City Council Minutes

July 3, 1995

This was a regular meeting of the Cross Plains City Council. Members present were Mayor Gene Dillard, Ray Purvis, Edwin Weiss, Ray Womack, Jerry Cassle, and James Nichols.

Ray Purvis move to accept the minutes of the previous meeting as read. Edwin Weiss seconded and the motion carried.

Buzz McKethan, TMS Group Representative, met with the council to update them on the status of the Housing Rehabilitation Program. He discussed Eula Fay Jackson, Steve and Evelyn Parker, and Eddie and Anita Rose's contracts and the amendments to these contracts. He discussed WTU's "Good Cents" program and an estimate from WTU/Bob Bien concerning the cost for a total electric home vs. a gas home. Greg Turner, Dal-Mar Representative, also presented cost figures on a gas home vs. a total electric home. Buzz informed the council that the contractors had informed him that the difference in price for total electric homes would be \$2500 cheaper than putting in gas appliances and gas heating. With that consideration in mind, Jerry Cassle moved to go total electric and accept the amendments to the contacts as presented. Ray Purvis seconded and the motion carried.

Jim Cotter, City Auditor, met with the council to go over the 94/95 audit in its entirety and answered all the councils questions. Ray Purvis moved to accept the audit as presented. James Nichols seconded and the motion carried.

Joel Johnson, GTE Representative, met with the council to go over the proposed Right of Way Ordinance. By general consent Debbie Gosnell is to check with Ross Jones, City Attorney, and present him GTE's wording on the recommendation he had made to the ordinance to see if he approves of the wording. If he is in agreement with the wording, Debbie Gosnell is to contact Joel Johnson to have GTE incorporate the changes in the R.O.W., and present it again at the next meeting. If he is not in agreement with their wording, then Debbie is to contact Joel with that information also. However, to be eligible for the incentive fees, the council must have at least read the ordinance one time by July 15; therefore, Jerry Cassle moved to pass the first reading of the R.O.W. Ordinance contingent upon the wording of the cable service section upon the approval of Ross Jones. Edwin Weiss seconded and the motion carried with four voting for and James Nichols voting against.

Ray Purvis moved to pay the bills. Ray Womack seconded and the motion

Jerry Cassle moved to reappoint Ray Purvis as Mayor Pro Tem. James Nichols seconded the motion and it

Edwin Weiss moved to adjourn. Jerry Cassle seconded and the motion carried.



With report cards about ready to come out in Cheyenne, Wyoming, teachers were given a list of tactful ways to tell parents that their children were liars, cheats, loudmouths and clods, bullies, lazy, selfish, dirty and babyish --with instructions to use more tactful words and descriptions. Instead of telling parents a child was a bully, for instance, the teacher was advised to say he "had qualities of leadership but needed help in learning how to use them more democratically." And a student who lied only had "difficulty in distinguishing between the imaginary and the factual." A noisy student "needed to develop quieter habits of communication" -- I mean, we're talking about the loudmouth! Well, you can imagine the more diplomatic description of the other "traits" but another that really illustrates the absurdity in at least some instances is this one: the student who associated with gangs "seemed to feel secure only in group situations and needed to develop a sense

Now I appreciate tact. I believe there's a place for diplomacy. I even see the benefit of using some of these descriptions instead of "telling it like it is." But some of it reminds me of a question posed by an author/psychologist in asking, "Whatever happened to sin?" Nowadays, it's called everything but what it is. Can't you Imagine how the Galilean would have had to change the command to "Repent or perish," Luke 13:3, or how Stephen would have had to rephrase "You stiffnecked and uncircumcised in heart and ears..."? (Acts 7:51) Of course they were both martyred -- but look at the influence they each had on the lives of others for good, and the lives that were changed. Let's not let tact and diplomacy whitewash sin and truth. In saving face we may lose souls...

Criminals Do the Crimes. Texans Pay the Price

ince 1991, Constable Victor Trevino of Houston and his volunteer "Zebra" squad have arrested more than 3,000 violent criminals who were out on parole. The people of Houston might well ask why such individuals were running around loose.

The short answer to that question is this: A federal court has virtually taken control of Texas' state prison system and imposed population caps that force the early release of violent criminals. This situation has been repeated all over our country. One-third of all crime in the United States is committed by criminals on parole or probation. Texas inmates serve an average of two months for every year of their sentences.

I think most Texans would agree that prisons exist primarily for the protection of society, not for the comfort and convenience of criminals. People everywhere are dismayed at the results of court-imposed requirements that force the early release of felons back onto our streets.

This interference by the federal courts has forced states such as Texas to put the interests of criminals ahead of the interests of innocent, law-abiding citizens. The Ruiz case, which began in 1972 and wasn't settled until 1992,

resulted in a federal court order imposing conditions on how and where new Texas prison beds could be built. In one instance, the court prohibited construction on prisons grounds that were used for a baseball field, telling prison officials that they could not use recreation space for housing without first replacing it with more recreation space.

In other words, the court ordered the state to give the maintenance of outdoor recreation areas such as baseball fields a higher priority than keeping criminals behind bars.

Nor has the courts' prescription for Texas' prison system been cheap. Court-mandated prison population caps will cost Texas taxpayers \$610 million a year for the next five years.

In order to put an end to this, I have introduced legislation in the Senate that would return control of Texas prisons to Texans - and the control of state prisons nationwide back to the people of those states. My bill, sponsored in the House by Rep. Bill Archer of Houston, is called the Stop Turning Out Prisoners Act, or STOP.

It would prevent federal courts from using one prisoner's lawsuit to take over an entire prison system, as occurred in the Ruiz case. It would prohibit federally imposed population caps unless a plaintiff can prove that overcrowding is the primary problem and there is no other

And it contains provisions to discourage frivolous lawsuits filed by prisoners, who realize their nuisance value. One prisoner who filed suit demanding the right to pornographic magazines said, "Every dollar they spend fighting a lawsuit is a dollar they can't spend building a place to lock me up." In 1993, prisoners filed 53,713 lawsuits - 7,615 more suits than the federal government filed against criminals.

It seems to me that this has gone too far. Inmates have taken over the institution — aided and abetted by the federal courts. If Texans decide the rights of victims are more important than indulging criminals, Texas and other states ought to be free to set prison standards which reflect

Breeding Family Reunion July 22

Descendants of Hugh Landon Breeding held their annual family reunion on Saturday, July 22, at the Cross Plains Multi-Purpose Center. Hugh L. Breeding was the son of John H. and Nancy Jane Gragg Breeding. The family arrived in Texas from Tennessee in 1874. Hugh Breeding often told of how the family traveled in a covered wagon for 3 years before reaching Texas. They came by way of Kentucky, going through Missouri to find a shallow place to cross the Mississippi River, and on into Oklahoma. They first stopped in Denton County but water was scarce so the family moved to Comanche County a year later, and two years later, in 1877, to the Cottonwood area. Their children were Hugh Landon Breeding, Winnie L. Breeding Shuford, Thomas W. Breeding, William E. Breeding, who died of typhoid pneumonia in 1900 at the age of 25, and Mary, who dies as an infant in 1880 and was the first person buried in the Cottonwood Cemetery.

Hugh Landon Breeding married Sarah Callie Breeding on November 26, 1890, in Belle Plaine. The couple lived in Cottonwood and had 8 children: John M., Walter, Mary Ettie (Jones), Leonard, Gussie (Oglesby), Ardis

(Scrivner), Arvie, and Arlic Lee. Arlie Lee lived in Cottonwood until his death in 1990. His widow, Ora Clark Breeding continues to own the family farm in Cottonwood and now lives in Cross

Veterans of World War II who served in the Battle of the Bulge, will meet in San Antonio, September 3-6. The Battle of the Bulge was the greatest battle ever fought by the United States Army. A sparsely spread line of American troops held firm against three powerful German armies, until reinforcements arrived. They paid a heavy price of over 81,000 casualties. Over 19,000 young Americans laid down their lives in this battle.

(VBOB) will hold their annual reunion in conjunction with the VJ Day "End of the War Gala" and 50th Anniversary of the Peace Accords which will immediately precede the VBOB observance. 

GRANDPARENTS' VISITATION RIGHTS IN TEXAS

It used to be that grandparents thad no rights under the law when it came to seeing their grandchildren after a divorce. The law spoke of the rights and obligations of parents, the children, and other interested parties. Grandparents, however, were not even considered. That has changed, and state family law now makes specific reference to grandparents' rights of access to their grandchildren.

Sometimes when parents divorce or separate, the parent granted custody does not want the child to see the relatives of the noncustodial parent. Grandparents can be caught in the middle and denied access to their grandchildren. State law provides a vehicle by which grandparents can establish their right to visit their grand-

Who determines the right to see grandchildren? If the custodial

parent does not want such visits to ent is in the best interest of the child. Circumstances vary so much from family to family, however, that a family lawyer should to be consulted.

How can visitation rights be established?

is not automatic. If you are a grandparent and are denied access, you must sue the custodial parent in order to establish your visitation rights. The family law court then determines if it is in the best interest of the child for him or her to see you.

the right to visit grandchildren? Not always. As a grandparent, you may lose your right to visit your grandchild if the child has been put up for adoption by someone other than the child's parents. For example, if the child is to be adopted by someone other than a family member, you may lose your right to visit if you do not take timely action.

For more information

Remember every case is not the same, and it is best that you contact a private attorney who is versed in family law in order to determine how the law may apply in your situation. When you hire a lawyer, you should be very clear on what services are expected of him or her. Do not be reluctant to talk business - know what the fee is going to be before you commit yourself.



beginning next season. To ensure that all teams feel successful, we will not keep score. It is more important that the team learn the process and finish the game at the skill level determined by the coach rather than be winners. To make sure everyone meets all the outcomes, poor players

must be given more practice time and coaching. No scores will be kept and no winners will be announced. During games, anyone who fails to make goals, double dribbles, fouls, or displays an uncooperative attitude toward the process, will be remediated / during time-outs. The better players must sit on the bench, nelp coach the others until they demonstrate the right moves, or engage in enrichment activities such as playing tag. These games will last much longer, so be prepared to stay

All teams will complete 12 games and will receive the same trophy. No records will be kept, no statistics will be needed, nor will we need any play-offs, all-star teams, or recognition O.B.E. is programming children to take banquets. Trophies will be meaningless, but everyone will get

Psycho-behavioral basketball experts feel that this will increase the self-esteem of every player, who will feel great about his/her accomplishments. We discourage playing any games against teams that don't have the same regulations. It would be unfair competition to play against teams that emphasize excellence and winning. The peer pressure of not being part of our group should be sufficient motivation to conform the "traditional" team to the Outcome-Based Basketball Model.

This is Outcome-Based Basketball, where excellence is relative, everyone is equal, everyone feels great about his/her performance, and all players work to their highest potential so long as it does not exceed the skill level determined by the coach.

"Everyone can play basketball"

Is this really what we want for our athletes .. or worse vet, for our academic programs?
