## Elementary Teacher Retires After 35 Years Of Service

Upon entering Marie Stambaugh's fourth grade room, she asked, "Do you remember walking into my class some 30 years ago?" And yes, I most certainly did recall the classroom on the second story of the old high school building. What fun climbing up the stairs and making all the noise. The floor was built on a slant, which caused some problems — especially if you dropped your pencil. It would roll all the way to the back of the room.

She stirred some good memories which I know many of you as past students, will also recall. It just so happens that my graduating class of 1967 was Mrs. Stambaugh's first class at Cross Plains. This was the beginning of 30 years of teaching fourth grade students. The other five years of her career were at the Cross Cut School.

I asked her if she always wanted to be a teacher, and she replied, "I remember writing a paper in high school about ambitions to teach, so I always knew what I wanted to be." She went on to state that teaching had been a satisfying job and she never had any regrets for choosing the field.

She received her Bachelor of Arts Degree at Howard Payne University, and in 1962 she received her Master's Degree. She has always been a member of the Texas State Teachers Association and plans to remain active in the organization after retirement.

"The greatest rewards of the teaching profession are watching boys and girls accept their Christian citizenship in society," she remarked. Many students have taken their places in the world in measures of success and happiness, and she was honored to have been a small part in the development of their lives. It is her opinion that the most valuable resource we have today is the children.

Mrs. Stambaugh has always strived to teach morals, courtesies, honesty, integrity, obedience, and dependability along with the school curriculum. She stressed the importance of retaining educational material and mastering subjects, due to a highly competitive world. "Students must be prepared." she said.

When I questioned her as to the changes she had noted in both children and parents, she stated, "Kids are kids and they always will be. They are still doing the same things they have always done." As far as parents are concerned, they have always been very kind.

She emphasized a fine fellowship with the administrative school personnel, faculty, and students. Her

teaching career had been very pleasant and enjoyable and she was thankful for

The most traumatic event was the burning of the old elementary school building in 1972. The loss of Jack Watkins, the principal, the very same week was overpowering.

She told me how that Dr. Frances Merritt and Miss Myrtle Brick brought books to the First Baptist Church, where temporary classrooms were established. Bro: Brooks and Ora Breeding showed a great deal of understanding and kindness to the students, according to Mrs. Stambaugh. The tables were put up on Monday and taken down on Friday for church services. Not a day of school was missed.

Speaking of days missed, Mrs. Stambaugh holds quite a record herself. She has only missed two days of school due to illness throughout the 35-year span.

Just one of the highlights of her career include the terrific record her picture memory teams have maintained. They have finished with top honors in every competition. This year's team turned in five perfect papers. This is just one example of the incentive she can motivate.

For those of you who do not know Marie Stambaugh on a personal basis, this brief story will make it clear to her compassion. The day that I interviewed with her, she received a note from an ex-student who had learned of her retirement plans. He stated that he was grateful for her understanding and for "giving him a chance."

That little note made it all worthwhile. She has always been a complimentary and positive influence on her students. I have never talked with her that she didn't make me feel better about myself.

about to end as she embarks upon earlier meeting had been cancelled. another adventure. She stated, "I just felt like this was the right time to retire." She told me that it would definitely be a busy time, because she couldn't stand to do nothing. The first thing she planned was to teach Vacation Bible School the next week after school.

Her husband, Roy, retired from the 3M Company in September of 1987 and is active as a stock farmer. The couple also share a woodwork hobby.

Cross Plains Elementary is sure to miss the smiling face of this dedicated teacher. She has touched all the lives of her students, and what greater satisfaction could be gained.

Many wishes of happiness are extended to Mrs. Stambaugh upon her retirement.

6. Auxiliary personnel were approved for 1988-89 school year.

7. Mrs. Robbye Fullen was offered one year contract for the 88-89 school year. She will be teaching in high school.

1. The State TEAMS report was given to the board for the 1987-88 Junior Class. Students that did not master all areas in the exam have been given the opportunity for extra tutoring. The test was given again in late spring of this year and will be given in the fall of 1988. Any student that does not pass the exam will not be permitted to graduate from high school. There is no limit to the number of times a student may take the exam.

2. The proposed guidance plan was presented to the board for deleting the old plan and replacing it with the new one. After a brief discussion, the proposed plan was approved as presented.

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#### Retail Sales Up Slightly In County

Retail sales in Clyde remain slightly ahead of last year's sales totals, according to city sales tax figures released May 6 by state comptroller Bob Bullock.

Bullock's office said that sales in Clyde are running 8.84 percent ahead of 1987, according to his one percent city sales tax totals.

The City of Clyde has received \$35,922.71 so far in 1988 for the one percent sales tax levy. The town received \$33,004.05 in 1987, according to the comptroller.

The town's monthly rebate check from the state was also ahead of the monthly payment in the prior year. Clyde got a check for \$11,808.04 for May 1988, while the May 1987 check was \$9.940.33

The town of Cross Plains is the only county town showing sales this year behind last year, according to Bullock. Sales in Cross Plains are .28 percent behind last year, with \$17,017.27 reported in the one percent sales tax in 1988 and 1987 sales tax rebates reported as \$17,065.35.

The town's monthly payment from the state was also lower than the same month in the prior year. The check for May 1988 was listed as \$4,306.58 and the May 1987 check to the city was \$4,952.63.

The town of Baird is reporting sales 8.54 percent ahead of last year. The town lists sales tax rebates of \$15,087.13 so far in 1988, while \$13,899.95 was reported by the comptroller in 1987.

The city's one percent rebate for the month of May was slightly higher than the check in the same month last year. The town received tax collections of \$6,137.82 in May 1988 and \$5,193.50 in rebates for May 1987.

Putnam's tax collections for the year are .91 percent ahead of last year, with \$4,624.62 reported collected so far in 1988 and \$4,582.74 reported in 1987. The town's collections for the month of

May include: \$1,038.06 in May 1988 and \$1,132.56 in May 1987.

Countywide, sales are reported to be 5.98 ahead of last year, if the sales tax collections are any indication.

"The economy of Texas is recovering," Bullock said, " and the consumer confidence is reflected in the rebates going to local governments."

Statewide, sales tax collections for 1988 are running 8.46 percent ahead of 1987.

May's checks to the cities in Texas represent taxes collected by monthly filers in March and quarterly filers for the first quarter that were reported to the comptroller's office by April 21.




