Cross Plains Site Of Second Robbery

Tuesday, June 7, Neal Drug was the location of yet another aggravated robbery locally. At approximately 5:50 p.m. the suspect entered the front door of Neal Drug.

The man announced to Ike Neal, the owner and pharmacist, that this was a hold up and showed him a gun. He handed him a plastic bag which he instructed him to fill with specific drugs. After taking the drugs, the man marched Penny Neal to the cash register

under gun point. He demanded her to empty the register. He also requested that she remove the telephone receiver. Something distracted him and the telephone was never disconnected.

At this point he forced the couple to the back of the store and instructed them to lie face down. He exited through the back door where a getaway car awaited.

Eula Deputy Is Not Stationed

A Callahan County sheriff's deputy has not yet been stationed in the Eula area, county sheriff Bill Skinner said Monday.

Skinner said that the deputy has not been positioned in the area because a suitable rental house has not been located. "We're (sheriff's department) ready to put a deputy out there," Skinner said. The county sheriff said he is looking for a three bedroom residence in the Eula, Dudley, and Oplin area of the county to station the new sheriff's deputy. Skinner said he would prefer the residence to be located around State Highway 36 and FM 603. If any county resident knows of rental property in

the area, they can contact the sheriff's office at 854-1444.

Callahan County Commissioners voted March 28 to authorize sheriff Skinner to place a sheriff's deputy in the southwest portion of the county. Several groups of residents from that portion of the county have met with county commissioners during the past several years requesting a deputy be stationed there. Burglaries in that area continue to occur at an alarming rate.

When the Eula sheriff's deputy was approved, county commissioners did away with the office of county special investigator. The office of special investigator had been recently added to assist the county attorney in criminal cases.

Skinner said that Cross Plains deputy Wendell Kelly will be stationed at Eula and Wayne Knowles will become the new Cross Plains deputy.

Including the new deputy, Callahan County will have deputies stationed in Clyde, Baird, Cross Plains, and Eula.

Crime Stoppers Moving Forward

Directors of the Cross Plains Crime Stoppers met Monday, June 6, at the Citizens State Bank to finalize more organizational details.

Justice of the Peace Rolan Jones, Co-ordinator, presented a tape recording of a police lieutenant from Port Aransas which offered many helpful suggestions in the areas of fund raisers and publicity.

Wimpy McCoy, Chairman of the Board of Directors, presented a full agenda beginning with the approval of the Cross Plains Crime Stoppers By-laws. Brad Harris stated that the articles were complete, and Susan Schaefer reported that the IRS request for a non-profit tax number was mailed June 7.

There was thorough discussion of grants available for training sessions for directors. The next training program scheduled is July 27 in Arlington and hopefully a representative from the local group will be able to attend. Jones is planning to participate.

McCoy noted that acknowledgement cards for donations in memory of loved ones needed to be prepared, and everyone voted in favor of the action.

Jones presented a copy of the information sheets to be used when calls come in, and explained the code numbering system. Discussion of the numbering system ended with an appropriate method.

The directors voted to maintain a "Quick \$50" phase in which any person's telephone tips that led to the recovery of stolen property or felony arrest would receive 10 percent of the value of the recovered property up to \$50 and the balance upon conviction. It was felt that this would encourage more to participate in Crime Stoppers.

Crime Stoppers would like to emphasize the fact that if anyone is uncomfortable about calling the local Crime Stoppers number due to the possibility of a voice being recognized, please call the Austin number. There would be no possibility of anyone recognizing your voice and the information you possess may be invaluable.

Jim Cook is the head of the committee to determine the amount of reward each case will merit.

It was established that \$2,500

should be the initial goal to maintain in the Crime Stoppers reward fund. The program will begin prior to reaching this amount, but it will be needed to keep the program active and strong.

Publicity was discussed and all were in agreement that the local newspaper, area radio stations, and Channel 12 Television should be used to promote Crime Stoppers. The crime of the

week will appear in the *Cross Plains Review*, and be aired on KPSM in Brownwood, and the possibility of KSTA in Coleman, and KVMX in Eastland. Cindy Wood of Rising Star was helpful in placing information on Channel 12.

The meeting was adjourned after making a great deal of progress toward the initial goal.

GARDEN TIPS FROM THE Cross Plains Garden Club

A few simple hints to help cut flowers last longer: select those flowers that are not yet fully open, cutting them in early morning or late afternoon; use a sharp knife or garden shears to make a clean cut; remove foliage from any part of the stems that will be submerged, and place stems in a clean container of warm water.

If you will not be using the cut flowers right away, store them in the refrigerator when the water reaches room temperature. If possible, change the water every two or three days, and then snip another 1/2 to 1 inch off each stem.

When it is time to water the yard or garden, don't skip — always water thoroughly. This encourages roots to penetrate deeply into the soil, increasing drought resistance. Water slowly so the moisture soaks in instead of running off. Drip irrigation systems and soaker hoses supply a slow, steady flow of water directly to the soil, minimizing evaporation and runoff.

If possible, water in the morning so plants have sufficient moisture during the heat of the day. Excess water will be gone by evening, when the combination of moisture, heat, and darkness creates a favorable environment for disease. Try to avoid watering at midday because at this time evaporation rates are highest and leaf scorch may occur.

To remove odors from smelly bottles, pour a little hot water with a generous pinch of mustard powder. Shake and let stand overnight. Then rinse with hot water.

Ehrlichiosis On The Increase

A relatively new disease, Ehrlichiosis, is being diagnosed more frequently in the Callahan County area. Although Canine Ehrlichiosis was once considered to be a rare entity in this area and in the United States, recent evidence suggest the disease is on the increase. Since the disease is transmitted primarily by ticks and considering the severe tick infestations, it is anticipated that more cases of Ehrlichia will be diagnosed.

The progression of Canine Ehrlichiosis has been shown to consist of an incubation period of one to three weeks, an acute phase of four to six weeks and a chronic phase which may last indefinitely or until death. One should suspect this disease if a wild or domestic dog is severely infested with ticks and is feble, anemic, weak or exhibiting a nose bleed. A low grade pneumonia with weight loss may be seen in chronic stages. If death occurs it is normally from depletion of clotting factors and hemorrhage or secondary infections from exhausted bone marrow activity.

In suspected cases of Ehrlichia, good supportive care such as fluid therapy, proper nutrition, antibiotics, and vitamins are necessary. In extreme cases, blood transfusions may be the treatment of choice. The Veterinary Diagnostic Lab at Texas A&M can confirm the infection, but in most cases it takes 5-7 days.

Dogs treated successfully for Ehrlichiosis are fully susceptible to reinfection. Strict tick control measures are necessary to eliminate this major natural reservoir.

FmHA Issues Proposed New Lending Rules

Proposed rules, which could assist hundreds of farmers who are behind on their Farmers Home Administration loans, were issued today, according to FmHA Texas State Director J. Lynn Futch.

The new regulations will carry out portions of the Agricultural Credit Act passed by Congress last December. "There will be a 30 day comment period and additional time for any appropriate changes before the regulations become effective," Futch said.

One of the changes would allow FmHA to reduce the delinquent debt of certain borrowers to help them stay in business. There are approximately 5,000 delinquent borrowers in Texas, many of whom should be assisted with this Program once implemented.

In related actions, the Agency also issued proposed regulations to:

- * Make it easier for farmers or their families to lease or buy back homesteads that have been lost through foreclosure or conveyance;

- * Set up a program to help members of minority and socially disadvantaged groups to purchase farmland and develop an outreach program to carry it out;

- * Establish a new administrative appeals unit distinct from the rest of the Agency to handle borrower grievances;

- * Certify and participate in state mediation programs.

Low-income households may be eligible for energy assistance

AUSTIN—Some low-income Texans may be eligible for help in paying cooling bills this summer through the Home Energy Assistance Program, according to Texas Department of Human Services Commissioner Marlin Johnston.

Johnston said the one-time payment is available to many low-income households. Applications for energy assistance were mailed to households that received food stamps, Aid to Families with Dependent Children, or Supplemental Security Income in May. If those households have at least one member who will be 60 or older in 1988 or a member with a medical condition that is aggravated by heat, they may qualify for assistance. Other low-income individuals may request an application from local DHS offices during the enrollment period of June 15 through July 19.

Eligibility is limited by gross income and resources. This year, because of budget cuts and participation rates, the benefits for the cooling program may be lower than last year's. Aid is available for a one-person household having less than \$589.49 gross income per month. The gross income limits are \$781.49 for households of two persons, \$973.49 for three, \$1,165.49 for four, \$1,357.49 for five, and \$1,549.49 for six.

Households are eligible if the cost for cooling is included in the rent payment or if the household pays a portion of its home energy costs.

Energy assistance checks are sent directly to the people who are eligible for assistance. However, the checks are made payable to the energy company.

Persons receiving one of these energy assistance checks should mail it or take it in person to the energy company business office with their regular energy bill. The check can be cashed only by the energy company. If the HEAP check is more than the energy bill, the additional amount will be credited to the person's account for the next month's bill. If the energy bill is higher than the check, the person is responsible for paying the difference.

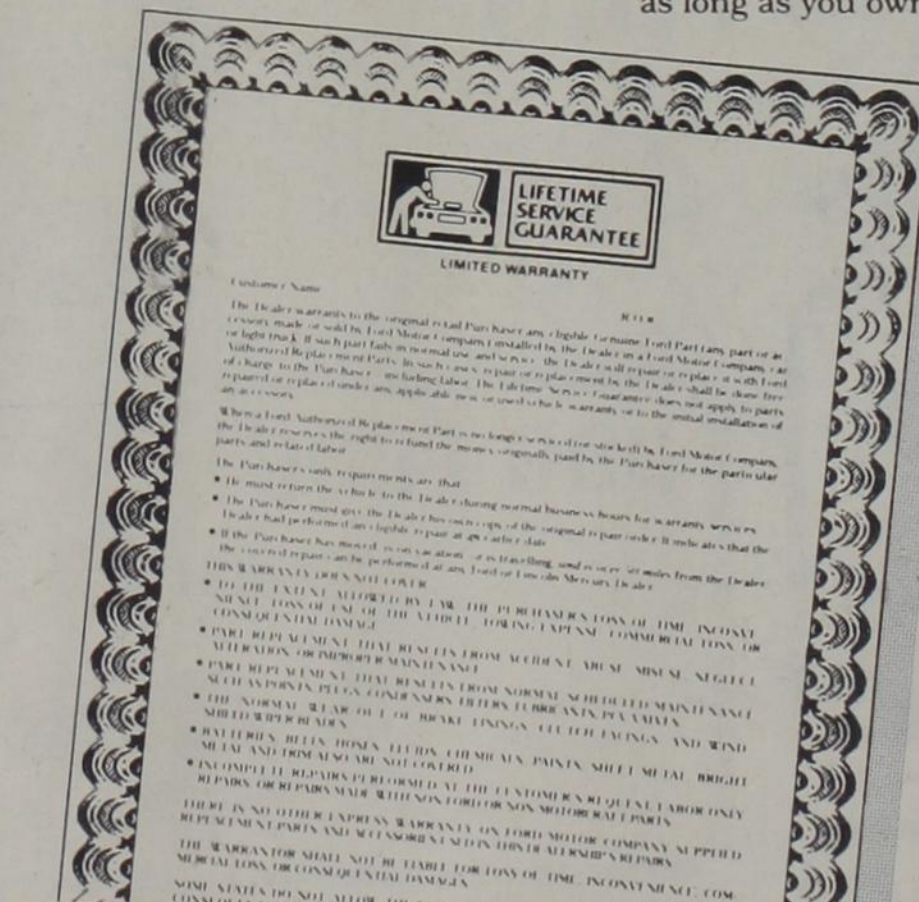

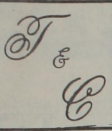

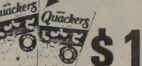
