula voting box to 41 percent (275 votes) for Curtis.

Jaworski barely took the Precinct #6 voting location at Clyde Southside Baptist Church with 53 percent (147 votes). Curtis took 46 percent (130 votes) at the second Clyde box.

Other election returns from Callahan County voters Tuesday Included:

President: Dole/Kemp 58 percent (709 votes) and Clinton/Gore 41 percent (499 votes).

U.S. Senator: Phil Gramm 64 percent (817 votes) and Victor Morales 35 percent (445 votes). U.S. Representative: Rudy Izzard 52 percent (666 votes) and Charles Stenholm 47 percent (598 votes).

Railroad Commissioner: Carole Keeton Rylander 70 percent (847 votes) and Hector Uribe 29 percent (361 votes).

"I'm glad the good Lord, if he did it, shoved me this way."





### **Jim & Fay Gill Celebrated 65 Years of Marriage**

The words of this song come to mind when you think about Jim and Fay Gill who celebrated their 65th wedding anniversary November 6, 1996.

The celebration began November 2, with their family reunion at the ranch with the Gills looking forward to approximately 60 members attending. Then on Sunday, November 3, in the fellowship hall of the First Methodist Church, was an open house for the couple from 3-5 p.m. Let's go back and talk about this couple who married November 6, 1931 in the McCullouch County Brady Courthouse.

"We slipped off after school that day, and got married" they said. It seemed that Whon and Rockwood were having a basketball game, at Rockwood, "So, after everyone left, we drove to Brady (By-passing Rockwood) and got married," said Jim. She was 20 and he was 21.

The beginning of their married life was hard. "With the 1932 Depression and for a number of years following, there was little money, as it was with everyone at that time," said Jim. "We had to struggle for every penny, but we were together and we were determined to work out from under those hard times."

The Gill's moved to Coleman in November 1945. Laughingly Jim said, "We were trying to market cattle all over the country." At one time one of the buyers was writing

and a post script on his letter asked, "Where in the heck is Whon?" Well, we decided we had better move to a place easier to locate for business reasons, so we moved on this ranch, (Located approximately four miles north of the city of Coleman) and never moved again."

Fay was anxious to tell of Jim's leadership, for many years, in the American Poll Hereford Association. She said, "Jim was President of this Association in 1945 and again in 1966." Fay continued "Jim is very et, and not prone to talk a great deal, but when they needed help, or advice, they came to him and he always gave them the leadership they needed. Jim was also in the American Poll Hereford Assoc. "Hall of Fame" and served on the board for 20 years. All the time Fay was talking, Jim was saying, "But, Fay was right there beside me, working with me. Fay was the one who, without money and little help, organized the Pollettes Organization in 1965 in Indiana," Jim continued, "She was asked to form a woman's organization by Orville Sweet, Executive Secretary of the Hereford Assoc. She wrote hundreds of letters and made many calls. And she was their first President." The organization now has grown to be over 1,000 members and is still growing throughout the United States. Jim also said, "Fay borrow money at 5% to buy a calf

"Love and Marriage, Love and and pay back the money when they Marriage, go together like a horse can.' Fay said, "I know of only one case where the money was not paid back. However, this has really helped many young people through the years who were interested in ranching and cattle business."

The Gills have been associated with many celebrities in their work, such as James Stewart and Maureen O'Hara who starred in the film "The Rare Breed," A Story Depicting the History of the Poll Hereford. Jim says, "The breed was founded by B.O. (Bert) Gammon in 1901."

A wall in a room of their ranch home is covered with plaques of honors and shelves holding many trophies that this modest couple have received through the years, working with Poll Herefords.

The Gills have sold cattle to buyers in 42 states, South America, Five Canadian Provinces, Mexico, Brazil, Argentina, Chile, Uruguay and South Africa to mention a few. Their buying, selling cattle and at times, showing grand champions, has reached far and wide.

Fay summed up their life together by saying, "Our whole entire life has been connected and concerned with Poll Hereford cattle. We have had a wonderful life together."

was the first publisher of the Association's first cookbook called "Poll-ette Hostess' and there have been five editions each one with more recipes than the one before. The Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) and the Department of Defense (DoD) have joined forces to track down Persian Gulf War veterans who may have been near Kamisiyak, Iraq, during the period March 4-15, 1991. This unusual, if not unprecedented, partnership has two purposes: to find out more about the health effects of suspected low-level exposure to nerve gas and to assist in efforts to reconstruct events relating to the desctruction by U.S. troops of Iraqi munitions at the end of the Persian Gulf War.

According to recent DoD estimates, 20,800 American soldiers were within 30 miles of the sprawling ammunition storage site in southern Iraq shortly after the Gulf War ended. Evidence that chemical weapons, including the nerve agent sarin, may have been among the munitions destroyed on March 4 and 10 has triggered an intensified effort to reconstruct the events at that time.

In addition, the DoD is investigating the possibility of another detonation at the Kamisiyah complex on March 12, 1991. However, officials say, it is not know if such a demolition occurred or if chemical munitions were involved.

### Ways To Break The Cycle Of **Emotional Abuse**

Emotional abuse is commonly defined as a pattern of behavior that can seriously interfere with a child's positive emotional development. There are ways to begin breaking the cycle of emotional abuse. Here are some suggestions that might be useful: 1. Count to 10 before reacting by screaming when a child misbehaves.

2. Remind yourself that you can handle things. Visualize yourself responding in a calm way so you're not shouting.

3. Words like "stupid", "dummy", "clumsy", "lazy", or other negative labels have no place in a parent's vocabulary.

4. Take a parenting class or join

a parents' support group. There are some very good parenting books on the market.

5. Learn all you can about the development stages of your child. 6. Learn how to reason with your child.

7. Be open to sugg

8. Use time-out. Time-out should equal 1 minute for each year of the child's age. When it is over, it is important to discuss the reasons why he/she was placed in time-out so he can learn the cause and effect of his/her behavior.

9. Treat your children like you

would your friend or neighbor. 10. If you do say something that is harmful or hurtful, don't be afraid to apologize.

and sports and school physicals, along with general health services for all ages.

First Med of Cross Plains will accept Medicare and Medicaid. Same day appointments will be available. Rural health clinics are popping up in greater numbers throughout Texas to handle day-to-day medical needs of the people who live in the area, and in most cases, sorely needed care has finally been made easily accessible.

These clinics typically are not designed to handle life-or-death situations, but they can prevent a lengthy drive to an emergency room, a long wait and costly bills.

In many communities rural health clinics are saving people time, money and worry, bringing healthcare to towns where hospitals' services have dwindlcd.

Now, Texas leads the nation in the number of rural health clinics and those small health practices are enticing physicians and competitive healthcare back to rural areas with federal financial incentives.

Texas has more than 400 rural health clinics now, an eighth of the nation's total. Applications for about 200 more are pending before the Texas Department of Health.

The clinics, such as First Mcd of Cross Plains, are staffed by a fulltime physician assistant and/or a nurse practitioner, with a doctor providing direction and sceing patients at least once a week. Employing these medical extenders, rural health clinics stretch medical dollars further.

healthcare services such as diagnostic, therapeutic, preventive and health maintenance services.

The massive expansion of rural health clinics was prompted by a federal law increasing Medicaid and Medicare payments to rural clinics, and a 1989 state law allowing midlevel practitioners to see patients without a full-time doctor in the office. The federal Rural Health Clinic Act also provides money to recruit physicians to underserved areas.

Rural health clinics, which typically average more than 700 appointments each month, also serve as an economic boost for the community, strengthening pharmacy businesses and bringing customers to local cafes and shops.

The clinics emerged in the late 1970s in response to a healthcare crisis in the Appalachian Mountain regions of the nations. The povertystricken areas had few physicians and fewer hospitals. Medicare and Medicaid, the government healthcare programs for the indigent and elderly, at that time paid reduced fees in rural areas because of lower costs of living. The legislative solution was to raise the reimbursement rate in medicallyunderserved areas and adapt a system modeled after the military. That legislation was introduced by Texas' own former Senator Lloyd Bentsen.

Texas could not participate in the program initially because state law barred PAs and nurse practitioners from practicing without a physician on-site. But from 1985 to 1989, 83 Texas hospitals closed. Since then 71 others have shut down, leaving 61 rural counties without nearby medical care. In 1989 the State Legislature amended Texas' Medical Practices Act, paving the way for the first rural


