## Robbie Wheeler Heads For State Pole Vaulting Competition

For the first time in several years, Cross Plains will have a participant in the U.I.L. State Track Meet in Austin. Robbie Wheeler qualified for the state meet by finishing second in the Regional Track Meet held last weekend in Abilene.

Robbie's 14'0" vault was second to a boy from Roscoe Highland at 14'6". Robbie will compete in a State Qualifier Meet this weekend in Temple.

Other athletes to place at the

Regional Meet includes Curtis Wyatt, 3rd in the 110 Hurdles at 16.27, and Chris Brown, 4th in the Discus at 137'11". Cross Plains also had several other athletes in the meet but did not place. 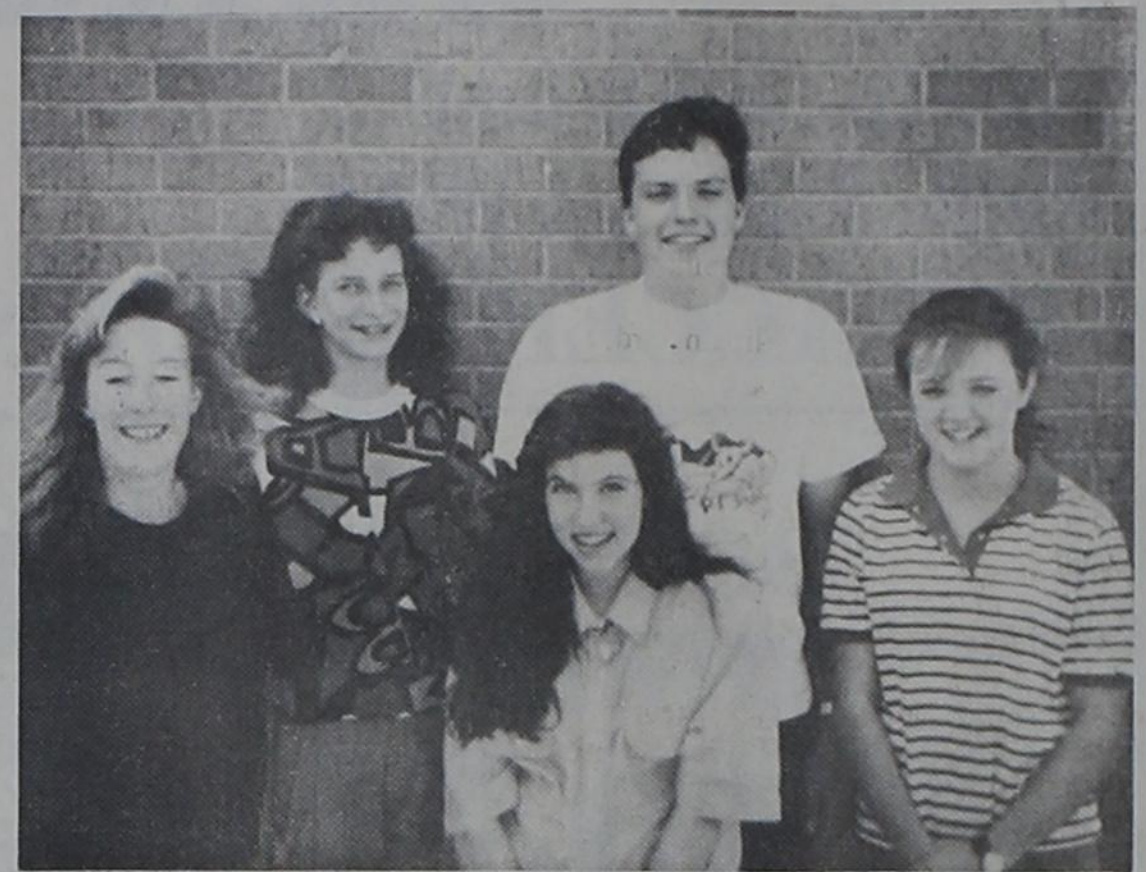

But many others are not that for-

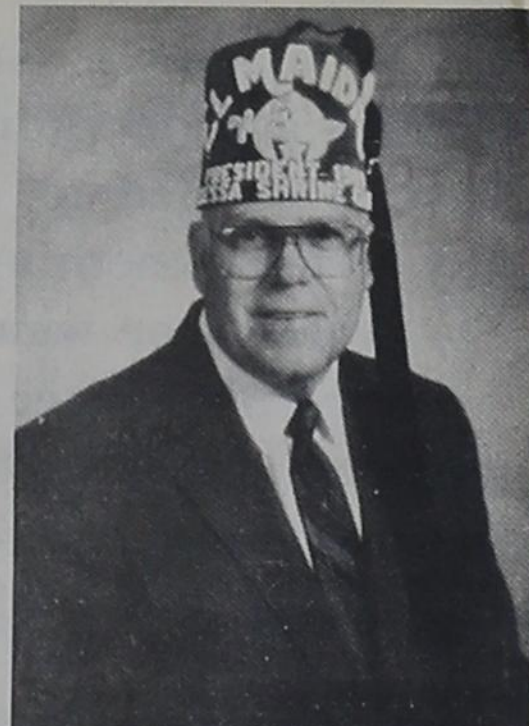
tunate. They live alone and have little contact with others. If they become ill or unable to function independently, they can easily go unnoticed and unattended. According to Churchill, the Gatekeeper Program seeks to help remedy the problem by using meter readers and other customer service representatives who may have contact with the elderly in the normal course of their jobs.

Nancy Johnson, WTU supervisor of residential audit services, recently conducted training sessions for those employees throughout the company's 52 county service area. The training taught the Gatekeepers to recognize certain signals in the elderly such as a change in appearance or behavior, or signs of confusion or disability.

When the employee sees a warning sign, the local agency for the aging is contacted. The agency takes it from there.

They contact the elderly person, assess their needs, and get whatever help is required from the appropriate health or social service organization. This may include medical care, food preparation or delivery, help with household chores, transportation, or other services.

In discussing the company's reasons for participating in this nationally recognized program, Churchill pointed out that it is a logical extension of what company employees do in their normal line of work. He added "the Gatekeeper Program is a way to help our neighbors, customers and friends."

## STRAIGHT TALK FROM TDA

If you're one of those people who have wasted time and money trying to control mosquitoes after they've reached the flying stage, it's time for you to take a closer look at the situation.

When you think about it, the real source of your mosquito problem isn't the hordes of adult mosquitoes hovering around your patio. It's the standing water where mosquitoes breed around your house and in your neighborhood.

Look carefully at the water in your birdbath or rain gauge. You may see hundreds of "wrigglers," the larval stage of the mosquito. It doesn't hurt to state the obvious. Empty standing water regularly, and you'll keep mosquitoes from reaching adulthood, the stage of their lives when they fly and bite.

**The Solution Is Near at Hand.** Chances are very good that the mosquitoes biting you were born within a few yards of where you were bitten. Watering cans, buckets, clogged roof gutters, saucers under potted plants, old tires and plastic wading pools are just a few of the potential mosquito maternity wards around your home. Even such minute sources as water in vases provide safe places for female mosquitoes to lay their eggs.

Once found, these seemingly harmless water collectors should be emptied, removed or turned upside down. Cut old tires in half or puncture them to let water drain out. Remove standing water as often as possible, since it only takes from 5 to 10 days for a mosquito egg to turn into a hungry adult. (Even then, only the females go looking for blood, to get the protein needed to produce eggs.)

**Community Actions.** What works in your back yard can also work throughout your neighborhood. You may want to consider lowering the mosquito population over several square blocks by organizing a neighborhood survey of mosquito-breeding sites.

People are always surprised at how

many previously unnoticed pools and puddles of standing water, such as water in tree holes, these surveys turn up.

**Denying Entry.** Keeping mosquitoes out of your house is as simple as closing all the "mosquito doors." Make sure your window and door screens are in good repair. Small holes or tears can be mended with clear caulk. Screens should fit tightly and be inspected once a year. Soft, removable caulk closes gaps around windows, and weather-stripping seals around doors.

If you have an ornamental pond, there are a couple of ways you can enjoy it without contributing to a mosquito population explosion.

The first, most natural way is to add to the pond a few mosquito-eating fish, such as *Gambusia* or goldfish. Another non-toxic mosquito control that works in both man-made and natural ponds is a parasite called *Bacillus thuringiensis israelensis*, or BTI for short. BTI is lethal to mosquitoes, but harmless to most other aquatic species. It is commercially available at agricultural supply stores under the names Tecknar, Bactimos, Vectoba and Mosquito Attack. BTI is more expensive than other products, but it is less toxic and more selective, so it damages the environment less.

Repellents are the final line of defense against mosquitoes. The most widely sold repellents contain "Deet" (short for diethyltoluamide), which works well. Whenever possible, apply repellents to your clothing instead of directly onto your skin, to minimize absorption into your body.

If you are chemically sensitive or prefer not to use chemical mosquito repellents, an alternative home remedy might work for you. Pennyroyal, eucalyptus, cedar and citronella oils are the traditional non-chemical choices.

## Replica Of Vietnam Memorial Being Displayed In Texas

According to Putt Brandon, Veterans County Service Officer for Callahan County, The Moving Wall, the half scale replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C., is visiting several sites in Texas during 1989. The Moving Wall has already been in Pilot Point and Lubbock and is scheduled for visits in Hermann Park, Houston, from May 25 through May 31, and in the Old Settlers Park in Palm Valley, Round Rock, from September 6 through September 12.

The concept of building the Moving Wall grew out of discussions by John Devitt, Gerry Haver and Norris Shears, Vietnam veterans from California, concerned with what they might possibly do to somehow "keep alive" and share the power and good that Devitt had experienced while attending the dedication of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington, D.C. At first, it was decided to build a replica and display it on the West Coast so that people who lived so far from the Capitol might have a chance to experience the Wall. While in Washington, D.C., in February, 1983, Devitt was explaining his project to several other veterans. When asked if the replica was to be portable,

John simply nodded and, not wanting any "negatives" attached to the project, replied in the affirmative.

Construction on The Moving Wall, which is 252.83 feet long, was begun in February, 1983, and completed in October, 1984. The Wall's first showing was in Tyler, Texas, on October 11, 1984, and has been in 10 other Texas cities since then.

# Public Meeting Set For Govt. Trapper

Callahan County Commissioners, in a regular meeting Monday, April 24, voted to hold a public meeting for county farmers input in providing a government trapper for Callahan County.

Commissioners, after discussing the possibility of hiring a trapper for the past several months, decided that a public meeting would be the possible solution. The public hearing will focus on establishing a Predator Cooperative Program in the county.

The public meeting is slated for Tuesday, May 16, at 8 p.m. in the District Courtroom in the county courthouse in Baird.

At the commissioners' court meeting, Ben Riley, in charge of the government trapping program in the area, met to discuss hiring a trapper

for Callahan County. Riley told commissioners due to government fund cut-backs, there is no trapper available for the county.

Commissioners have been discussing the hiring of a trapper after receiving complaints of wild animals killing livestock in the county.

Other items brought before commissioners' court include:

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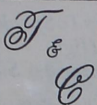
