County Considering Paging System For Firefighters

R.S. Nov. 3 & 4 Callahan County Commissioners, meeting in a regular meeting Monday, October 23, approved an agreement The First United Methodist Church in with the West Central Texas Council of Rising Star will hold their annual Lord's Governments for the Meals on Wheels Acre Friday, November 3, and Saturprogram in Callahan County.

> Commissioners voted to approve the agreement which provides meals to the elderly and handicapped in the county. The agreement includes an annual contribution to the program by the county in the amount of \$6,000.

County Judge Bill Johnson said the \$6,000 contribution to the program is the same as last year. He added the contribution by the county only funds the Meals on Wheels program in the

Other items brought before commissioners court included:

-Commissioners voted to nominate Bruce Williams of Baird to serve as a director of the Central Appraisal District of Callahan County. The item was tabled from a previous meeting. Williams, a former Baird School Board member, will serve his third term as a director of the appraisal district board.

-Commissioners met with Skip Hodges from the Baird Volunteer Fire Department to discuss a paging system for firefighters.

Hodges was asked by commissioners to meet with the other fire departments in the county to see if all county fire departments would be willing to switch to the new system of receiving fire calls. Commissioners also requested Hodges to get total costs of a countywide paging

Commissioners voted to table the item until the November 13 commissioners'

Judge Johnson said if the paging system is installed, each firefighter in the county would wear the clip-on pager and could be notified at anytime by the county dispatcher's office at the sheriff's department in Baird. He went on to say that fire station whistle would still be used by fire departments to notify residents during severe weather. Johnson said the pager system could also be distributed to ambulance personnel in

There are seven volunteer fire departments in the county which could use the paging system including fire departments in Clyde, Baird, Cross Plains, Eula, Oplin, Cottonwood and Putnam.

Judge Johnson said if the new paging system is approved, each county fire department would be asked to come up with a portion of the cost of the system.

A small voter turnout of under 1,000 is expected in the Tuesday, November 7 Constitutional Amendment Election in Callahan County. Although constitutional amendment elections historically draw low voter turn-outs, state election officials are encouraging Texas residents to vote, pointing out that the results may drastically affect the way tax dollars are collected and spent.

Voters are urged to study the 14 propositions on the Tuesday ballot carefully and make the extra effort to get to the polls.

Polls will be open Tuesday from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. at the following voter precincts in Callahan County: Cross Plains Community Center in Cross Plains for Precinct #4 voters; Clyde Lions Club Building for Precinct #1; Eula Lions Club Building for Precinct #2; Baird Housing Authority Building for Precinct #3; and Clyde Southside Baptist Church for Precinct #6. Your particular voting precinct is printed on your voter registration postcard.

For those unable to vote Tuesday, early voting will continue at three locations in the county until Friday, November 3. Early voting is taking place at the Cross Plains Justice of the Peace office, Clyde Justice of the Peace office, and the County Clerk's office at the Callahan County Courthouse in Baird. Early voting takes place from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m.

Suspect's Questioned In **House Fire**

Four Clyde youth have been questioned in a suspicious fire which destroyed a vacant house north of Clyde on Country Road 112 Wednesday, October

Donald Turk, an investigator with the state fire marshal's office, said the four suspects, all from Clyde, have been questioned. They were spotted by witnesses at the scene of the fire about three miles north of Clyde at 6:30 p.m. Wednesday.

"Somebody drove up and reported seeing them and the house on fire," Turk said.

One of the male suspects is a juvenile and three are adults. None has been charged with a crime. Instead, the case will be presented directly to the next grand jury. The next grand jury is expected to be summoned within the next couple of weeks at the Callahan County Courthouse in Baird.

Free Sentenced To 15 Years On **Cattle Fraud**

A Callahan County jury took just 30 minutes Thursday to sentence a Cross Plains man to 15 years in prison for cattle fraud.

Rodney Jackie Free, 42, received the sentence after a three day jury trial in Baird. He had been charged with one count of theft and one count of misapplication of fiduciary property. The four man, eight woman jury convicted Free of appropriating money he had obtained for purchasing cattle and converting it to his own use. Free was represented by Comanche attorney Ben Doyle Suddreth.

Callahan County Attorney Allen Wright commended the jury for sifting through a complicated and difficult set of facts to reach the verdict. Wright said the offense was part of a series of financial transactions involving the defendant while he acted as agent for several cattle buyers and sellers.

The actual facts of this case were simple, Wright said, but there was so much activity at the time that it complicated presentation of the case. The jury did an excellent job of clearing through the extraneous material introduced by the defendant to get to the heart of this offense, he said.

Free was convicted of theft of services earlier in the year and sentenced to two years in prison. He is out on bond pending appeal of that case. Wright says he expects an appeal on this case as well.



Maurene McCuin and this reporter spent a beautiful afternoon not too long ago, discussing the history of the Cross Plains Garden Club and reminiscing about days gone by. Mrs. McCuin's daughter Cynthia and I were classmates here in the Cross Plains Schools about 1947, '48 and '49, after which my family moved to Baird.

What follows is one woman's memories; pretty much in her own words; through the years, --- the Cross Plains and enjoy them---- Then after garden Garden Club and its history.

In the Fall of 1960, Mrs. Volly (Mildred) McDonough called a group of ladies to meet in her home to talk about organizing a garden club. She was so enthusiastic about the new organization! We all agreed.

If my memory is correct the following ladies were present, and became charter members: Mrs. J.C. Claborn, Mrs. Tom Cox, Mrs. Henry McCoy, Mrs. Don McCall, Mrs. C.L. Smith, Mrs. Mary Wagner, Mrs. H.A. Young, Mrs. Merlin Garrett, Mrs. Harry Coppinger, Mrs. Doyle Burchfield, Mrs. AJ. McCuin and Mrs. Volley McDonough. Our club was organized that day Bernice Claborn was elected president, and Mildred McDonough, vice president. The Cross Plains City Hall gave us permission to have our meeting in the rear of our city hall on the second Friday of each month --- September through

Our garden club was organized with the following objectives and purposes: To stimulate interest in growing plants and flowers at our homes. To encourage and assist young gardeners. To protect our native trees, wild flowers and wildlife. To assist in beautification of gardens, parks and highways and to encourage the study of flower arrang-

Our club grew and we learned a lot about planting, growing and arranging flowers. Our first flower show was in the spring of 1961. Display was in the back of the City Hall. We had learned a lot about flower arranging--but we had a lot more to learn. Of course we thought all the arrangements were beautiful----!

I remember talking with Imogene Cox--she said she used to gather flowers from her yard and stick them in a vase club study she had to see that she had, balance, line and form to her arrange-

Later years we had a flower show in the basement of the Presbyterian Church, School Cafeteria, Baptist Church and in adowntown building. We have lost a lot of good members and have gained new members and wonderful officers through the years.

In 1973, we bought the Garden Club Center located on Beech Street from the First Baptist Church and did a lot of improvements through the years. After the storm in May of 1994, we sold the building to the Cross Plains Masonic Lodge. We now meet in the Multi-Purpose Center.

After the death of my husband, A.J. McCuin in 1967, I had to drop out as an active member of the club and operate our family business. I retired from business in 1978 and became an active member again.

In the course of our interview and visit I discovered that almost every time Maurine's son, Jay visits he brings her some kind of plant or flower.

Thank you, Mrs. Maurine McCuin for a delightful visit and interview, and as Bob Hope says --- "for the memories."

If PROPOSITION 4 passes, the present Homestead protection will practically disappear-for all practical purposes.

Certain groups are putting out a smoke screen to cover up their real purposes. Proponents for passage are trying to tell us that this "owelty of partition" will greatly aid people who are getting a divorce to "divvy" up the homestead. However, divorcees have been settling that matter in other ways all through these years quite effectively.

Others wish to open a Pandora's box to getting loans on their equity by refinancing for other purposes such as student loans, taking a trip to Hawaii, getting a new car, etc., etc. Some are denying it, but the wording in the proposal

The worst part of Proposition 4 would allow the IRS greater foothold than it already has. People could load up an unpayable debt against their homestead by borrowing to pay off an IRS lien, which liens are often incorrect to begin

At present, the IRS can only file a lien but cannot foreclose on a homestead for income taxes. Read that last sentence carefully. It is true in spite of what you may have heard or read. If it were not

true, why are they wanting to add the clause about federal taxes? Huh?

NOVEMBER 2, 1995

Most of this extra borrowing will result in people losing their homesteads instead of keeping them, as the present Homestead protection allows. Presently the only way you can lose your homestead is 1) Not paying your mortgage, 2) Past due taxès ON the homestead (County, School, City), and 3) Improvements on the homestead agreed to by both spouses but not paid properly.

Herewith we show you the ugly actual wording of the proposed amendment, with the new change in boldface.

"The homestead of a family, or of a single adult person, shall be, and is. hereby protected from forced sale, for the payment of all debts except for the purchase money thereof, or a part of such purchase money, the taxes due thereon, an owelty of partition imposed against the entirety of the property by a court order or by a written agreement of the parties to the partition, including debt of one spouse in favor of the other spouse resulting from a division or an award of a family homestead in a divorce proceeding, the refinance of a lien against a homestead, including a. federal tax lien resulting from the tax debt of both spouses, if the homestead is a family homestead, or from the tax debt of the owner..."

As you can see, the words, "by court" order" are being added. Surely you know what that means in the hands of unscrupulous money lenders or lawyers or others of their ilk and trade.

It also clearly states, "the refinancing of a lien against a homestead" docsn't it? The way it is worded opens up the Pandora's box mentioned above.

Watch out for the lies and misdirection that proponents will and/or are using to get this proposition passed.

per bull. The top-selling Hereford bull sold for


\$6,250. The Moncrief family ranching operation at Weatherford bought the "WE Vision" bull. Perkins Protho took three bulls for



Texas Voters Can Help Create Jobs, Expand The Economy By Approving Proposition 3

There are more cows in Texas than people, yet almost all of them are sent out of state for processing before they become that T-bone steak you buy from your butcher. Texas grows enough onions to feed the entire Southwest, but we don't manufacture many onion rings.

Unless you have a recipe handed down from Grandma, you'll be hard-pressed to find Texas cucumbers being processed into pickles. And for all our amber waves of grain, there are few processors anywhere in Texas converting that grain into the snap, crackle and pop of breakfast cereal.

Come to think of it, when was the last time you saw a jar of Texas-processed peanut butter on the shelf of your local grocery store?

The innovative Texas companies that turn crops into finished products are leading the way toward the markets of the future. But they are few and far between.

Truth is, Texas produces more raw agricultural goods than any other state, but nearly 90 percent of those crops are then shipped out of state, where others benefit from the jobs created and the dollars added to their economies. And when those finished products arrive back on the shelves of your local grocery store, their prices reflect the miles and miles they've traveled.

On November 7, you and I have a unique chance to help change this situation. We can take an important step toward creating new jobs, opening an array of economic development opportunities for Texas communities, both large and small, and adding as many as \$22 billion to the state economy--all without raising a single tax or debt limits an extra penny. All we have to do is vote YES! on Proposition 3.

This constitutional amendment, sponsored by State Senator John Montford and State Representative Pete Patterson, would use \$200 million of existing bond authority already approved by voters a decade ago for the state's seldom-used Farm and Ranch Program for the same purposes as the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority's Loan Guaranty Program. In this way, these funds can be put to good use by local businesses.

The logic behind Proposition 3 is simple. In the past, Texas has built three great economic empires on the brawn of our natural resources--from cattle to cotton to crude oil. Our next economic empire will be built on the brains of our human resources. The skills, training and ingenuity of ordinary Texans in a wide range of industries will secure our future prosperity. And agriculture, the

second leading sector in our economy, will continue to play a key role.

For every new job in agricultural processing, for example, multiple spin-off jobs are also created. The more than three dozen loans made thus far by the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority have created or protected about 1,400 new jobs while leading to another 3,300 indirect jobs.

The ripple effect on the economy is equally impressive. Boosting the state's current 10 percent processing rate by only one percent could add \$2.2 billion a year to the Texas economy. Raising the rate to 20 percent-the national average-could mean an additional \$22 billion for the state economy next year, the year after that and every subsequent year for the foreseeable future.

But Proposition 3 isn't just about agricultural processing. According to the legislation, a wide range of economic development projects can benefit. Infrastructure improvements can be made to attract new businesses. Companies that have lost contracts due to base closings can retool. Local communities can tailor the help to their own unique


