Margaret Penny Neal, 71, passed away Friday, May 5, 1995 in an Abilene hospital.

Services were held at 2 p.m. Monday in Cross Plains First Baptist Church with Rev. Jim O'Dell officiating. Burial was in Cross Plains Cemetery, directed by Higginbotham Funeral Home.

Mrs. Neal was born October 18, 1923 in Cookeville, Tennessee, and married Ike Neal in 1945 in Rossville, Georgia. She moved to Cross Plains 41 years ago.

The co-owner of Neal Drug since 1954, she was a well respected business woman. She was dedicated to serving her customers, and was a credit to her community.

ELECTION RESULTS FOR CITY AND SCHOOL ANNOUNCED

Ray Purvis, Edwin Weiss and James Nichols were elected to the three Cross Plains City Council positions on Saturday, May 6. Purvis was an incumbent while Weiss and Nichols have both served on the council in the past.

Purvis received 194 votes, Weiss 183,

Nichols 127 and W.C. "Carroll" Pringle 106.

Rickey Carey, Randy Foster and Barbara Renfro Sowell were chosen to the Board of Trustees for the Cross Plains I.S.D. Foster and Sowell were incumbents while Carey will be serving his first

term. Carey led the race with 215 votes, Foster 176, Sowell 173, Charles Chesshir 170, Jimmy Cook 150, Jim Hargrove 147, Mark Norris 145, Jimmy Joy 140 and Reggie Stover received 1 write-in vote.

The School Bond was voted in with 373 ballots for and 103 against.

EMU EXPO MAY 13

The Brown County Youth Fair barn on Highway 377 South in Brownwood will be the site of an emu expo Saturday, May 13 from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. The expo will feature speakers, live emu, exhibits of equipment and supplies used to raise emu and genuine emu products will be available for purchase. Chef Jeff Belisle will prepare emu meat for tasting and a drawing will be held for a pair of emu chicks.

The raitie industry is a rapidly emerging agribusiness offering an alternative income. Meat production and quality hide for exquisite leather goods has spurred growth of the industry. Emu meat is the lowest in cholesterol and fat and highest in protein of any meat. Emu oil is sought after as a cosmetic base and medical ointment. Many professional basketball trainers are using emu oil to relieve sore muscles and promote faster healing of injuries.

People are finding emu ranching rewarding and relatively easy to get into. Very little land is required, annual overhead is low and the growth potential is exciting. The emu lives for about 30 years and produces eggs for most that time. The average hen starts laying at 2 years of age and can produce an average of 20 chicks per year.

Traditional farmers and ranchers are finding emu ranching can provide alternatives and increase their profits per acre. The future of the emu looks very bright. With prices more affordable, this is a great time to join a growing industry.

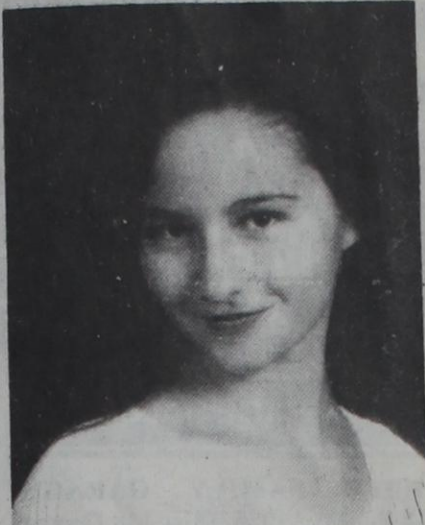

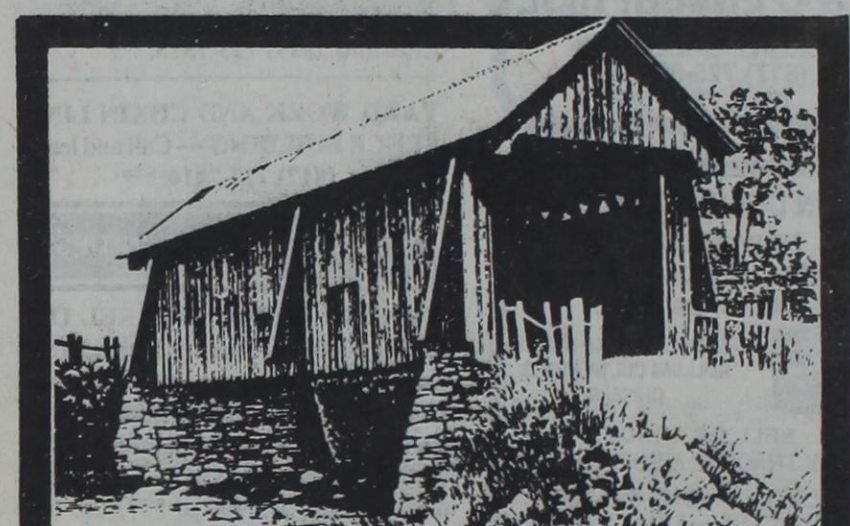

Capital Punishment:
The Income Tax

Every April, Americans are reminded that there are two forms of government in their country — the short form and the long form. And whether we file the long form or the short form, few of us are truly happy with the federal income tax system.

There are two proposals for tax reform currently before the 104th Congress: the consumption tax and the flat tax. I am going to discuss the flat tax in this column and will outline the consumption tax proposal later.

The flat tax plan proposed by U.S. Rep. Dick Army of Texas would allow every taxpayer in the country to file on a form the size of a postcard.

Rep. Army proposes that all income be taxed at a single rate — 20 percent for the first three years and 17 percent thereafter. Not only would this simplify the tax process enormously, but it would eliminate some of the most egregious features of the current system: the Swiss cheese-like arrangement of loopholes which benefit some at the expense of others, the double and often triple taxation of certain kinds of income, and the high overall rate of federal taxation.

No one is happy with the present system's intricate set of loopholes. A flat tax would eliminate loopholes entirely.

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The philosophy behind this idea is one of elemental fairness: Everyone should be treated the same, rather than the government making arbitrary decisions about who must surrender more of what they earn, and who has to surrender less.

Most advocates of this plan want to retain only one real deduction in addition to the personal allowance: the allowance given parents for their children. Under Rep. Army's proposal, the individual deduction would be \$13,000, or \$26,000 per couple.

In exchange for that, all other deductions would be erased, including the home mortgage interest deduction and the charitable contribution deduction. The current double taxation of savings and investment income would be abolished. Right now, some people pay federal tax on their salaries and still manage to save something for a rainy day. But their wealth is taxed again when it earns interest. If they invest their savings in a business, the business's income is taxed, and then they are taxed once again on the income they derive from it.

The result of this system is that Americans save less than citizens in any other industrialized democracy. Less investment funds are available to create new business, and new jobs. Under the flat tax plan, income would be taxed only once, at its source.

The flat tax proposal would reduce the current high rate of taxation. As a result, the government would have less money to spend. If that rate were set at 17 percent, for instance, federal revenue would shrink by about \$40 billion a year from what is currently collected. So any flat tax proposal, to be realistic, would have to contain caps on government spending as well.

I still have not made up my mind if this is the best way to improve our federal income tax system, but I think the flat tax is an interesting idea in principle. This and other tax reform proposals deserve to be thoroughly debated before Congress enacts them. The American people deserve to know exactly what they'll be getting in exchange for the present system.

But right now the reward for energy, enterprise and thrift in America is — higher taxes. This has to change.

Refreshments will be served and we will dismiss in time for the Grand Opening Parade for Field Day.

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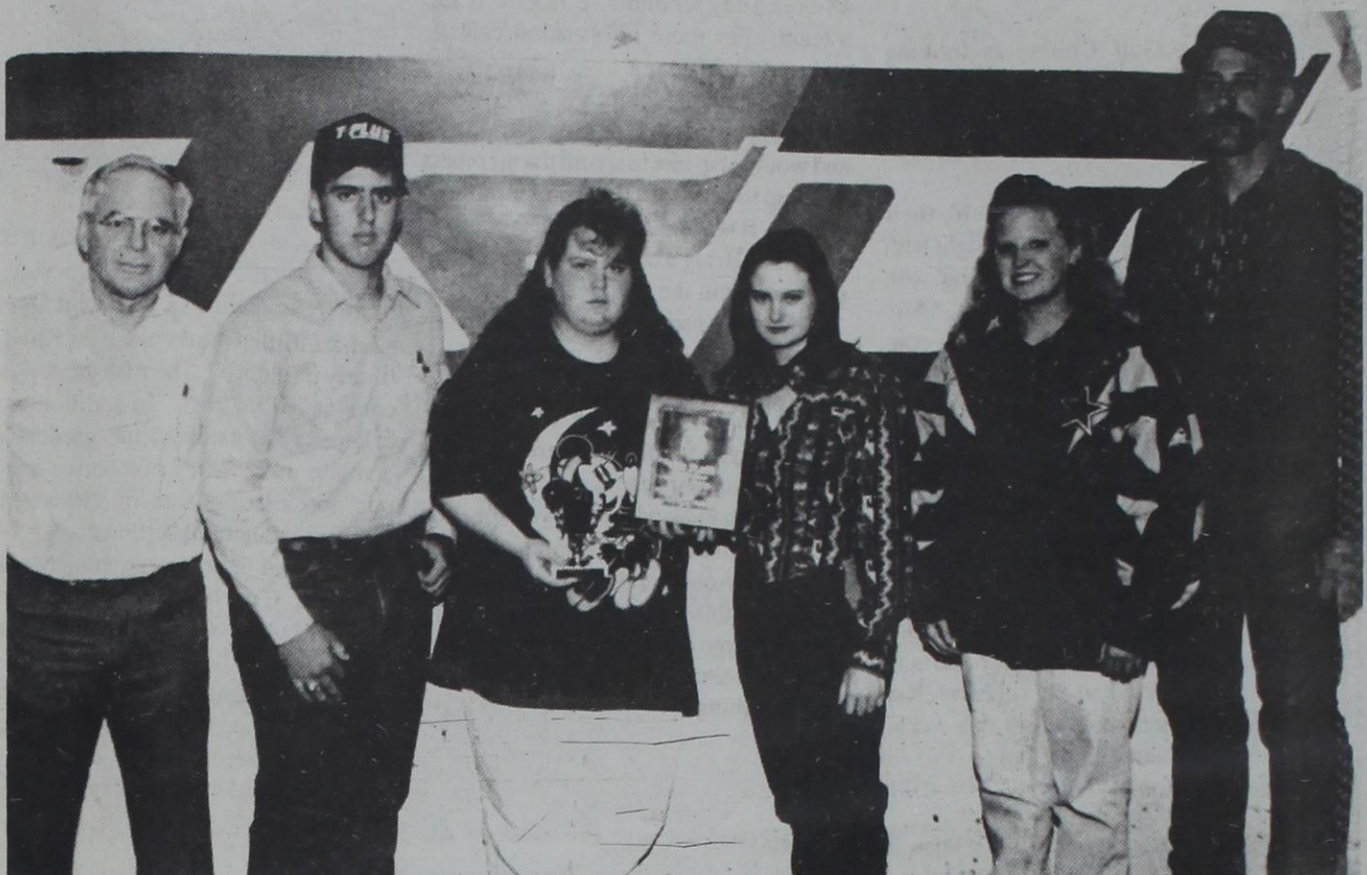
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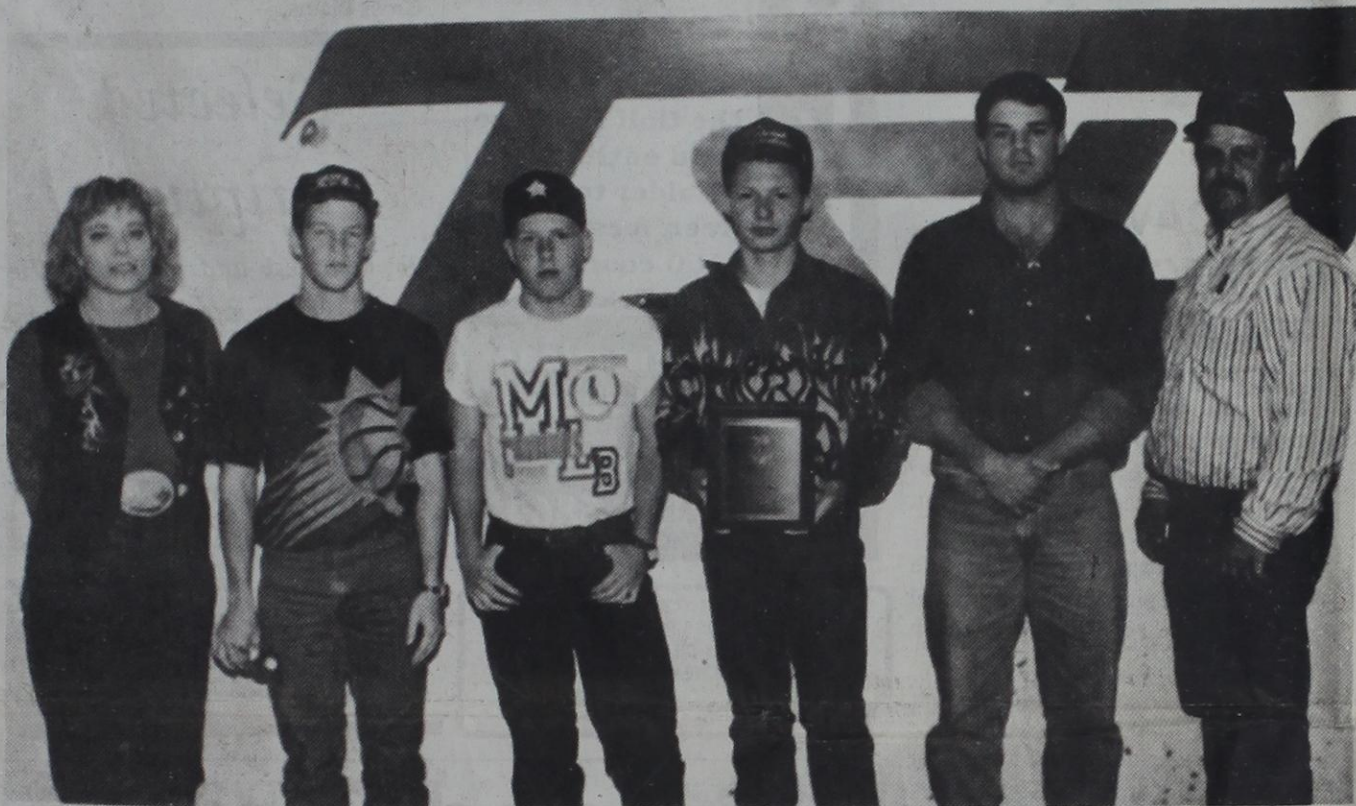
