The library now has approximately 5,000 books, some 40 magazines and periodicals, and subscribes to three daily papers and the Baird Star. Mrs. W. Under Mrs. White's wise guidance, the library has grown rapidly while maintaining a remarkably fine balance in all ten library divisors. 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
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
