Now you know, don't you? Francis Scott Key, the writer of our rational an Now younds like he may have also inspired the inscription on our coins and bills: "In God We Trust." I'm glad that declaration has remained on them. Actually, itseems to me, however, that Mr. Key's statement of the Star-Spangled Banner continuing to wave 0 'er this free land, the home of the brave, is predicated by our REAL TRUST $\frac{\text { in } G o d}{}$ - that itis conditional upon whether or not we continue to really depend upon Him and really believe in $\mathrm{Him}-$-and live like it, individually and as a nation - and not just stamping it on our coins and printing it on our bills!
Stamping and printing "In God We Trust" on our coins and bills does not make
us a God trusting people any more than putting the title "Doctor betore a person's us a God trusting people any more than putting the title "Doctor" before a person's
name makes them a physician, qualified to practice medicine. signed to handle life-or-death situations, but they can prevent a lenglhy drive to an emergency room, a long wait and costly bills.
In many communities rural health
clinics are saving people time, money
and worry, bringing heallucare to
towns where hospitals' services have
dwindled.
Now, Texas leads the nation in the number of rural health clinics and
those small health practices are enticing physicians and competitive healthcare back to rural arcas with federal financial incentives.
Texas has more than 400 rural health clinics now, an cighth of the nation's total. Applications for about
200 more are pending before the 200 more are pending before
Texas Depariment of Health. Texas Depariment of Healu.
The clinics, such as First Med of Cross Plains, are staffed by a fulltime physician assistant and/or a
nurse practitioncr, with a doctor nurse practitioncr, with a doctor

tients at least once a weck. Employing these medical extenders, rural health clinics stretch medical dollars further.
Nurse practitioncrs are a new brecd of nurses in the healthcare industry,
