### 'Words Of Wisdom From The Past'

It is always amazing to me that men in another century could write prolific statements that would be so appropriate for today. I guess what it amounts to is that the basic problem on the earth has always been the same, yet the answer is ignored by many.

This comment by Daniel Webster, a statesman, in 1823 was among some information which was sent to the *Review*. His opinion and concept seemed so reasonable and simple that I had to pass it along.

## Trash A Big Problem As Landfill Regulations Toughen

Due to new EPA and state health department regulations, many Texas towns are finding it difficult, if not impossible, to dispose of their garbage. And while the problems seem to be weighing heavily on city officials throughout the state, ultimately small town Texas residents will be left holding the bag.

According to Don Hatcher, director of public works and city engineer for Brownwood, there are three basic regulations that are causing problems for the smaller landfills in Texas. Landfills must now have attendants on duty during open hours and must have a secured premises, or be fenced and locked, when an attendant is not on duty. Landfills are required to cover newly-added refuse daily with a minimum of six inches of dirt to help eliminate odors and pests. And as of Sept. 1, there will be no more burning of garbage at landfills.

The regulations have affected many communities throughout the Central Texas area. The Comanche landfill was closed July 15 and the closing, Mayor John Beatty said, was "mostly due to new EPA regulations."

After being turned down by several larger cities in the surrounding area, including Brownwood, Beatty said his city may be forced to have its garbage hauled away to a regional landfill. "We're waiting on a permit to build a transfer station," he said. "It's going to be expensive but we have no option."

The transfer station would be constructed at the city's sewer plant where the city would be responsible for the treatment and compaction of the refuse. The solids would be squeezed

## Northwest Texas Arthritis Chapter Chooses Cross Plains To Test Program

The Arthritis Foundation's Northwest Texas Chapter has been selected as one of only four areas nationwide to test a new program for people with arthritis in rural areas. Cross Plains has been selected as one of the areas to participate in the pilot program. Pauniece Oglesby has been named as Community Coordinator for this program. They are now seeking people with arthritis in the Cross Plains area to participate in the program. Participants must have arthritis (diagnosed by a doctor), have difficulty in attending programs outside their home, or whose job prevents them from attending programs during the workday.

The new program, called "Bone-Up on Arthritis," is a home-study course designed to help people learn more about arthritis and how to cope with the disease. It consists of six lessons on cassette tape with an accompanying binder of materials and worksheets. The participants complete the lessons in their homes at their own pace and may keep the materials after completing the program. Specially trained resource people in addition to the Community Coordinators are available to call if a participant has questions.

Pauniece was in Lubbock on August 2-3, 1989, to attend a training session for Community Coordinators to help them in administering the research program.

"We always try to reach more and more people with information about arthritis and what can be done to help with the disease," said Judi Moulton of the Northwest Texas Chapter. "We hope this program will expand our services to people we haven't reached by providing easy to understand, self-care information that can be learned and used at home."

There is no cost to the participants in Bone-Up. Through the surveys and evaluations participants will fill out after completing the program, researchers will be able to determine if this is a program that can significantly benefit people with arthritis. If so, they hope to offer it nationwide.

## Study To Determine Regional Water Needs

The West Central Texas Municipal Water District has selected a team of three engineering firms to conduct a regional water supply study of 10 counties in West Central Texas.

Freese and Nicholas, Inc., Jacob and Martin, Inc. and Todd Engineering, Inc. will identify needs and potential sources of water supply for the 10-county study area for a 30 year period. The firms will also evaluate the potential for regional development of water resources and treatment facilities.

Sixteen area water suppliers will participate in the study, including Abilene, Albany, Anson, Breckenridge, Baird, Cisco, Cross Plains, Hamlin, Hawley Water Supply Corp., Moran, Shackelford Co. Water Supply Corp., Stamford, Sweetwater, Tuscola-Taylor Co. FWD No. 1, Tye and Woodson.

The West Central Texas Council of Governments, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the local Soil and Water Conservation District will participate in the study as a technical advisory committee.

The project will be partially financed by a grant from the Texas Water Development Board.

Freese and Nicholas, Inc., a 95-year-old Texas firm specializing in water resources, has designed more dams in Texas than any other firm or entity, including the Corps of Engineers. Among those projects are Hubbard Creek Reservoir and Stacy Dam and Reservoir. The Stacy project, which is now under construction, will supply water to Abilene, Midland, Odessa, San Angelo and other cities.

Jacob and Martin, Inc., a 40-year-old Abilene firm, has planned and designed hundreds of water projects in West Central Texas. Todd Engineering, Inc. also based in Abilene, has provided civil engineering and surveying services for numerous cities in the area.

July 27, 1989 marked twenty years that Frances Wolf has been employed by the Colonial Oaks Nursing Home at Cross Plains. She started her career as a nurses aid and part-time office help. In January 1971 she became the administrator following a one year internship under the late Raymond (Colonel) Lee, a licensed administrator. A nursing home administration course was required, plus passing the State and National Board exam, to receive her license.

After serving as administrator for 17 years, she stated, "I wouldn't take anything for the time I spent working on the floor. I learned about the patients and the employees from a personal experience, and I hope that it made me a better administrator."

Frances told me that she chose this field because Colonel Lee offered her the opportunity to train for the position, and it was possible for her to work during the day and attend classes at night. At that time she had a son in high school and one in college so it worked out great. She said, "I have never regretted it. I have always felt like it was my calling."

During the interview I asked if she had experienced many changes in the position over the years and she remarked that working with the state and federal agencies always called for change. In case, this year marked the most changes ever in regulations. The most outstanding change is that after this year all nurses aids must be tested and certified by the state. Employees at Colonial Oaks are currently being tested to comply.

All state aid patients experienced major changes and Frances was required to travel to Austin to learn all the details. "If you get the paperwork in on time you don't have many problems," she said.

Colonial Oaks Nursing Home should be proud that they have never been placed on compliance by the state, which is a record they may very well hold alone. Frances gave credit to the staff for doing an excellent job and said it was a compliment to them.

For those not familiar with state compliance, the state will not pay funds until every requirement is met in full. Meeting their standards so efficiently speaks well of our local nursing home and staff.

The quality of care at Colonial Oaks is very personalized, in an atmosphere where the employees truly care about the patients and perform many acts of kindness beyond their job descriptions.

This has probably enhanced the public acceptance of nursing homes over the past 20 years which Frances conveyed. In so many circumstances it becomes physically impossible to care for a patient at home, but with the changing of shifts each 8 hours, these caretakers can provide good services without becoming exhausted and stressed.

"All our patients should be pampered, after giving up their companions and homes. Most of the employees knew the patients prior to their coming to the nursing facility, creating a caring attitude — which makes the difference," Frances remarked.

It takes a lot of special people to fulfill the needs of each individual and you can easily tell that all their patients are loved. Frances stressed that it is not all just giving, but what you receive from the patients expressed in a hug, a word or a smile which was gratifying.

Retiring is not at the top of Frances' list because she truly enjoys her job and is dedicated to the care of all the patients.

dry and the liquids treated and disposed of. The solids would then be hauled away by the firm contracted by the city.

Another Comanche County community, De Leon, is facing the same problem with a different twist. De Leon has a new landfill which was granted a permit for use several years ago, according to an employee at city hall. The new landfill, which the city constructed at a cost of approximately \$95,000, has never been used.

"The restrictions are so great that the cost is just prohibitive at this point," said Flo Wood, office secretary at the De Leon City Hall. "The costs to operate within the restrictions are just unreal."

The city is still using its old landfill but the new regulations will eventually force the closing of the older facility.

"We're thinking about utilizing a transfer station and paying someone else to pick up our garbage," Wood said. "But that option would certainly increase the cost of garbage pick up to residents of our community."

And what about the \$95,000 hole in the ground that the EPA says is substandard?

"We're hoping that we can use it to some degree — maybe for the disposal of limbs, grass clippings, that sort of thing," Wood said. "However, at this point in time we just haven't gotten down to a decision on it."

Cross Plains has contracted its city garbage collection with a private firm for several years. Now the city is being forced to seek bids on the disposal of its refuse, as Cross Plains officials plan to close their landfill at the end of August.

"Nothing has been settled completely but we will be closing our landfill as of Aug. 31," said Debbie Gosnell, city manager of Cross Plains.

At a town hall meeting held recently at the Cross Plains Community Center, 75-100 residents showed up to discuss the landfill issue. The crowd was advised that when the city is forced to contract with a regional landfill for disposal of its refuse, garbage rates will undoubtedly increase.

According to Gosnell, many in attendance at the meeting were opposed to the rate increase. The current residential rate for garbage pick up in the city of Cross Plains is \$5.50 per month. Gosnell said that the rate may increase to \$10-12, a figure which she admits could vary widely in either direction.

"Everyone's pretty well against the increase," she said. "It's always hard to make a change. But that's not any bad reflection of the people against the increase. They just haven't studied this thing out. They don't realize the expenses involved in the city trying to keep it (the landfill) open."

Many other Central Texas communities are facing similar difficulties. Hatcher said that in the past 12 months, he has been approached by representatives from Rising Star, Cross Plains, Goldthwaite, Comanche, and Richland Springs, all wanting to contract with the City of Brownwood for use of its landfill. All were turned down.

The Brownwood landfill is for Brown County residents only," Hatcher said. "We have to look at the future of our landfill site for the citizens of Brownwood. These things (landfills) are very expensive, even just to permit. At this point, we're looking at another 20 years before we would even have to think about seeking an amendment to our permit."

The public works director said that the current cost to get an amendment to a permit would start at about \$10,000.

Meanwhile, there is no relief in sight for the city officials trying to work through these problems.

"It's going to be more and more stringent because of environmental and water regulations," Wood predicted. "Every magazine we get is filled from cover to cover with articles about solid waste and its disposal. The problem has just been delayed in Texas because of our wide open spaces. We've just ignored the problem until now and it's finally catching up with us."

**ORDINANCE NO. 89-003**

An Ordinance declaring certain conditions to be a nuisance providing for notice and hearing to abate, providing for involuntary abatement by the city, declaring cost of involuntary abatement as a lien, providing for the control and abatement of weed and brush growth, fixing fines for violation, providing for repeal of prior existing ordinances on same subject matter.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Cross Plains:

**ARTICLES I. IN GENERAL**

**Section 1. Definition.**  
For the purposes of this chapter, the word "nuisance" is hereby defined as any person doing an unlawful act, or omitting to perform a duty, or suffer-

ing or permitting any condition or thing to be or exist, which act, omission, condition or thing either:

- (a) Injures or dangers the comfort, repose, health or safety of others; or
- (b) Offends decency; or
- (c) Is offensive to the senses; or
- (d) Unlawfully interferes with, obstructs or tends to obstruct or renders dangerous for passage any public or private street, highway, sidewalk, stream, ditch or drainage; or
- (e) In any way renders other persons insecure in life or the use of property; or
- (f) Essentially interferes with the comfortable enjoyment of the life and property, or tends to depreciate the value of the property of others.

**Section 2. Illustrative enumeration.**

The maintaining, using, placing, depositing, leaving or permitting to be or remain on any public or private property of any of the following items, conditions or actions are hereby declared to be and constitute a nuisance; provided, however, this enumeration shall not be deemed or construed to be conclusive, limiting or restrictive:

- (a) Noxious weeds and other rank vegetation.
- (b) Accumulation of rubbish, trash, refuse, junk and other abandoned materials, metals, lumber or other things.
- (c) Any condition which provides harborage for rats, mice, snakes and other vermin.
- (d) Any building or other structure which is in such a dilapidated condition that is unfit for human habitation, or kept in such an unsanitary condition that is a menace to the health of people residing in the vicinity thereof, or presents a more than ordinarily dangerous fire hazard in the vicinity where it is located.
- (e) All unnecessary or unauthorized noises and annoying vibrations, including animal noises.
- (f) All disagreeable or obnoxious odors and stenches, as well as the conditions, substances or other causes which give rise to the emission or generation of such odors and stenches.
- (g) The carcasses of animals or fowl not disposed of within a reasonable time after death.
- (h) The pollution of any public well or cistern, stream, lake, canal or body of water by sewage, dead animals, creamery, industrial wastes or other substances.
- (i) Any building, structure or other place or location where any activity which is in violation of local, state or federal law is conducted, performed or maintained.
- (j) Any accumulation of stagnant water permitted or maintained on any lot or piece of ground.
- (k) Dense smoke, noxious fumes, gas, soot or cinders, in unreasonable quantities.

**Section 3. Prohibited.**

It shall be unlawful for any person to cause, permit, maintain or allow the creation or maintenance of a nuisance.

**Section 4. Notice to abate.**

Whenever a nuisance is found to exist within the city or within the city's extraterritorial jurisdiction, the health officer or some other duly designated

officer of the city shall give ten (10) days written notice to the owner or occupant of the property upon which such nuisance exists or upon the person causing or maintaining other nuisance.

**Section 5. Contents of notice.**

The notice to abate a nuisance issued under the provisions of this chapter shall contain:

- (a) An order to abate the nuisance within a stated time, which shall be reasonable under the circumstances; or to request a hearing within ten (10) days after service of notice to abate the nuisance. Request for a hearing shall be in writing and shall be addressed to the municipal judge in which court the procedure to abate the nuisance is pending.
- (b) The location of the nuisance, if the same is stationary.
- (c) A description of what constitutes the nuisance.
- (d) A statement of acts necessary to abate the nuisance.
- (e) A statement that if the nuisance is not abated as directed and no request for hearing is made within the prescribed time, the city will abate such nuisance and assess the cost thereof against such person.

**Section 5.1. Hearing on nuisance.**

A public hearing must be held prior to the abatement of the nuisance by the city when such a hearing is requested by the owner or occupant of the property upon which such nuisance exists or by the person causing or maintaining the nuisance. The hearing shall be held before the judge of the municipal court. The judge of the municipal court shall determine at the hearing whether or not a nuisance exists. If a nuisance is found to exist, the judge shall order the abatement of the nuisance. Any ruling or order by the judge of the municipal court at this hearing shall become final unless appealed within ten (10) days to a district court of the State of Texas.

**Section 6. Service of notice.**

The notice to abate a nuisance shall be mailed, by certified mail with a five (5) day return requested, to the owner or occupant of the property upon which such nuisance exists or to the person causing or maintaining the nuisance.

If the notice is returned undelivered by the United States Post Office, official action to abate such nuisance shall be continued to a date not less than ten (10) days from the date of such return.

**Section 7. Abatement by city.**

Upon failure of the person upon whom notice to abate a nuisance was served pursuant to the provisions of this chapter to abate the same, or to request a hearing before the judge of the municipal court, the health officer or other duly designated officer of the city shall proceed to abate such nuisance and shall prepare a statement of cost incurred in the abatement thereof.

**Section 8. City's costs declared liens.**

Any and all costs incurred by the city in the abatement of a nuisance under the provisions of this chapter shall constitute a lien against the property upon which such nuisance existed, which lien shall be filed, proven and collected as provided for by law. Such lien shall be notice to all persons from the time of its recording, and shall bear interest at the legal rate thereafter until satisfied.

**ARTICLES II. WEEDS, ETC.**

**Section 9. Maximum growth.**

(a) It shall be unlawful for any person, firm, corporation, partnership, association of persons, owner, agent, occupant or anyone having supervision or control of any lot, tract, parcel of land or portion thereof, occupied or unoccupied, improved or unimproved, within the corporate limits of the city to suffer or permit grass, weeds or brush that is uncultivated to grow to a

greater height than twelve (12) inches on any lot, tract or parcel of land within the corporate limits of the city, five (5) acres in size or less.

(b) On tracts of land more than five (5) acres, it shall be unlawful to suffer or permit grass, weeds and brush to excess of twelve (12) inches in height to grow uncultivated within one hundred (100) feet adjacent to and along and dedicated public street within the corporate limits of the city or within one hundred (100) feet on either side of any lot that is occupied by a residence or business.

Section 10. Notice to property owners; annual notice.

When any violation of this article is found to exist, a notice by letter shall be addressed to the owner of the property in question, or if the address of the property owner is unknown, then notice may be given by publication one time in a local newspaper of general circulation.

Annual notice may be given to property owners, as above provided, prior to the grass-growing season.

Upon the giving of said annual notice, no further notice shall be required pursuant to this article.

Section 11. Notice.

The notice of violation shall contain the following:

(a) You are required to maintain your property so as to keep grass, brush and weeds at a height of less than twelve (12) inches;

(b) In the event you fail to do so, the city will enter upon your property and mow or have it mowed at thirty (30) day intervals during such annual growing season;

(c) You have ten (10) days from the date of this notice to correct the violation; and,

(d) Tall weeds are a breeding ground for rats and mice; and are a source of fuel for many fires.

Section 12. Action by city.

In addition to court action, the city

may enter upon the property found in violation of this article and mow or have said property mowed at thirty day intervals during such annual growing season in the event such owner fails to mow same.

Section 13. Assessment of city's expenses; billing.

Expenses incident to the action taken by the city to correct any conditions coming under the provision of this article, which included a service charge of fifty dollars (\$50.00) to cover administrative cost shall be assessed against the owners of all outstanding interest in the lot or parcel of land involved. An itemized bill of such cost shall be mailed by the city secretary to each such owner if his address is known.

Section 14. City's expenses declared a lien; recovery.

If the bill for the city's expenses in correcting any condition coming under the provisions of this article, including the administrative and penalty charges, shall remain unpaid for a period of thirty (30) days after the date of the mailing of such bill, the city secretary shall file a statement of such bill and the reasons therefor with the county clerk. From the date of such filing, the city shall have a lien on the lot or parcel upon which such expenses are incurred only to tax liens and liens for street improvements. The amount of such debt shall accumulate interest at the rate of ten (10) per cent per annum from the date on which payment was due. For any such debt and interest, suit may be instituted and recovery and foreclosure had in the name of the city. In such suits the aforementioned statement, or certified copy thereof, shall be deemed prima facie evidence of the debt and interest thereon.

### ARTICLES III. FINES

Section 15.

In addition to the above provisions, any person who fails to abate a nuisance after proper notice and hearing (if any) shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction therefor shall be fined in an amount not to exceed fifty dollars (\$50.00) for each day that such nuisance remains abated, and each such day shall constitute a separate offense.

### ARTICLES IV. REPEAL OF PRIOR ORDINANCES

Section 16.

It is further ordained that this ordinance shall supersede and replace all ordinances with respect to "Nuisances" and weed grass and rubbish accumulation.

## Free And Reduced School Meals Policy

Cross Plains Public Schools announces its policy for free and reduced price meals for children unable to pay the full price of meals served under the National School Lunch Program and School Breakfast Program. Each school campus and the office of the Superintendent has a copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party.

The following household size and income criteria will be used for determining eligibility (see income eligibility guidelines). Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals.

Application forms will be sent to all homes the first day of school with a letter of explanation to the parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available at the principal's office during the year. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials.

For the school officials to determine eligibility, the household must provide the following information listed on the

application: names of all household members; social security numbers of all adult household members or a statement that the household member does not possess one; total household income with the amount and source of income received by each household member, or the household's food stamp case number if they currently receive food stamps; and the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct.

Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

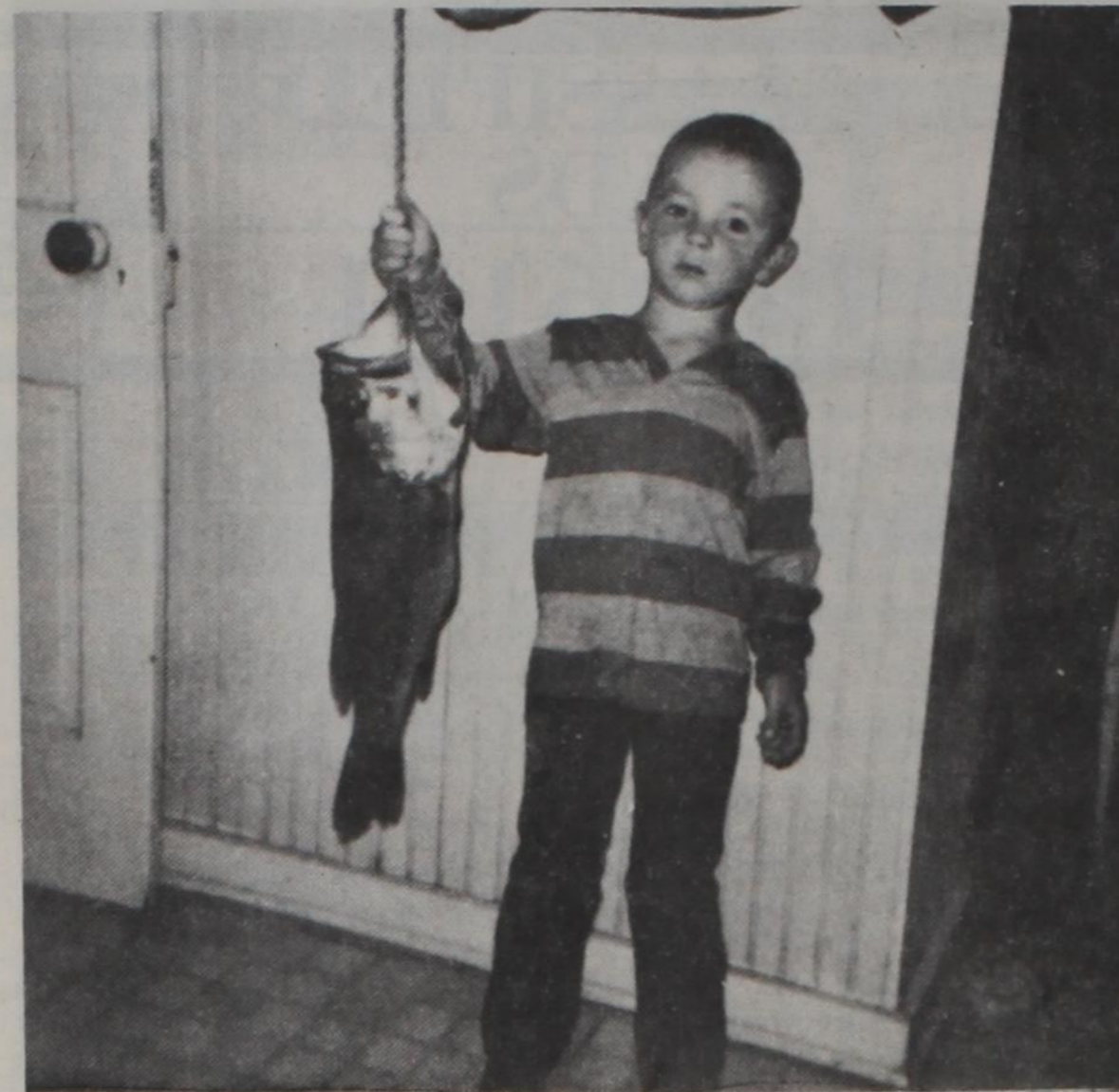

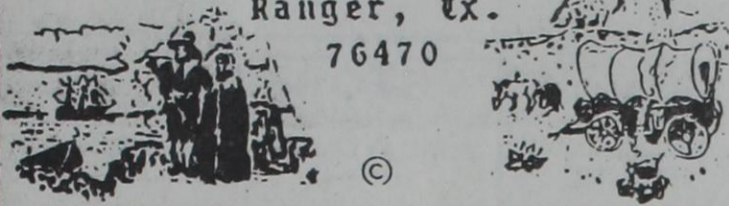

In 1870 these two children were living with James DABNEY in Mt. Calm. Family believes that Martha died about 1861 and B.F. WILLIAMS was to have gone to the Civil War and left the children with their uncle DABNEY (which the 1870 Census confirms), B.F. WILLIAMS returned from the War but had been wounded and his children did not return to live with him. It is believed he died shortly after returning home or left and was never heard from again. Priscilla "Belle" married John Columbus ROGERS, she died Abilene, TX area. Believe James WILLIAMS died Buffalo Gap, TX. Anyone with information of this family, i.e. parents of B.F. 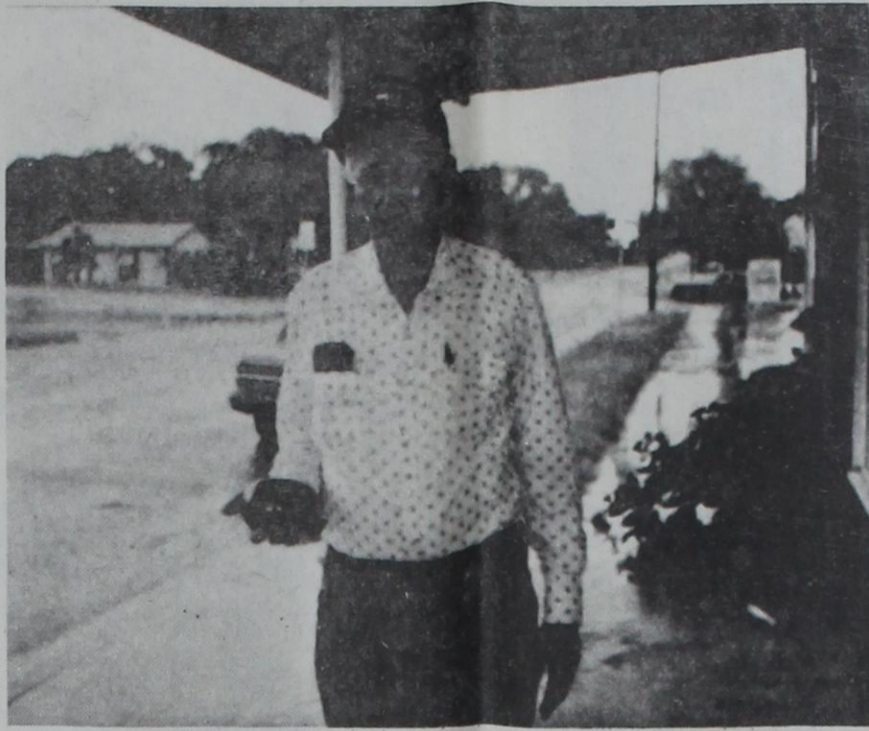

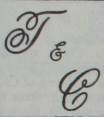
