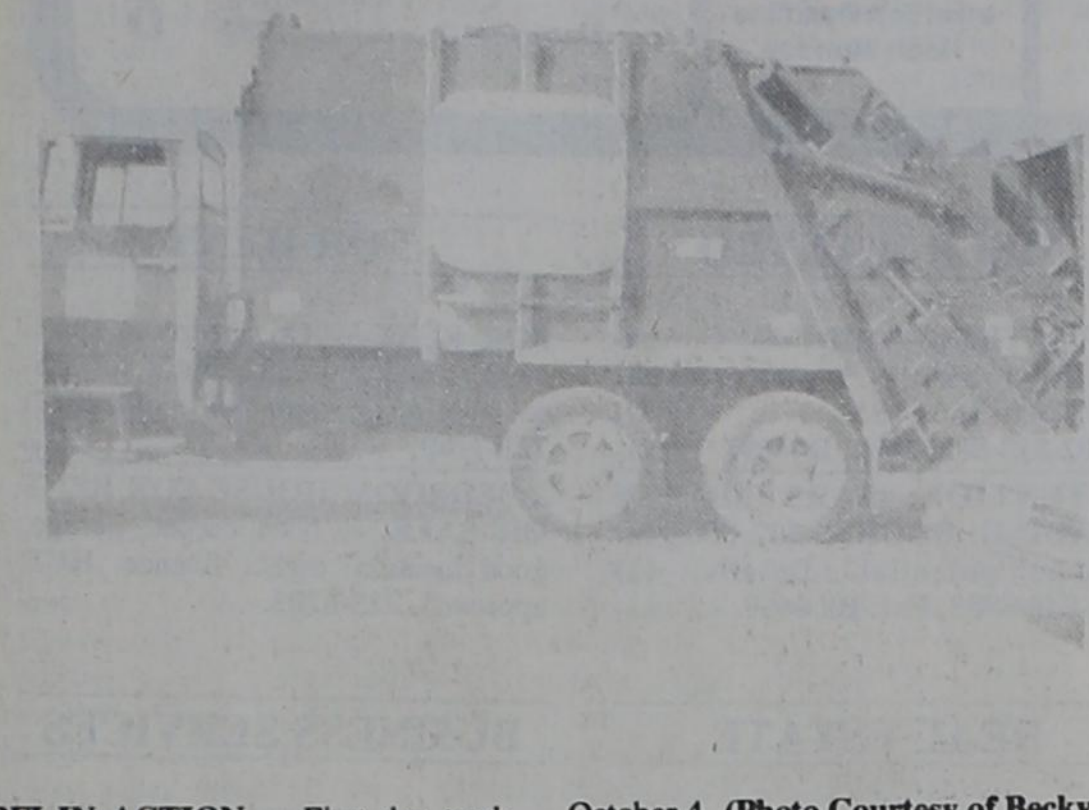
Dr. Martin, in cooperation with the Ag. Department at Cross Plains, conducts a Rabies Vaccination Clinic every year during October.

Policy Statement

The philosophy of Texans' War on Drugs is one of zero tolerance for the use of alcohol by all persons under the age of 21. Promotions which suggest to youth that drinking is acceptable as long as it is done "responsibly" or which imply that the use of alcohol and other drugs is permissible as long as one does not drive are counter to the message of non-use. **Abstinence and law abidance is the only appropriate message that should be delivered to our youth.**

Therefore, Texans' War on Drugs opposes student groups which are formed against driving drunk, against drinking and driving, or which espouse a designated driver program for those under the legal drinking age of 21 in Texas. Instead, Texans' War on Drugs supports the development of student groups that are dedicated to non-use, which uphold the right of all Texas youth to grow up drug-free, and which encourage healthy,

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They Sat Intently Watching

Working on a large three-foot by three and a half foot piece of gray bogus paper, pastor artist and evangelist Larry Sinclair from Fairfield, Texas uses only his hand and a regular chalkboard eraser to work his magic with pastels. Mr. Sinclair has been to Cross Plains before (two years ago) to give a demonstration of his special talents.

This year, he worked for a fascinated group of about 44 Cross Plains art students on Monday, October 2, during a 5th period art class. In the course of the demonstration he explained and showed several different techniques in working with pastels. In the hour-long class period he completed a landscape while also answering questions from the students.

Mr. Sinclair uses an interesting variety of chalks in his works. Some are in a familiar form similar to chalks used in a classroom, but much softer. Another type he uses is a "visible" fluorescent chalk which is quite impressive under a black light. The third type of chalk which is not visible under normal lighting, but only under the effect of a black light, appears white to look at, but glows brightly under black light. He has 20 different colors of this "invisible" chalk which is somewhat expensive running from \$4.25 to \$8.75 for a single stick.

After the demonstration, the students were able to look closer at his work and handle some of the chalk, and ask more questions. I consider myself quite fortunate in that this is the second time Mr. Sinclair has come to my classes, and I am grateful for the finished work that he leaves with me

so I may display it in my classroom.

Mr. Sinclair has been receiving his training from a man in Muskegon, Michigan over the past 8 years, having attended 15 different classes. His teacher's name is Ding Teuling, a 73-year-old pastel artist who is also the only person in the United States that is currently making the gray bogus paper, and who handmakes all of the invisible fluorescent chalks in a special process he has taught his children.

In his primary role as an evangelist, Mr. Sinclair and his wife have been participating in the revival at the First Baptist Church in Cross Plains last week where he used his special talents.

Not Another Test!

To the 9th graders at Cross Plains High School, October 3, 4, and 5 seemed a bit longer. These students were given an experimental test in the library by Mrs. Ann Watson, the school counselor. C.P.I.S.D. was chosen by TEA (Texas Educational Agency) to take a field test in math at the 9th grade level.

The field test is a sampling of questions of a new test being created by TEA that will be going into effect in the 1990-91 school year all over Texas. There are 26 different forms of this math field test in grades 3, 5, 7, and 9. The field test will be sent to Iowa, where it will be graded, and the results will be sent to TEA and the tested school.

This new test will replace the TEAMS (Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills) test. Currently, the TEAMS test consists of a math and an English language arts section. Grades 3, 5, 7, and 9 take this test as an assessment of their skills.

Eleventh graders take the TEAMS-Exit-level test. Students must pass both sections of the Exit-level test in order to graduate and receive their high school diploma.

TEA is creating a new version of the TEAMS test. The new test will be known as TAAS (Texas Assessment of Academic Skills). This test will be given once a year to grades 3, 5, 7, and 9, and will serve as achievement tests at these levels. Eleventh graders will know the TAAS test as the Exit-level test. This new test not only consists of math and English language arts, but now a writing section is included.

As with the TEAMS test, 11th graders must pass each section to receive their diploma. If students do not pass every section, they will have one more chance their Junior year and two chances their Senior year. Every Texas high school student must take this test and pass to receive their high school diploma. This new test goes into effect 1990-91 school year.

What Is Chapter I?

"ESL," "Special Ed.," "Title I," and "Chapter I" are some of the specialized educational programs offered at public schools. As one of the elementary programs, Chapter I is an important part of providing needed help for the students in Grades K-6.

Chapter I is a federally-funded program that provides extra individual help for children in the subject areas of math, reading, and language arts. It is the largest federal aid program for our nation's schools.

The program at Cross Plains this year has 38 students in reading and 23 in math. Children are selected based on their scores on the CAT test they take in the spring.

There are three teachers who work with the Chapter I Program. Nora Odom, who teaches reading and language arts; Brenda Connor, who teaches math, and Wesley Ingram is the aide for the teachers.


Chapter I is held in, what most people know as the Betty Browning Building, on the north end of the elementary building.

The local program of Chapter I is reviewed each year by administrators, teachers and parents. If goals have not been met, then the plans must be revised.

Ms. Odom, Mrs. Connor, and Mrs. Ingram have many different methods and techniques they use to teach Chapter I students. A few of these include, controlled readers, computers, and digitors, and they use a variety of hands on methods.


The students are pulled out of their regular class time for the subject in which they need help and are worked with in a small group arrangement.

The Chapter I Program has proved to be very effective in improving the students' skills in these subject areas.



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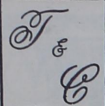
- Stay clear of all electric lines, assume all wires are uninsulated.
