\section*{HEARING MAY 22}

Callahan County Commissioners will hold a public hearing Monday, May 22 to receive public input about the possi-
bility of raising the local vehicle registration fee from \(\$ 5.00\) to \(\$ 10.00\) annually.
Callahan Coünty Commissioners met Monday, April 24 in a regular commissioners' court meeting to discuss raising the local vehicle registration fee and agreed on hold the public hearing first. Currently, all county residents pay an additional \(\$ .00\) to the county's road arld bridge fund when they pay their state vehicle registration fee. The \(\$ 5.00\) local fee was approved by the county com missioners August 14, 1989. The public hearing is scheduled for \(10.00 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}\). in the Commissioners Baird Monday, May 22.
Callahan County Tax Assessor/Collector Bun Barry said the \(\$ 5.00\) local fee raises in excess of \(\$ 59,000\) for the county road and bridge fund.
There are some 19,000 registered ve hicles and trailers in the county which pay the state vehicle registration fee. Only farm trailers are exempt from paying the \(\$ 5.00\) local registration fee Barry said.
"This (local vehicle registration fee) is as close to a user tax as there is," Barry said.
County Judge Bill Johnson said approximately half of the counties in the state charge a \(\$ 10.00\) local fee registration. He said some 124 counties charge \(\$ 10.00\), there are nine counties which charge a \(\$ 5.00\) local registration fee. The county judge said all monies collected from the \(\$ 5.00\) local fee are put into the county's road and bridge fundnothing goes into the county's general fund.
Johnson went on to say the county commissioners are considering raising the local vehicle registration fee "to put more materials on county roads." Monies collected for the road and bridge fund are used to purchase road material and equipment to maintain county roads.

MEETING

Callahan County Commissioners voted to discontinue one county road and establish a new county roard court meeting Monday, May 8 at the county courthouse in Baird.
After posting notice of discontinuing County Road \#413, commissioners voted to return the road to a private road after receiving no complaints about the
closing of the roadway.
Hugh Shrader had met with the com-
Hugh Strader had met with the comroad be closed to public traffic.
Commissioners also ve raffic.
Private Road \#1126 as a new county road. The roadway is located in Commissioner Harold Hicks' precinct. Hicks recommended the private road be established as a county road for county maintenance after the roadway met all county road requirements. The roadway will receive a new county road number using the 911 emergency numbering system.
Other items brought before commis-
sioners included:
-Commissioners reviewed and signed the minutes of the previous meeting.
-Commissioners arranged for the Wednesday, May 10.
- Commissioners met with Inez Wylie in regards to discontinuing a county road north of Putnam. Wylie told commissioners that all property owners on the roadway signed an agreement closing the roadway to public traffic. The notice of the roadway closing will be posted for 20 days and if the county receives no witen response, the road way will be returned to a private road.
