A REAL MCCOY Get Set!!!

Descendant of famous feuders says a loose Hatfield sow started it

Cross Plains resident learned the tale from participants

CROSS PLAINS — Henry McCoy isn't exactly fightin' mad, but he is irked about inaccuracies concerning the famous feud that bears his name.

At 94, McCoy wants to set the record straight about the origin of the spat between the Hatfields and the McCoys.

Henry, after all, knows what really started all the fighting.

As a child growing up in West Virginia in the early 1900s, he heard about it first hand from his relatives.

The subject of the Hatfields' and McCoys' ire was pigs.

"I don't care what the rest of them say or what the books say," Henry said. "That whole fuss was over an old sow and some pigs."

According to Henry, who grew up in Pine Town, W. Va., and now lives in Cross Plains, a Hatfield sow repeatedly got loose and ate up one of his relative's cornfields. The McCoy told the Hatfield that if it happened again, he would shoot the sow and the pigs. The Hatfield retorted that he would shoot the McCoy.

The pair lived up to their words, sparking the deadly feud that lasted eight years, Henry said.

"They started fighting and they fought and fought," McCoy said. "That's a pretty big to-do for some hogs, but back in those days, they really fought their battles out."

History remains unclear about why the feud started but shows that three sons of Randolph McCoy stabbed and shot Ellison Hatfield in Pike County, Ky. on August 7, 1882 — an election day. Devil Anse Hatfield, in turn, executed the three McCoys.

Retribution raged.

Henry said the animosity between the two families was so great that when a McCoy boy secretly married a Hatfield girl and her family discovered the fact, they chained the couple to a tree and burned them in disgrace.

Ironically, a later marriage between the two Tug River clans ended the feuding, Henry said.

"In the beginning, they killed each other out so fast that a lot of them

decided to move out of the area — like my Granddad," Henry said. "After a while, he said there weren't no point in getting murdered so he moved on and then came back later to settle and raise his family."

McCoy said the grudges were still there when he was young, but they didn't manifest themselves in killings.

Once when he returned home to West Virginia years later to visit a nephew who lived on the same block as a pair of Hatfields, Henry asked if the proximity of the pair was worrisome.

"He said they didn't ever talk with him, and he wasn't afraid a bit — his gun was sitting right there and it was loaded," Henry said.

In Pine Town, Henry didn't have time or reason to worry about the Hatfields.

By the time he was born, it had been 12 years since tempers had flared between the two families. Henry's involvement was limited to the stories he heard from his mother and other family members.

"I never worried a day in my life about it," Henry said. "They were all just stories to me that really didn't amount to anything. I wouldn't have had time to mess with all of that even if they hadn't just been stories."

Henry denied the luxury of a childhood. His father left before he was born, burdening Henry, his two older brothers, and two older sisters with the difficult task of survival in the isolated West Virginia hill country.

Up until age 11, Henry helped his mother run the hotel where they lived.

By the time he was 12 years old, Henry had found a career in the oil fields. He pipelined, dressed tools, and built derricks.

With the exception of a few ventures into coal mining and farming, Henry has stuck with the oil business ever since, moving to Texas during the Ranger oil boom. Since coming to Texas, he has lived in the Pioneer, Cisco, and Cross Plains areas.

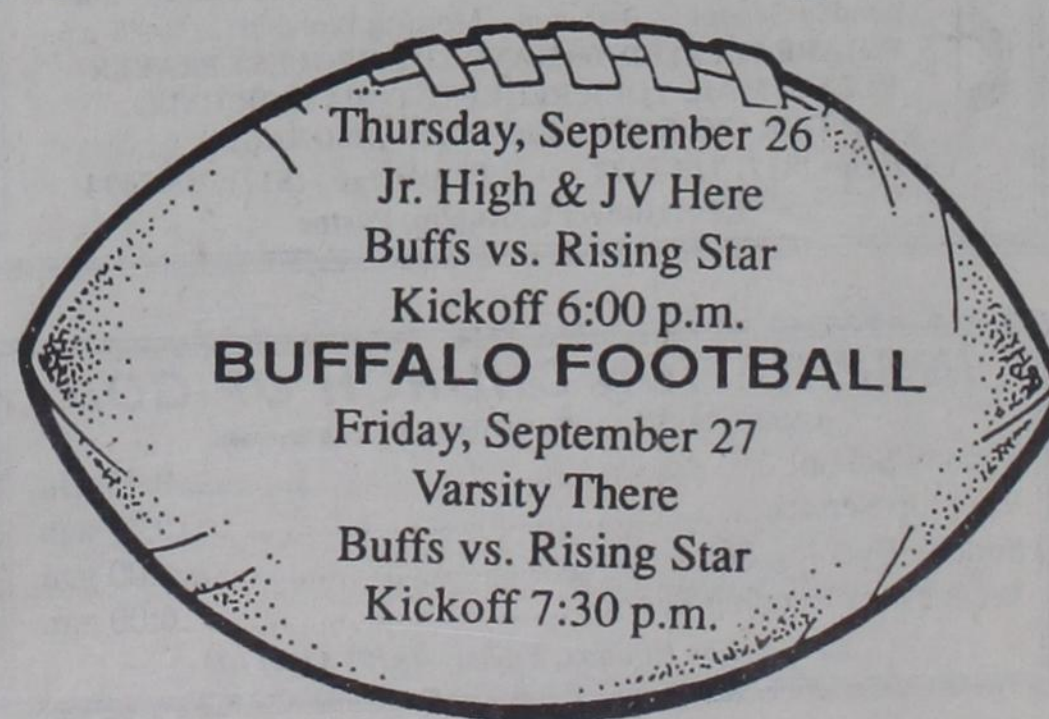

Fred Kelly

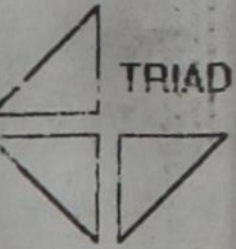

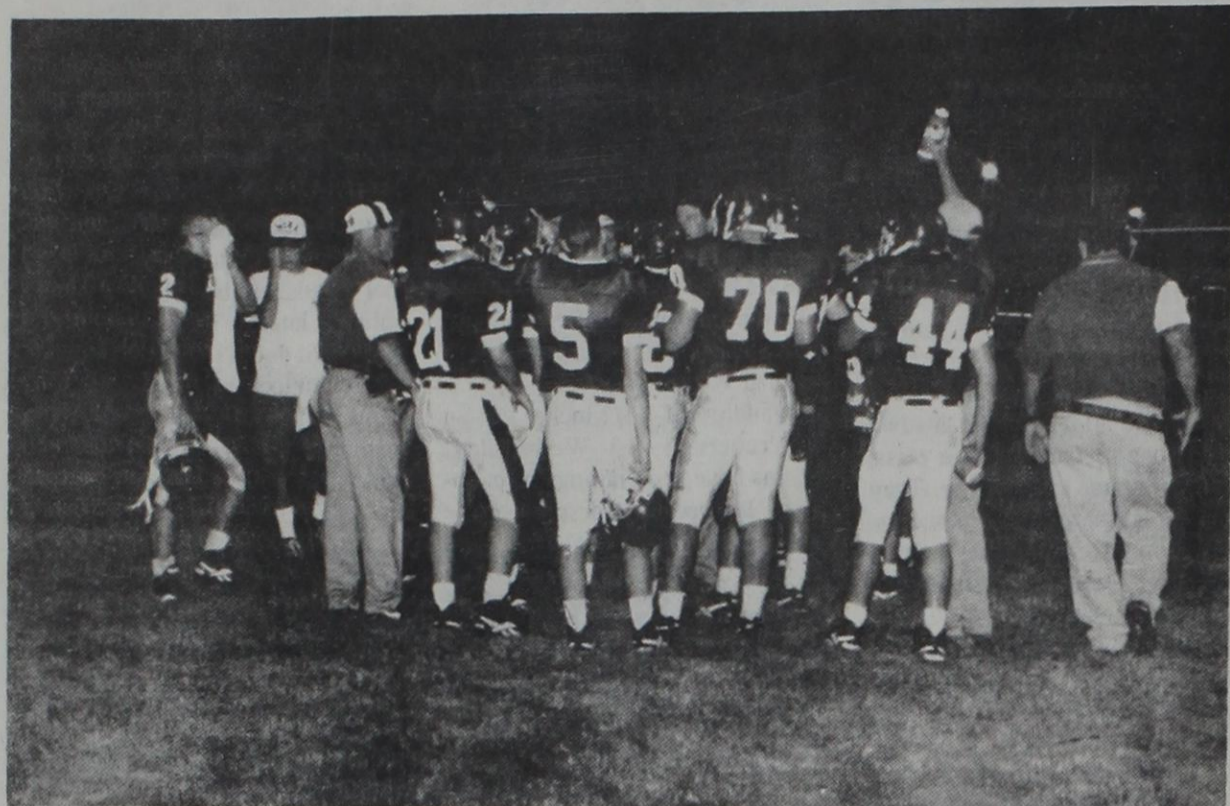

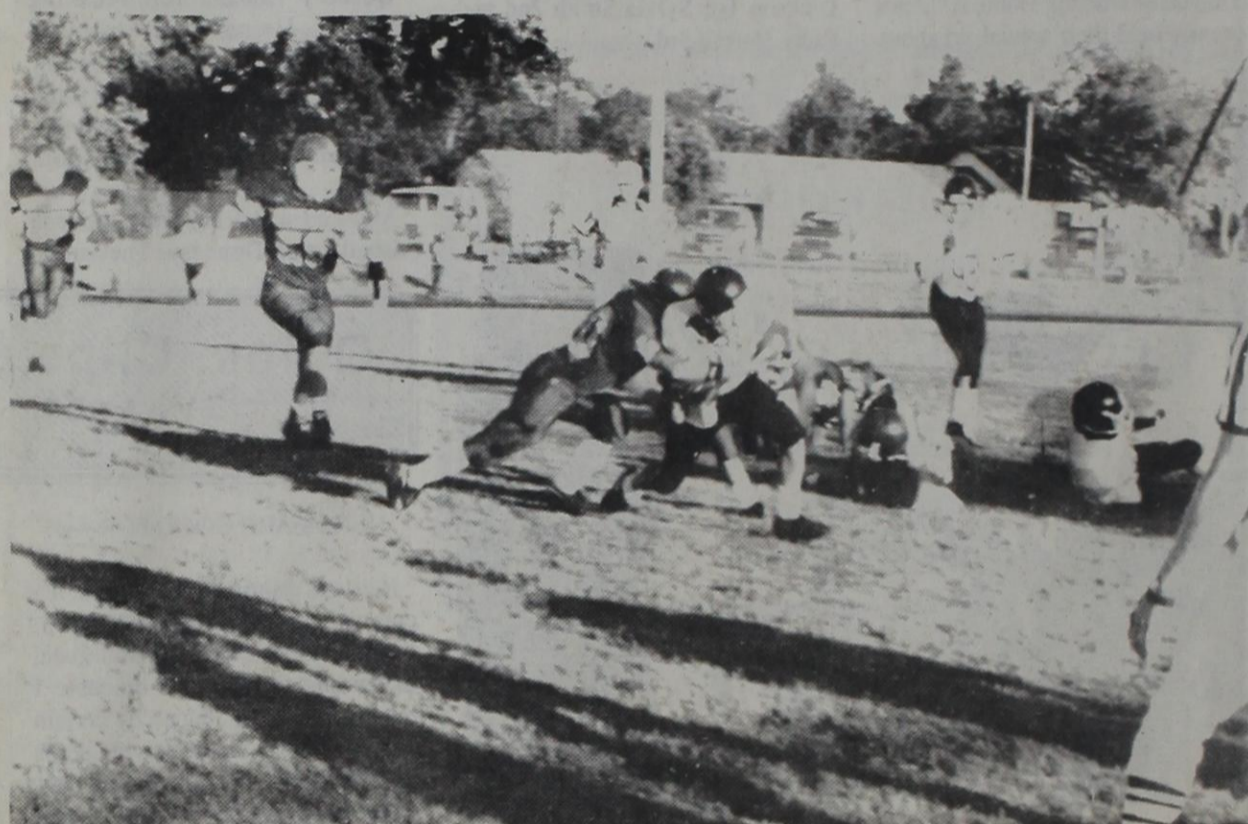

DPS Has Openings For Trooper-Trainees

The Texas Department of Public Safety is seeking applicants for a recruit school scheduled to begin January 7, 1997. Persons who successfully complete the rigorous six-month recruit training academy in Austin will join one of the country's premier law enforcement agencies.

"We're encouraging all persons interested in a career with the DPS to go by their nearest DPS office and get a complete application package and a list of all the qualifications," said Lt. Curley Colquitt, who heads the DPS' recruitment effort. "The DPS is very interested in attracting qualified female and minority applicants, since historically those groups have been underrepresented in law enforcement," he said. "DPS offers a challenging and rewarding law enforcement career."

Graduates of the school initially are assigned to one of the uniform services of the Department -- Highway Patrol License and Weight or Driver License Service. After gaining experience, the trooper can apply for promotions within those or other areas of the DPS.

Applicants must be at least 20 years old on the date of probationary appointment to the position of trooper-trainee and be of good moral character and habits. Applicants must have at least 60 hours of college (prior law enforcement or military experience may be substituted for some or all college requirements). A final conviction (including probation) for any DWI, DUID, or felony automatically will disqualify applicants. Both oral and written statements given during the application process will be verified for accuracy.

Those selected for the recruit school will be required to successfully complete psychological testing, physical examinations, drug screening, and additional physical demands. Their character, habits, previous employment, and other factors also will come under scrutiny.

Applications will be accepted through October 11 from out-of-state and through October 25 from Texas residents. For more information, contact your nearest DPS office.

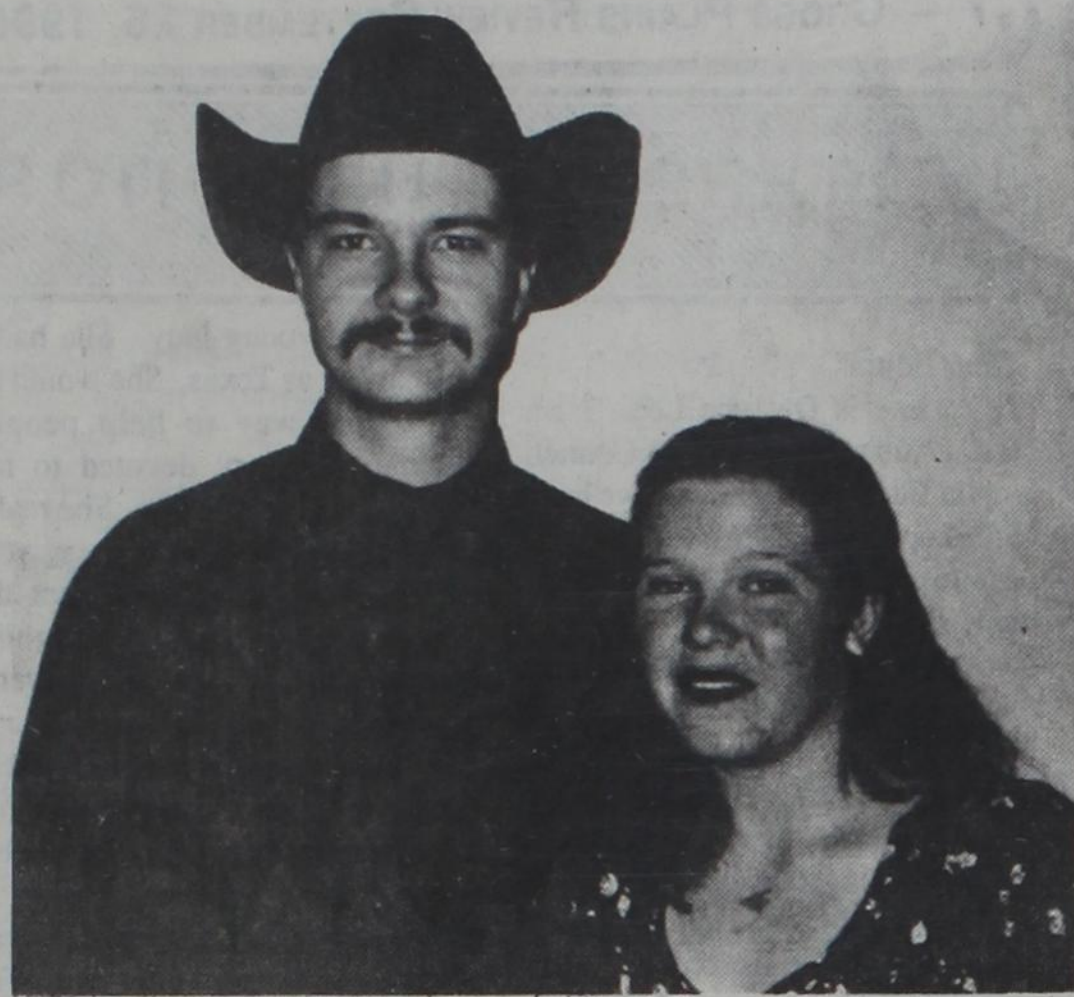
