No Decision Made On Hospital, Commissioners Lack Quorum

The Callahan County Commissioners postponed a meeting fate of the County Hospital because of lack of a quorum.

However, many citizens of Callahan County showed up to express their opinions and views to County Judge Mack Kniffen. No one at the meeting wants the County to operate the hospital.

Everyone who spoke their views on the subject of the hospital thought that the present lease was doing a fine job.

At this time, there are three parties

interested in leasing the Callahan General Hospital. Besides Dr. Laurence Gayao, who presently leases the hospital, there is a firm out of Dallas, the American Medical Management Corporation, and a firm from Tennessee, the United Hospital Corporation.

A called meeting will be held Friday, June 20 at 9 a.m. that will decide what is to be done with the hospital. The decision must be made before July 1.

Mayor H. L. "Buddy" Brame Announces Appointment of New City Secretary

Monday, June 16, a special called session of the Baird City Council met at 7 p.m. The 1st order of business was to hire a city secretary. Mr. Kenneth Neal, formerly of Anson was unanimously approved to replace Mr. A.E. Dyer Jr. as the Baird City secretary. Mr. Neal is single, 42 years of age, and a graduate of Hamlin High School and has attended 3 years at McMurry College in business administration. Prior to coming to Baird, Mr. Neal was the assistant manager of Anson, for 5 years. Mr. Neal also worked for a Dallas Construction firm for 8 years, as the assistant superintendent and 7 years as a terminal train master and station agent for the Ft. Worth and Denver Railroad.

Mayor Buddy Brame announced that Mr. Neal will be on a 4 month evaluation period when he officially begins his new job on Monday, June 23.

In further business, the City Council looked at bids they had received on the power plant and distribution system. One

bid was received for the equipment for \$40,500.00 from the Coastal Maintenance and Engineering Inc. Co. out of Pasadena, Texas. Two bids were received from the West Texas Utilities Co. One was for both the Distribution System and the power plant for \$248,224.00 and the other for the distribution system only for \$145,724.00. There was no decision made and the council will take action on these and further bids at a future date.

There was also a proposal from the City of Clyde to authorize use of the Baird Landfill. The proposal was discussed as well as the possible charge for such a proposal. The Council authorized Mayor Brame to work the proposal out with the City of Clyde for a 1 year contract.

The only other action taken was to clarify the fuel adj. charges which are passed on to the citizens of Baird.

The next regular meeting of the Baird City Council will be Monday, June 23 at 7 p.m. in the city hall building.

Tax Assessor's Office to Mail Re-appraisal Notices

The Tax-Assessor's Office will be mailing re-appraisal notices to all taxpayers of Callahan County. This is due to a law that passed last year which will go into effect January 1981. The order was recently passed by the Commissioners Court to comply with the law that was passed.

All property has to be assessed at market value.

Callahan County is currently being

assessed at 15% of market value.

The new value will be estimated at 100% market value.

The Board of Equalization will be meeting July 8, 1980 in the Commissioners Courtroom in the County courthouse. Anyone desiring to discuss the new assess value should attend.

The 1979 tax rate was \$1.20 and it is estimated the 1980 rate will be approximately \$.40.

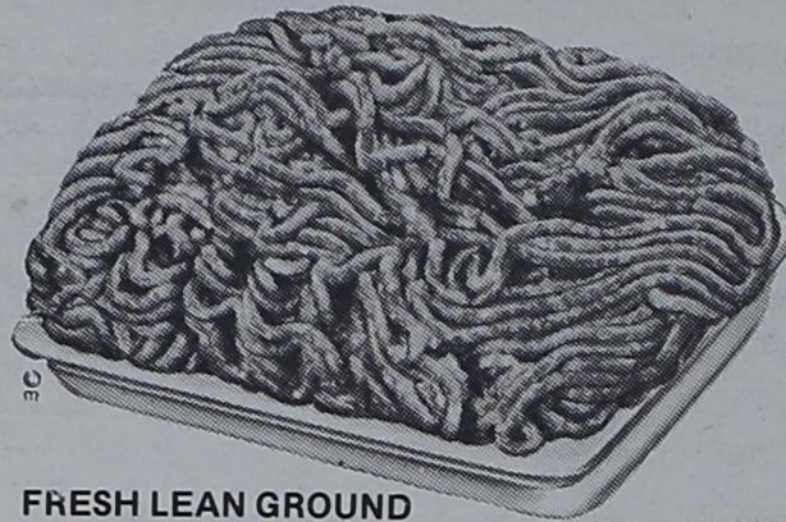



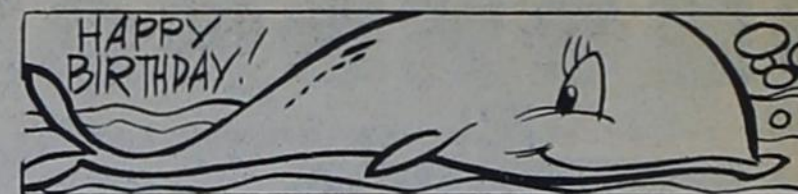

Location is 1,591 feet from the north and 528 feet from the east lines of H. Wagley Survey 8.

Daily potential was 65 barrels of 43 gravity oil, flowing through a 12-64 inch choke with 320 pounds tubing pressure.

Production is from perforations at 3,851-61 feet, treated with 500 gallons of mud acid.

The 4 1/2 inch casing is set at 3,950 feet. The hole was drilled to a total depth of 4,150 feet and plugged back to 3,950 feet.

Gas-oil ratio was 2,000-1.

The Sheriff's Department requests everyone to help keep the roadsides clean. Anyone caught dumping trash along the sides of county roads and highways will be fined.

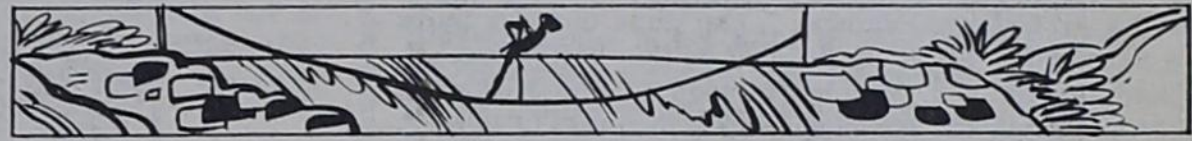

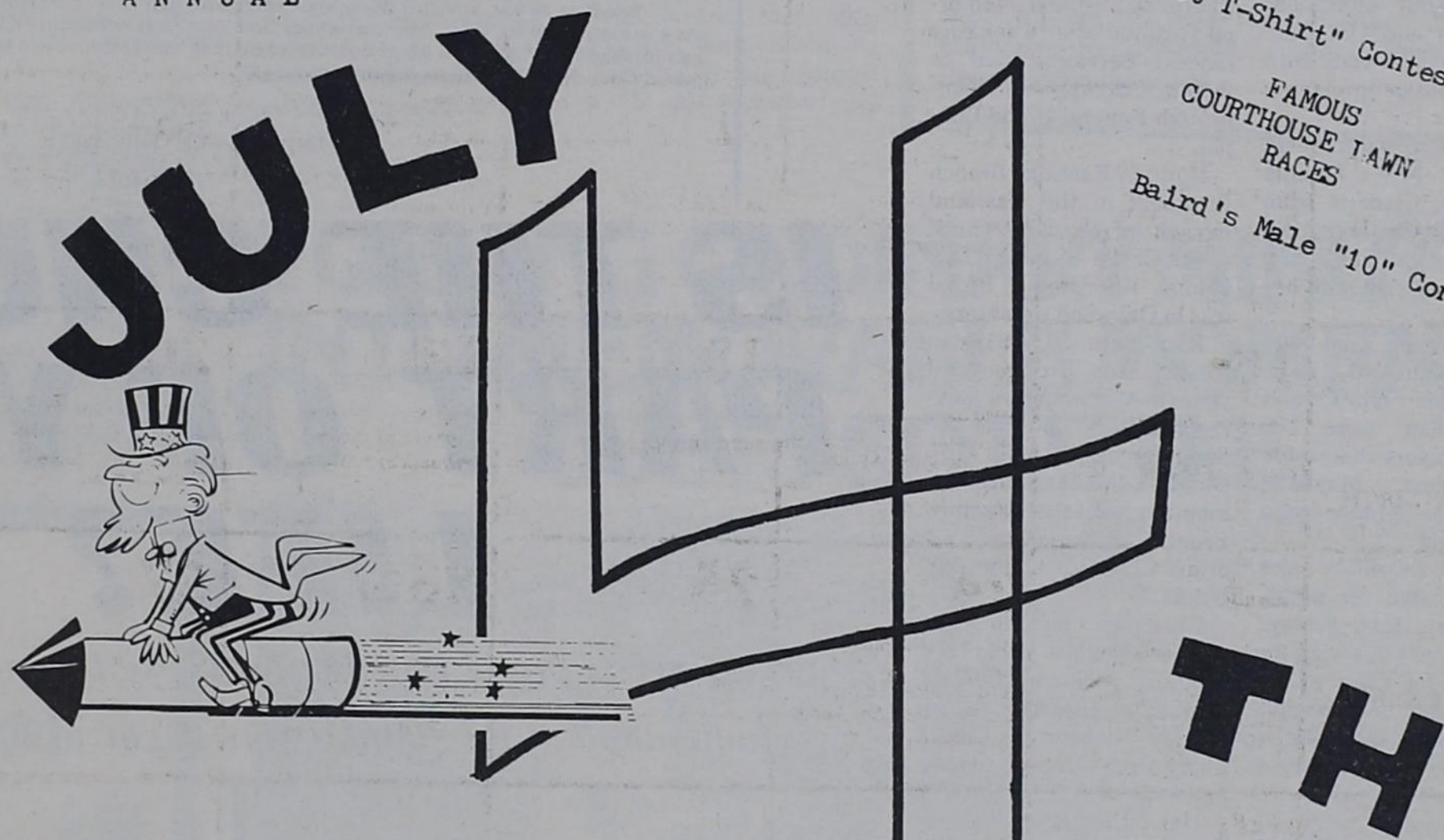

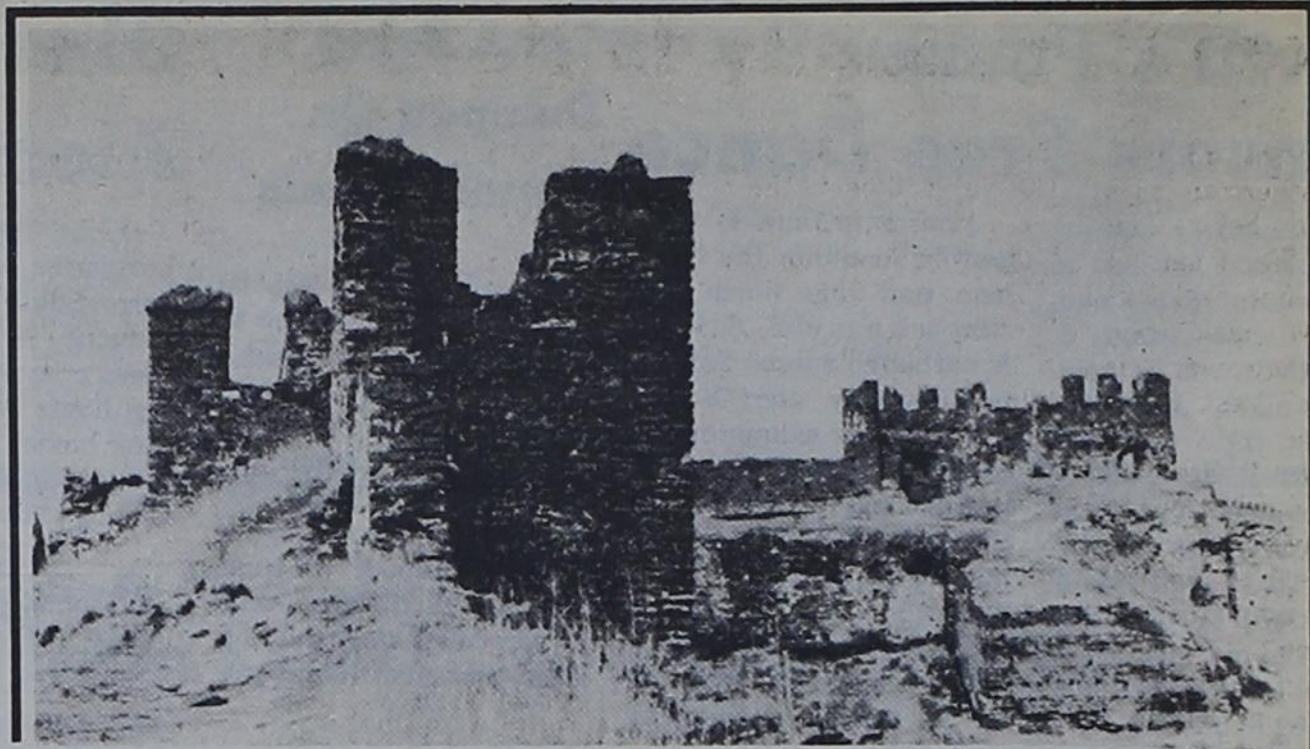

Body Found In Southeast Part of County Still Unidentified

Callahan County authorities say they are no closer to finding out the identity of a decomposed body found partially buried on a country road a month ago that when they began the investigation.

Reports that Clyde Justice of the Peace Lee Savell had a good idea about who the dead man might be proved unfounded.

The body was discovered May 13 on a dirt road about a mile off State Highway 36 by a road crew. Autopsy reports showed the victim was between 5 feet 7 and 5 feet 8 inches tall and weighed about 145 pounds.

Speculation that Army records about the victim were on the verge of being discovered was discounted by Callahan County Chief Deputy Ed Duncan.

Duncan said that these records would have been at least two years old and the reserve center has the option of either

shipping them to Kansas City or destroying them.

The reserve center says it sent them to Kansas City and Kansas City said it never got them.

Rumors that this death was linked to the still unsolved 1978 killing of 25 year old Leland Mattingly III, whose body was found in a grave near View, were also discounted by the deputy.

Asked if authorities were now going on the assumption that the two deaths were related, since both bodies were found with three pennies in their back pockets, Duncan said that there were a lot of cases that appear related, but doesn't necessarily mean they are.

Judge Savell said there is no truth to the rumor that the two cases are related. He said there may be a break in the case in two or three weeks, but that any report calling the case solved was untrue.

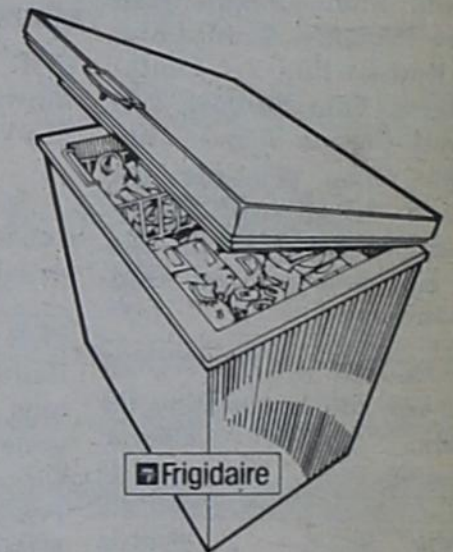

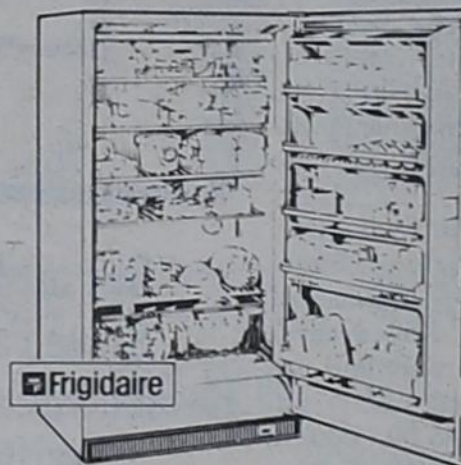

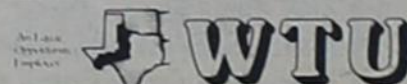
