

She was preceded in death by her parents, Elmore and Dema Vestal; her husband, Claude; a son, Biliy; and a sister, Loreta Lutzenberger.



# **Revivals Breaking Out** On Campuses

Revival meetings" are out of style in most highbrow churches, while others continue to try to slip them into the calendar next to vacation Bible school, youth camp and a picnic or two.

But history shows that revivals are like mysterious storms that can shake churches, communities and even nations. A true revival is as easy to schedule as a

Nobody expected spiritual gusts at Coggin Avenue Baptist in Brownwood at 8:30 a.m. on January 22. Certainly, nobody expected the start of a revival that would spread nationwide.

Out in a pew, Chris Robeson's heart began to pound and he felt that God wanted his attention. The Howard Payne University theology major opened his Bible and soon stopped in Joel, where God says: "Yet even now ... return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; and rend your hearts, not your garments."

The Rev. John Avant ended the service with an altar call and Robeson went for-

"I don't remember what I said. ... It was like I was being shown how holy God is and how unholy I am," said Robeson. "I had a profound sense of my own brokenness and of the brokenness of the church and the nation. ... Finally, I pleaded for people to pray for students, because many of us were struggling."

Students and adults came forward in tears. The 11 a.m. service began with an altar call, since the front of the church was still packed with people on their knees. The sanctuary was full that night and the revival spread to the campus and other churches.

In those early services, noted Robeson, no one made public confessions. But soon students began to reveal their private sins, seeking forgiveness and sup- April 29 - 30 port from peers. Campus leaders quickly established guidelines, reminding worshipers that the Bible urges people to confess their own sins, but not those of

Within weeks, Howard Payne students began visiting other campuses. Revival spread to Houston Baptist University, Olivet Nazarene University in Kankakee, Illinois, Moorehead (Kentucky) State University, Murray (Kentucky) State University, Louisiana Tech in Ruston, Louisiana, Criswell College in Dallas and Samford University in Bir-

On the morning of March 1, Avant preached in chapel at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth. Many teachers ended up canceling classes and the service didn't end until late that night. Services continued the

"I was amazed by the camaraderie" among the seminary students, Avant told

Baptist Press. "Someone would share and immediately five or six people would stand around them and pray. One of the most moving experiences was when a white man admitted racism and two or three black guys almost carried him off the stage, hugging him."

On March 19, testimonies by Howard Payne students started a chain reaction at Wheaton (Illinois) College, the alma mater of evangelist Billy Graham. That first service lasted until 6 a.m. and students filled five garbage bags with alcohol, pornography and other evidence of their sins. Within days, more than half of Wheaton's 2,200 students were taking

"Confessions of pride, hatred, lust, sexual immorality, cheating, dishonesty, materialism, addictions and self-destructive behavior were heard," wrote chaplain Steve Kellough, in a memo to faculty and staff. "There was crying and there was singing. ... It was orderly. It was sincere. ... The depth and breadth of the confession, repentance and reconciliation point to a divine initiative."

Meanwhile, Robeson's telephone keeps ringing as church and campus leaders try to figure out what is happening. Some may fear that these services are echoes of a talk-show culture obsessed with emotional grandstanding. Others are anxious to see evidence of changed lives, including service in evangelism and mis-

There has to be more to this than kind of spiritual one-night stand," said Robeson. "I want to see this last. In two or three years, I'd like to be able to look on all of this and say, 'Yes, that was a real re-
