## ANOTHER MOVE STARTED FOR CO. ROAD BOND ISSUE

The Highway Committee of the Baird Chamber of Commerce met with Commissioner Geo. Clifton and a number of representative citizens of this community at the First State Bank in Cross Plains Friday of last week and conferred with them concerning the proposed county-wide road bond issue for the purpose of securing an extension, or linking up a State highway, the desired route of which will pass through somewhere near the central division of the county, and for the further purpose of building a number of lateral roads leading to points on this main highway. The visiting committee, representing the Baird Chamber of Commerce, was composed of Judge B. L. Russell, chairman; W. S. Hinds, T. E. Powell, L. L. Blackburn, B. L. Boydston and James C. Asbury, secretary of the Baird Chamber of Commerce. Their views, together with suggested routing of the State highway and lateral system were made clear to the Cross Plains members of the meetings, and the matter

was left with them for further consideration pending another meeting which will be held at Baird on Thursday night of this week.

With preference for a more immediate service, convenience and less expense the people of Cross Plains and this community, in cooperation with the people of Putnam and the Cottonwood community, have for some time been chiefly interested in the building of a good graveled surface road from this point to Putnam, and the application of a gravel surface on the new road leading west from Cross Plains to Oplin. This interest may be diverted to the county-wide program following a better understanding of the proposition. The Review will withhold comment on the move, or its views on the big bond issue until after the Baird meeting.

### A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court.—

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2 and 3 of Article 5 of the Constitution of State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Article 5. Section 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; in other matters, until otherwise provided by Law, the jurisdiction of the Court shall be exercised under such regulations and orders as the Court by a majority vote may prescribe. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this State and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a judge of a court, or such lawyer and judge together at least seven years. Said Chief Justice and Associate Justices shall be elected by the qualified voters of the State at a general election, shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified, and shall receive such compensation as may be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for State officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by the qualified voters of the State. The Judges of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. When this amendment takes effect, the Governor shall immediately appoint six additional Associate Justices of the Supreme Court for terms of office so that the terms of two of such appointed Associate Justices shall expire with the term of office of each of the present members of the Supreme Court, and, upon the qualification of such new Justices, the Commission of Appeals of the State of Texas shall terminate."

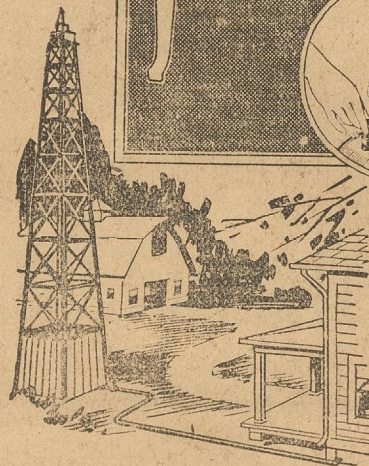
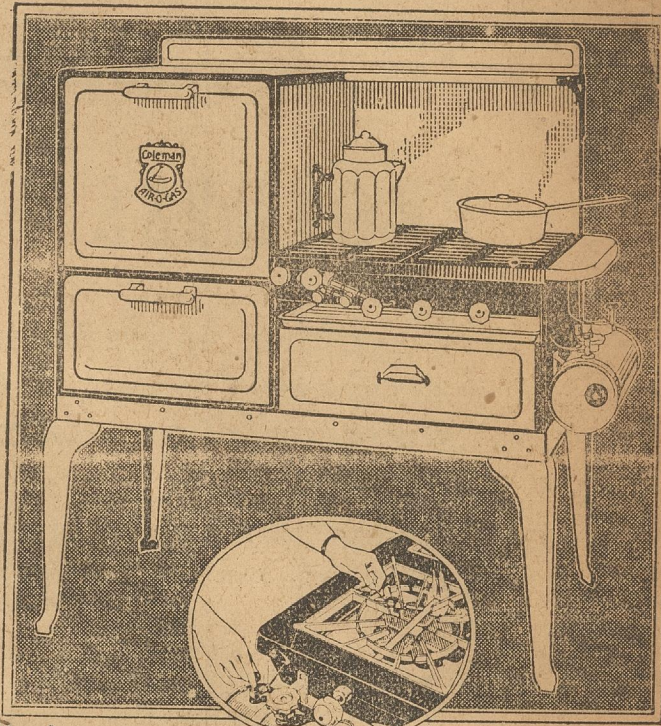
"Article V. Section 3. The Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction only except as herein specified, which shall be co-extensive with the limits of the State. Its appellate jurisdiction shall extend to questions of law arising in cases of which the Courts of Civil Appeals have appellate jurisdiction under such restrictions and regulations as the Legislature may prescribe. Until otherwise provided by law, the appellate jurisdiction of the Supreme Court shall extend to questions of law arising in the cases in the Courts of Civil Appeals in which the Judges of any Court of Civil Appeals may disagree or where the several Courts of Civil Appeals may hold differently on the same question of law, or where a Statute of the State is held void, and shall extend to such other questions as may be within the Court's Appellate Jurisdiction under the Statutes of the State in force when this amendment takes effect. The Supreme Court and the Justices thereof shall have power to issue writs of habeas corpus, as may be prescribed by Law, and under such regulations as may be prescribed by Law, the said Court and the Justices thereof may issue the writs of mandamus, procedendo, certiorari and such other writs, as may be necessary to enforce its jurisdiction. The Legislature may confer original jurisdiction on the Supreme Court to issue writs of quo warrantum and mandamus in such cases as may be specified, except as against the Governor of the State.

The Supreme Court shall have power, upon affidavit or otherwise as by the Court may be determined, to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the proper exercise of its jurisdiction. The Supreme Court shall be open at all times and shall sit at the State Capitol for the transaction of business at such times as may be designated by the Court.

The Supreme Court shall appoint a clerk, who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter, be required by law, and he may hold his office for four years and shall be subject to removal by said Court, for good cause entered of record on the Minutes of said Court who shall receive such compensation as the Legislature may provide."

Sec. 2. Said proposed Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on Tuesday, July 16, 1929, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amend-

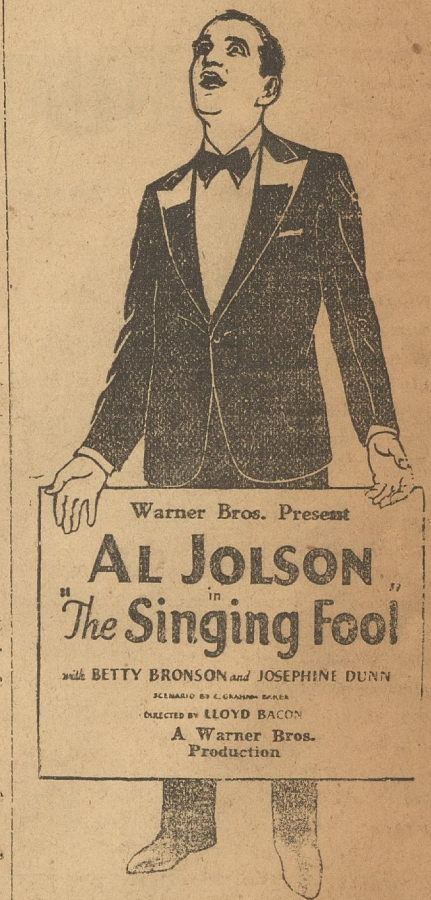

ment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot: "For the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court," and each favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot: "Against the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court." If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election held as provided by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

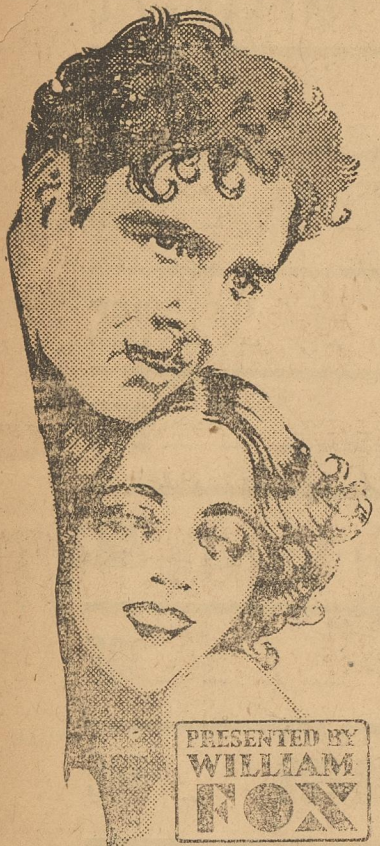

### BIG DEMONSTRATION BALWIN COMBINE

The demonstration of the Baldwin Combine by the Dubey Motor Co., holders of the Cross Plains agency, on Wednesday of this week, was attended by about seventy-five representative farmers of the surrounding community, and was a big success in every way. All displayed a keen interest in the demonstration, and were well pleased with the new improvement of the machine. It is believed that many of the combines will be in use for the harvesting of the big grain crop, from present prospects, that will be made in Cross Plains grades territory this season. 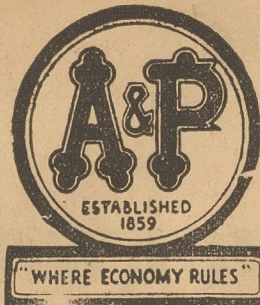

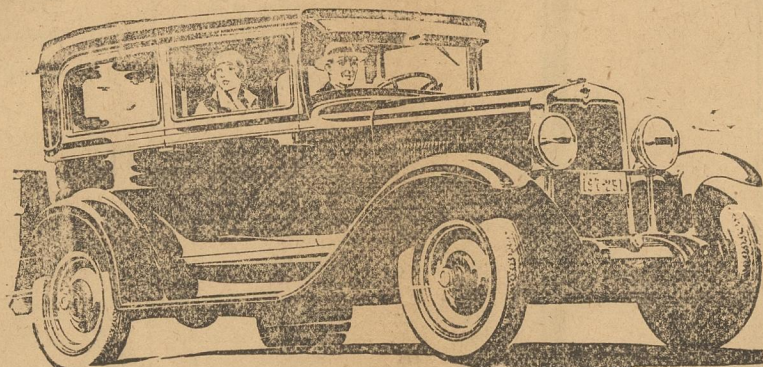

ANDREW JACKSON BURKS

The death of Andrew J. Burks, at 4:20 A. M., Saturday, March 16, 1929, marked the passing of the last of his father's family.

The youngest child of the Rev. William Carroll and Sarah Weathers Burks, was born in Leake County, Mississippi, December 3, 1859, and moved with his parents, three brothers and one sister to Comanche County, Texas in the fall of 1872.

He was married to Lee Ann Fisher on February 27, 1879. They lived happily together for fifty years and seventeen days, their love growing stronger and sweeter through the years of toil and hardships, sorrow and joy.

Mr. and Mrs. Burks moved to Calahan County in March 1884, settling three or four miles southeast of Cross Plains, when it was a village of wooden-buildings.

To this union were born thirteen children, eleven of whom are still living; and all were present, at his bedside except two sons who had been with him and had returned home thinking his condition much improved.

Mr. Burks had been in poor health for almost a year and had been confined to his room all the new year, suffering first with rheumatism, then with Dropsy and Brights Disease, and probably Influenza and Pneumonia at the last. He bore his sufferings with great patience and fortitude, always grateful for favors, and commenting upon his and his wife getting along together so beautifully.

Mr. Burks was a kind and affectionate husband and a dutiful father. In his dealings with his fellowmen the other's welfare was considered, even before his own, and he was ever a champion of truth and honor. He devoted a great part of his time to nature-study, and to studying the Bible. He was baptised into the

Primitive Baptist Church by his father, in Indian Creek in Comanche County, Texas. His faith has always been a shining example to his family and friends.

The funeral service was conducted by an old friend and neighbor of his young manhood, the Rev. (Bob) Williams of Abilene, whose touching and kindly remarks were very highly appreciated by the sorrowing family.
