many. He had written his manuscript of the war.
In late 1942 Clovis was inducted into the United States Army at Camp Walters at Mineral Wells. Following a short period, he transferred to the Ar-
my Air Corp where he served as a my Air Corp where he served as a echnical Sergeant and radio gunner
operator. He was a part of a B-17 with a crew of ten men. After completing 175 hours training, this crew in a new
B-17 was sent to Italy in March 1944 B-17 was sent to Italy in March 1944
with the 15th Air Force 463 Bomb with the 15 th Air Force 463 Bomb
Group, 772 Bomb Squadron located at Celone Field, Italy.
The crew named their new plane Hairless Joe. The crew flew 37 bomb
