



# **Buffaloes Win Bi-District In Overtime**

The Cross Plains Buffaloes squeaked by the May Tigers 65-60 in overtime last Friday at Brownwood High. It was a back and forth game that had seven lead changes in the fourth quarter alone.

The first quarter saw the Runnin' Buffs jump out to a 19-11 lead with Joseph Turner, Brock Walker and Donnie Dillard all having 4 points a piece. Jeremy Barnett gave the Buffs a big momentum boost at the end of the quarter with a beautiful 3 pointer from the top of the

The second stanza saw May take advantage of numerous missed shots by the Buffaloes. The Tigers outscored Cross Plains this quarter but the Buffs took a 28-25 lead into the locker room at half.

May scored the first 8 points of the third quarter. After a Cross Plains time-out the Buffaloes established their inside game with Matt Reed leading the way. We struggled from the foul line this quarter hitting only 3 of 6 charity shots.

The fourth quarter was back and forth, Benji Blackstock hit two free throws down the stretch. May tied the game at 51 with 28 seconds to play. Cross Plains took a time out and failed to execute a final set play.

The Buffaloes jumped out in overtime thanks to 10 of 12 from the free throw line. Our defense shut down the Tigers 3 point barrage in overtime and we survived with a hard fought 65-60 win.

Matt Reed had his finest game as a Buffalo. Matt had 20 points, an astounding 21 rebounds, 4 steals, 3 assists, 6 blocked shots and took 1 charge. Brock Walker followed with 16 points, 7 rebounds, 3 steals, and 5 assists. Donnie Dillard had 14 points, 16 valuable rebounds and 4 assists. The rest of the scoring was Joseph Tumer with 6, Jeremy Barnett with 5 and Benji Blackstock with 4. Justin Richey and Jared Harris filled in at key times to help contribute to this playoff victory.

This is three out of four years that the Buffaloes have reached the Area game. This is a tribute to these kids' hard work and love for the game. Thanks to all the fans. The kids notice how much support they get. This brings our season record to 21 wins and 10 losses.

In other basketball game action, the Buffaloes defeated Jayton 66-51 and Rochelle 67-61. The last two years the Buffaloes have been undefeated in practice games for the playoffs. The teams we are playing are of course either





### Report Of The Callahan County Attorney's Office For 1994

By Allen Wright

Last year was a busy year in the Callahan County Attorney's Office, Our office records reflect that the office disposed of over 470 cases during the year in traffic, hot check, criminal misdemeanor cases, felony cases, motions to revoke and investigations.

The office filed 124 criminal misdemeanor cases in 1994 and disposed of 178 cases which includes motions to revoke probation and investigations. 27 active criminal cases were pending in County Court on December 30, 1994.

In District Court the Callahan County Attorney's Office disposed of 109 cases during 1994 which includes motions to revoke and investigations. 38 active felony cases were pending at the end of the year. The oldest active felony case pending is about two years old. This compares to four years as the oldest active case pending when the current term began. We hope to have that time cut to a year or less by the end of this

Several of the disposed cases referenced were investigations handled by the office that were not filed. However, not all investigations were included in the records. The pending figures do not include cases where warrants were issued but the defendant's whereabouts are unknown. These are not listed as active cases.

Four Petitions for Writ of Habeas Corpus for release of convicted defendants and three appeals were handled by the Callahan County Attorney's Office during 1994. All four petitions were denied by the Court of Appeals and the defendants remained in prison. Two of the three appeals have been dismissed and the defendants

Two forfeiture cases were successfully prosecuted by the office resulting in forfeiture of over \$50,000 in illicit drug money to the county and the prosecutor's office. The County Attorney's share of this money was used

to fund a full-time investigator and additional peace officer for the county. Three felony trials and one

misdemeanor trial were held during

1994 resulting in three convictions. 77 traffic cases were appealed to county court in 1994 and 79 cases, including cases filed in 1993, were disposed by the County Attorney's

A total of 102 hot check warrants were issued in 1994 and a total of 105 hot check warrants were disposed of this number includes check cases filed in 1994 and also previous years. The Callahan County Sheriff's Office is to be commended for their hard work on issuing and serving these hot check warrants. It should also be noted that

many hot check cases are collected and

the funds distributed by the office

without formal charges being filed. A total amount of \$40,566.57 was collected by this office in 1994 for hot checks of which \$25,923.62 was restitution collected for the hot check victims in the community. The rest of the fines and fees were distributed to State agencies and Callahan County according to the law.

In addition, several Justice Court trials were conducted for traffic offenses and prosecuted by the County Attorney's



The local pack pays for awards, insignia, transportation, materials, upkeep and utilities on the hut from dues and earning projects such as popcorn sales. Our local pack is also the only one known to renew the boy's registration fees for them after the first year, as long as they stay in the program. The Chartered Organization (Methodist Church, locally) provides pack meeting room from its own resources. The Council provides unity service, camping facilities, training, insurance, office service, award, insignia, uniform gear, and material sales, and a paid professional staff of seven for guidance and assistance. They also allot a specified amount each year to make sure that every interested young person has the opportunity to be in scouts regardless of financial condition, handicap or location. Two-thirds of their support comes from United Way, activities, trust funds and grants. The other third is wholly dependent on donations to F.O.S. There is no minimum or maximum amount to be donated. Money can be mailed to Friends of Scouting C/O Chisolm Trail Council 3233 S. Willis, Abilene, Texas 79605. You may use Mastercard, Visa, Check or Money Order. You can donate a set amount and be billed by the month, quarterly, or for the year, or you can send a small one-time donation.

FACT: Chisolm Trail Council spent over \$400,000 in 1994 to support 3400 scouts, 120 packs, troops and posts. FACT: It costs \$120 for one boy annually to be in the program. FACT: There has been discussion of closing some service centers. Ours is one of them. FACT: The next closest service centers for our area are San Angelo, Wichita Falls, and Dallas. 





#### Widening and reconstruction of FM 604 (Elm Street) in Clyde is high on the

Department of Transportation's priority list, said Clyde City Administrator Robert Bradshaw.

Bradshaw said the City of Clyde was informed the 1995 Transportation Improvement Plan for Taylor and Callahan County includes widening of Elm Street

Randy Eaton, design manager for the Department of Transportation said the Elm Street project is number two on the transportation department's priority list. If funded, Elm Street in Clyde would be reconstructed from the south access road of Interstate 20 south to the intersection of FM 18.

The one-half of one mile project is estimated to cost \$230,000.

Currently FM 604 (Elm Street) has two 10 foot traffic lanes and no shoulders. The narrow city street also has drainage problems.

The proposed work includes widening FM 604 to two 12 foot traffic lanes with two eight foot shoulders. The project would also include adding safety lighting and landscaping. According to the transportation department's improvement plan, the project has "strong public support."

Bradshaw said the transportation department would make a decision in late March of 1995 whether to fund the FM 604 widening and reconstruction. He said the city should receive word back from the transportation department sometime in April.

Bradshaw said the city has already received word that left turn lanes will be added to FM 18 (South First Street) at the intersection with FM 604 (Elm Street) in Clyde.

He said because the restriping of FM 18 will cost under \$20,000, the project will not be bid but will be performed by the transportation department itself.

The city administrator said the transportation department will restripe FM 18 in order to add left turn lanes onto FM 604 at the city's only traffic light. It is hoped by adding left turn lanes, traffic will flow more smoothly when trains block the FM 604 railroad crossing

Highway 206 Reconstruction Soon

Bradshaw added the left turn lane of FM 18 in front of the elementary school is also scheduled to be lengthened by the transportation department. He said the left turn lane of FM 18 will run from Paisano Drive west to Sherwood Lane.

The number one priority project on the improvement plan is the reconstruction of State Highway 283 from the intersection of State Highway 36 north for

Highway 283 currently has two eleven foot traffic lanes with no shoulders. The project calls for widening Highway 283 to two eleven foot traffic lanes and two four foot shoulders and other safety work. The project cost is estimated at \$694,967.

The number three, four and five projects on the priority list are located in Taylor County.

Number six on the priority list is reconstruction of State Highway 206 in Cross Plains. The project would reconstruct Highway 206 from the city limits south to the city limits.

The project length is two miles and the estimated cost is \$575,000.

Currently, Highway 206 in Cross Plains has two 12 foot traffic lanes and two six foot shoulders. The current sidewalks are in poor condition.

The proposed work calls for resurfacing Highway 206, adding new sidewalks, repair existing sidewalks and lighting features.

The number 11 priority list project on the improvement plan is reconstruction of Spur 189 (Oak Street) in Clyde. Bradshaw said because this project is

so low on the transportation department's priority list, he is not optimistic it will be funded.

The project, 0.6 of one mile in length, is projected to cost \$235,000. The proposed work calls for widening Spur 189, adding flex base to the roadway, resurfacing and safety lighting features.

average bill for a typical residential customer could increase by \$7, based on the average usage of 1,000 kwh per month.

In a separate action, WTU announced a settlement offer to parties in the proceeding that could continue a base rate revenue reduction of \$5.9 million.

Under the settlement proposal, the bill for a typical residential customer could be \$1 to \$2 less per month than their bull under the current permanent rates. The company established a period until April 17, to consider this settlement.

"As part of the proposal that would position WTU for the future, we are introducing new pricing structures to help us attract and retain business in West Texas," said Travis Williams, area manager

Under WTU's proposal, new pricing structures would result in some customers experiencing an overall rate decrease greater than the current interim reduction of 3.25 percent. At the same time, some customers would experience an overall rate decrease of less than 3.25 percent. But, with the exception of standby customers, no customer would see their overall rates increase above rates in effect prior to October 1.

However, WTU said it won't know what the final outcome will be until after the conclusion of either a settlement or hearings in Austin.

WTU's base rates have not increased since 1987. Since that time, the Consumer Price Index has increased 34.2 percent and postage stamps have gone up 44.5 percent.

"WTU has a mutual interest with our cities in seeing West Texas grow and prosper. Because of our continuing competitive initiative, we have presented a proposal to maintain the overall base rate revenue at the reduced level of 3.25 percent," said Williams.

"We believe this proposal will ensure continuing economic growth and prosperity in West Texas," Williams added.
