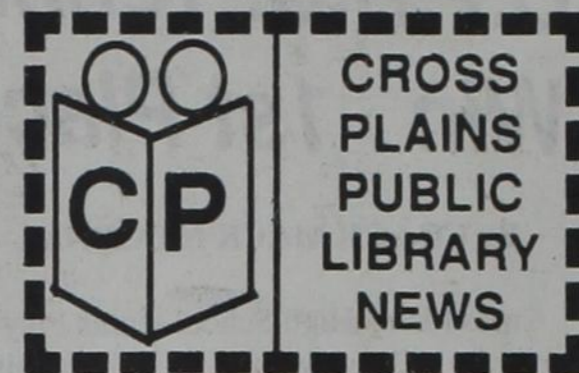

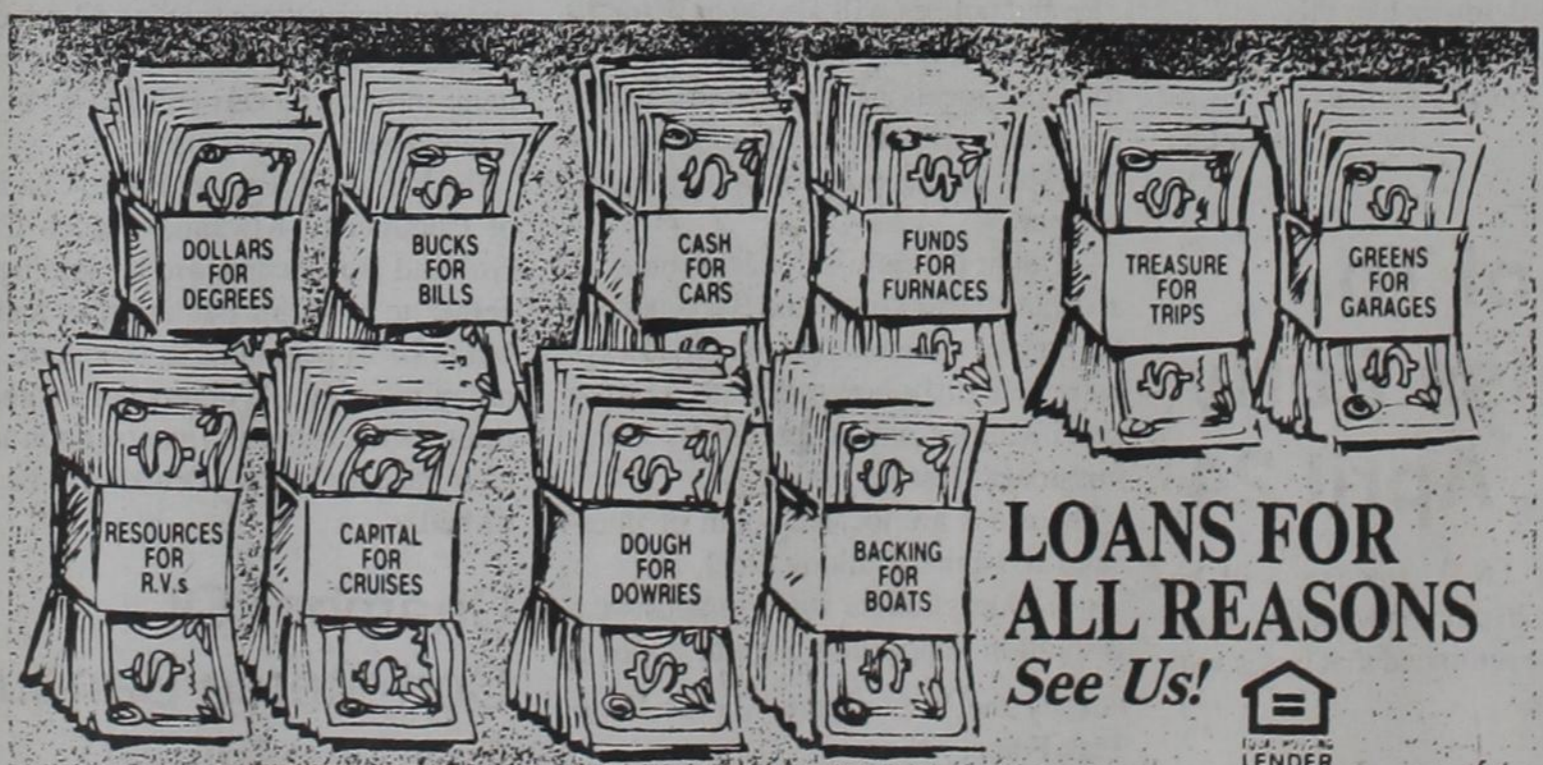

Brown County Jay Strack Crusade April 23 - 28

Organizers are making final preparations for the Brown County Jay Strack Crusade which will take place in the Brownwood Coliseum on April 23-28 at 7:00 p.m. nightly.

Fifty-three churches representing ten denominations are involved in the event, according to crusade Publicity Chairman Jerry Martin. "The Brown County Jay Strack Crusade is perhaps the largest county-wide effort of churches working together in this area in the past half-century," says Martin.

While in Brownwood, Strack will speak at several school assemblies and a special Youth Night will be held at the Crusade on April 25. Strack is no stranger to the problems of youth. He has spoken in over two thousand schools nationwide, telling his personal story. He is a product of a broken home, and he was a drug and alcohol abuser at age 17 who frequented a Florida juvenile detention center.

The Jay Strack Association conducts some of the largest inter-denominational crusades in America today. Strack has authored several books, including Good Kids Who Do Bad Things, and he has served as an advisor to Nancy Reagan's "Just Say No" task force and William Bennett's drug task force.

Strack has appeared on the McNeil Lehrer Report, Sally Jesse Raphael, CNN, and 700 Club. He speaks in high schools, civic center, churches, and convention centers about three hundred days a year.

The Brown County Jay Strack Crusade will include several hundred volunteers and an all community choir each evening. Admission to the crusade is free and the public is encourage to attend. For more information, call the Brown County Jay Strack Crusade Hotline at 915-646-7812.

Let us not wait to learn what we really need to know. What we don't know may very well hurt us!

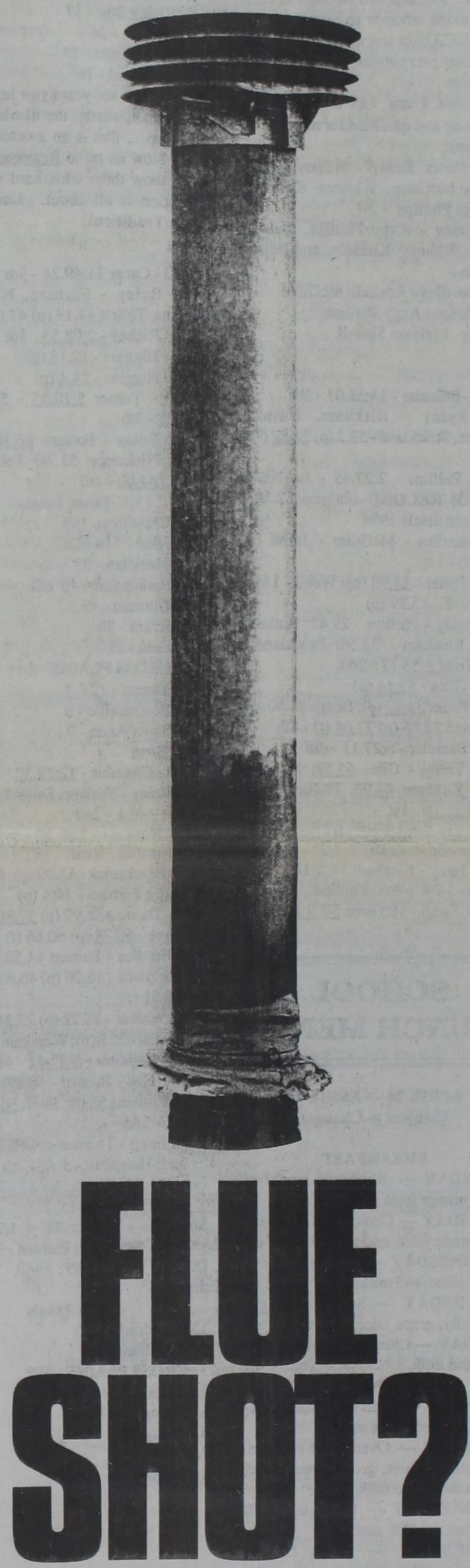

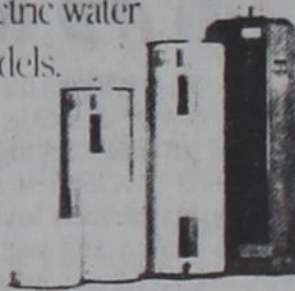

The question and answer part of the program presented by Mr. McRight was very informative and most beneficial to all members and guests.

After routine chapter business, the meeting was adjourned and a covered dish luncheon was served to members and their guests.

Farmer Program Sign-Up Nears

"Farmers have only 2 more weeks to sign up and become eligible for program benefits on their 1995 wheat, feed grains, and cotton crops," Scott Odom, CED of the Callahan County Consolidated Farm Service Agency, said. The sign-up ends April 28th.

He said producers will not have the opportunity to change their mind and sign-up after this deadline. Producers who have already enrolled and those who sign-up before April 28th, have the option of withdrawing and returning any advance payments.

Target prices protect farmer's income if market prices fall below the federally-established levels. Through the CFSA price support loan program, farmers can obtain interim financing to operate and have time to wait for a better market.

Additionally, the 1995 farm programs offer advance payments in cash and flexible planting options.

"If producers do not sign-up, they

should clearly understand that they will not be eligible for benefits offered under the 1995 programs," CFSA official Odom said.

Also producers have until April 28th to certify their planted acreage of wheat, oats, and barley for harvest and/or grazing for 1995. Odom reminds producers to certify their crops even if they are not going to participate in the program.

Due to the lengthy process in completing the necessary paperwork, sign-up and certification are being conducted by appointments. Odom reminds producers to call the office at 915-854-1049 as soon as possible for their appointment.

Eligibility for participation in all program administered by CFSA is established by law without regard to race, color, religion, sex, age, national origin, marital status, physical or mental handicap, political affiliation, or sponsorship club.

Historic Reenactment Slated For Fort Griffin April 22 - 23

April 22 and 23, 8 a.m. Saturday till 12 noon Sunday will find Fort Griffin State Park near Albany alive with all the characters of the old west, Cavalryman, Cannons, Cowboys, Gunfighters, Buffalo Hunters, Frontier Ladies, Gamblers, Sutler, etc. Activities will include: cavalry games, gun fights, cannon firing, and all the activities of the Old West.

A variety of sutlers stores will be in operation providing shoppers with a very unusual list of 19th century materials and goods. The Fort Griffin Garrison Ladies will host a saloon and card parlor patterned after the authentic Fort Griffin saloons of the 1870's.

The 1880 Saddletramps, a San Antonio-based Living History organization will be at Fort Griffin this year. Highlights of the Saddletramps participation in the event will be an authentic recreation of the Beehive Saloon, a prominent feature of the early town of Fort Griffin (also known as "The Flats"). The recreated Beehive will offer a period mixologist serving up an array of authentic drinks (Please note the 1880 Saddletramps will not be mixing or serving alcoholic drinks at Fort Griffin) and a gambler versed in the games of chance of the period will take on all comers. Also featured will be the recreation of several historic gun fights that occurred at Fort Griffin during the 1870's.

The third annual cavalry games will be held Saturday and Sunday. These require demonstration of skills required of the cavalry station on the Texas frontier including: horsemanship, shooting and jumping.

Sunday will bring similar performances but will begin with a frontier church service.

"This very special event will give visitors an opportunity to live a unique piece

of our heritage on the very ground which our forefathers struggled and died to build a future for us to "inherit". Fort Griffin State Park Manager said.
