Thursday will be Senior Citizens Night. All senior citizens are invited to attend that evening. (If you need transportation, call the church at 725-7629.)

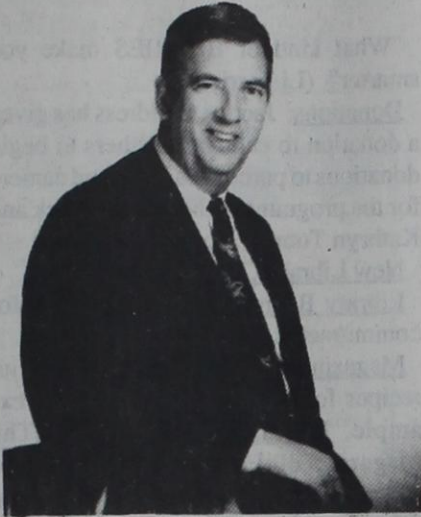
Friday is "Bring a neighbor night". If you plan to attend, then Friday night you need to invite your neighbor to join you.

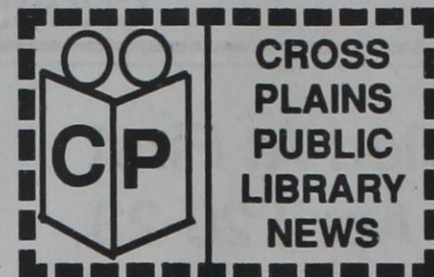
Participants will view demonstrations which address double cropping winter

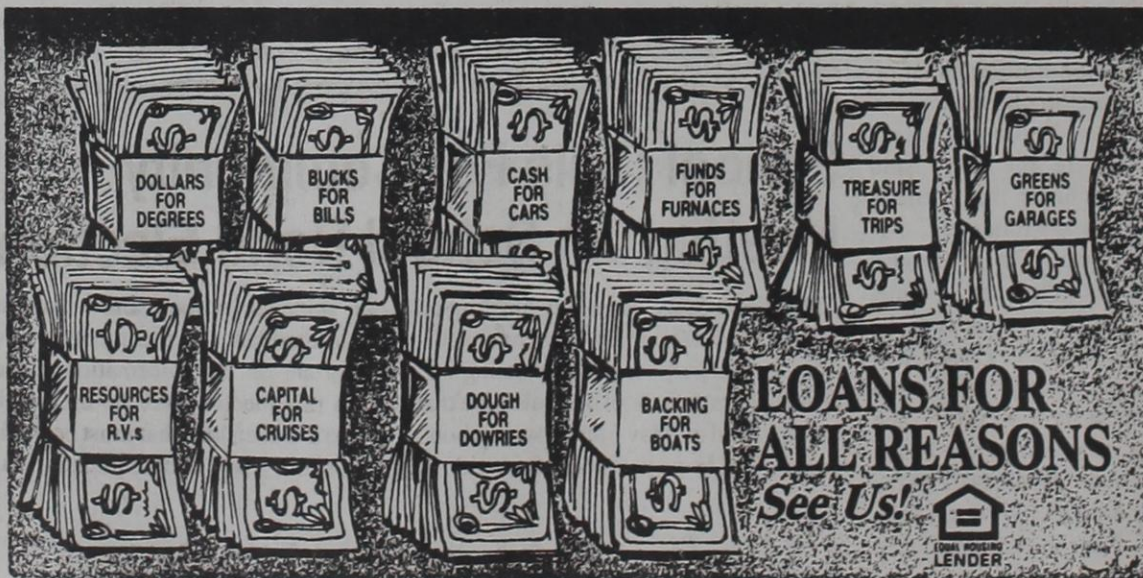

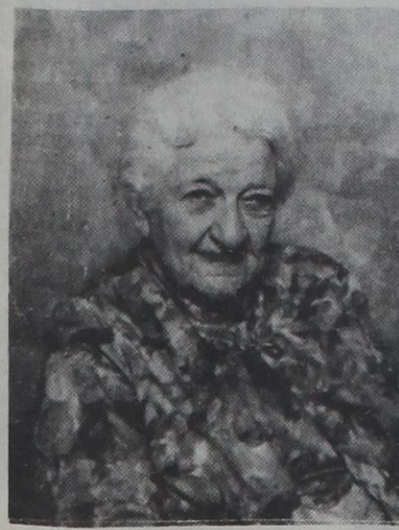

Many preachers have used the title and idea of a colleague's sermon, entitled "It's Friday — but Sunday's Coming!", and prepared, then preached their own. It's a dynamic thought: On Friday of the crucifixion, everything seemed to be going Satan's way. But Sunday (and the resurrection) was coming! The tables were turned. What seemingly was disaster and defeat turned into the strongest testimony ever for Christianity.

The resurrection of Jesus Christ became a point of fact and persuasion in the early preachers' sermons, Acts 2:22-36; 3:12-26 (esp. vv. 15, 26); 4:2, 3, 33. Paul used the fact of Jesus' resurrection as a proof of future judgment, Acts 17:31. Some mocked, others wanted to hear more, some believed without further questions or explanation and became Christians, Acts 17:32-34.

Response to the happening on that Sunday, and the proclamation of it since the Sunday of Acts 2, has continued to be varied — all the way from a flat denial to "So what if it's Friday — SUNDAY'S COMING!" Josh McDowell says if one denies Christ's resurrection, he's denying the most documented historical fact ever! The apostle John, in Revelation, says to believe in the resurrection of Christ, then live in the promise of it, is to say that it really makes no difference what Satan and all his helpers may do, Christ and I are winners — VICTORIOUS! — in the end.

What is your response to Christ's resurrection? For starters, let us be raised with Him and in His likeness, Romans 6:1-11. Then let us proclaim His death until He comes in partaking of His Lord's Supper, 1 Corinthians 11:23-26. And for certain, let us live each day "in the shadow of the cross," and the promises it affords. It's Friday — but Sunday's coming!!

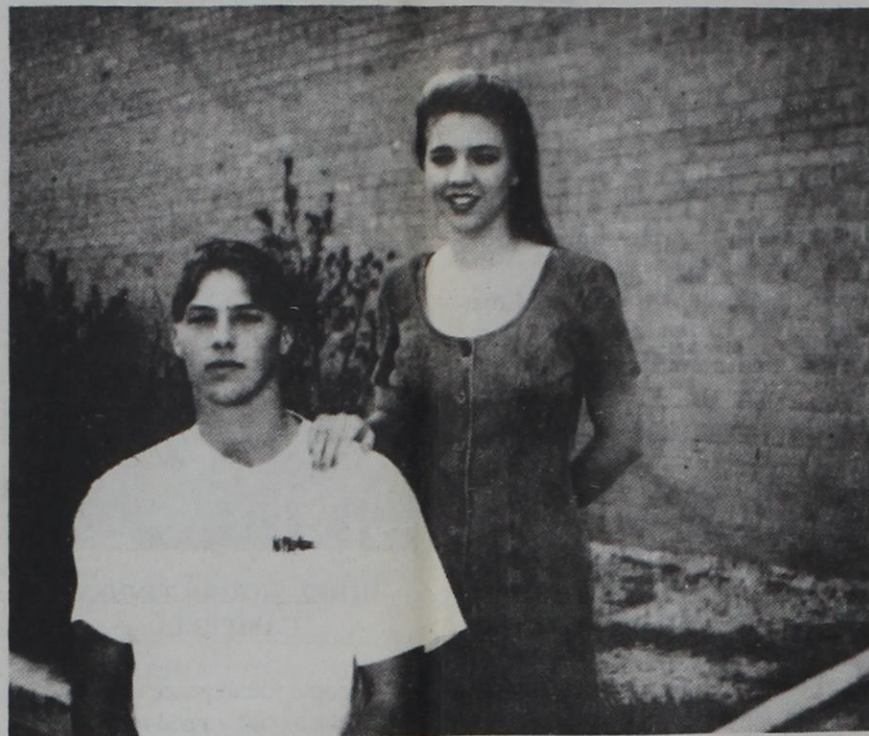

Fecal sample should be fresh and taken to the Callahan County Farmers Co-op from 9:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m. on Tuesday, April 18. A zip-lock bag should be used for the fecal sample.

An evening meal will be served and producers who plan to attend should call the County Extension Office 915-854-1518 or the Callahan County Farmers Co-op by noon Thursday, April 13.

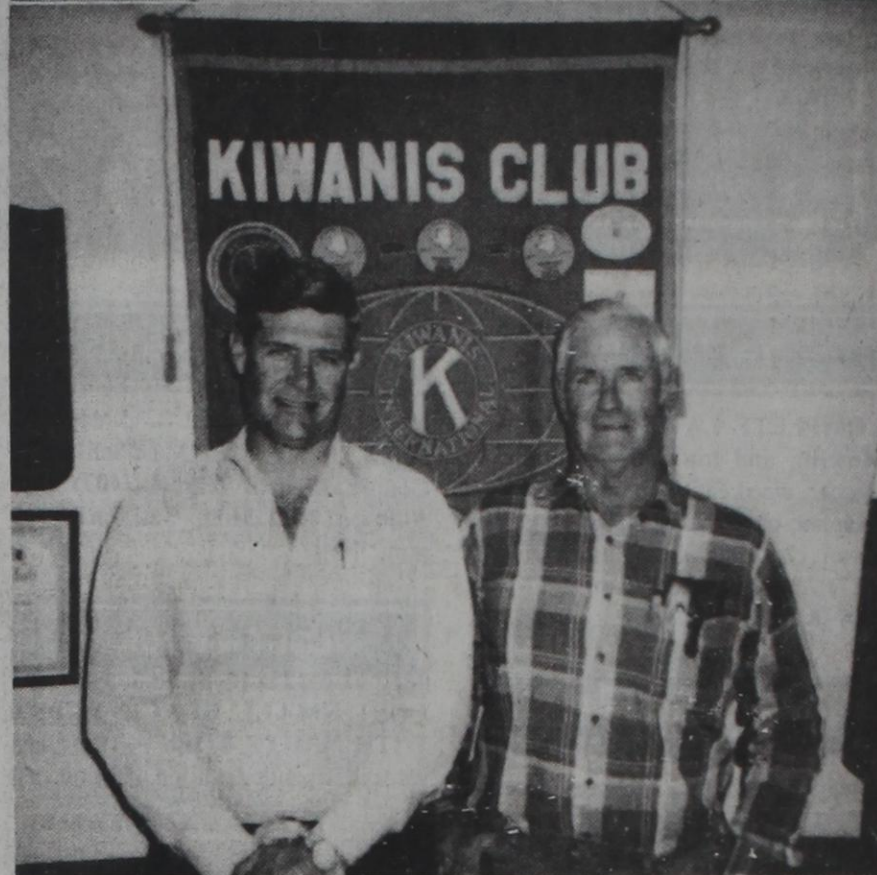

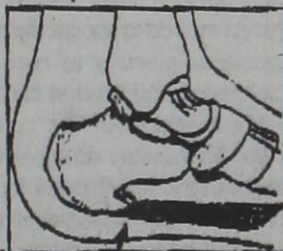

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in the CROSS PLAINS INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT on the 6th day of May, 1995, in accordance with a resolution adopted by the Board of Trustees, which is a part of this notice for all purposes and reads as follows:

A RESOLUTION ordering a bond election to be held in the Cross Plains Independent School District, making provision for the conduct of the election and resolving other matters incident and related to such election.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Cross Plains Independent School District hereby finds that an election should be held to determine whether said governing body shall be authorized to issue bonds of said district in the amount and for the purpose hereinafter identified; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CROSS PLAINS INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

SECTION 1: An election shall be held on the 6th day of May, 1995, in the Cross Plains Independent School District, which date is forty-five (45) or more days from the date of the adoption hereof and is a uniform election date pursuant to V.T.C.A., Election Code, Section 41.001, for the purpose of submitting the following measure:

"SHALL the Board of Trustees of the Cross Plains Independent School District in Callahan, Brown, Coleman and Eastland Counties, Texas be authorized to issue bonds of the district in the principal amount of \$1,100,000 for the construction and equipment of school buildings in the district; and shall there be pledged and levied, assessed and collected annually ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the district sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds as the same become due; said bonds to mature serially or otherwise not more than TWENTY-FIVE (25) years from their date, to be issued in one or more series at any price or prices, and to bear interest at such rate or rates (fixed, floating, variable or otherwise) not to exceed the maximum rate permitted by law at the time of issuance of the bonds) as in its discretion the Board of Trustees shall determine?"

SECTION 2: The entire District shall constitute one election precinct for this election and the Cross Plains Community Center, 108 N. Beach, Cross Plains, Texas is hereby designated the polling place. The persons hereby appointed to serve as the election officers at said polling place are as follows:

PAUNICE OGLESBY PRESIDING JUDGE
DONNA WAGNER ALTERNATE PRESIDING JUDGE

The Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two (2) nor more than four (4) qualified clerks to serve and assist in holding said election; provided that if the Presiding Judge herein appointed actually serves, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of the clerks.

On election day the polls shall be open from 7:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.

The Cross Plains City Hall, 201 S. Main, Cross Plains, Texas 76443 is hereby appointed clerk at such early voting place. Early voting for this election shall begin April 17, 1995 and end May 2, 1995, and the hours designated for early voting by personal appearance shall be from 8:00 A.M. to 12:00 noon and from 1:00 P.M. to 5:00 P.M. on each day, except Saturdays, Sundays and official State holidays.

For purposes of processing ballots cast in early voting, the election officers of the aforesaid polling place shall also serve as the Early Ballot Board for this election.

SECTION 3: Paper ballots shall be used in this election, which ballots shall be prepared in accordance with V.T.C.A., Election Code, and permit electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid measure which shall appear on the ballot substantially as follows:

"THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS IN THE AMOUNT OF \$1,100,000 FOR THE CONSTRUCTION AND EQUIPMENT OF SCHOOL BUILDINGS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF"

SECTION 4: All resident qualified electors of the District shall be permitted to vote at said election. This election shall be held and conducted in accordance with the V.T.C.A. Election Code, except as modified by the provisions of the Texas Education Code, and as may be required by law, all election materials and proceedings shall be printed in both English and Spanish.

SECTION 5: A substantial copy of this resolution shall serve as proper notice of said election. Said notice, including a Spanish translation thereof, shall be published at least one time in a newspaper of general circulation in said District and the publication of said notice of election shall occur in said newspaper not more than thirty (30) days and not less than ten (10) days before the day of the election.
