



## ABLE TO FORETELL WEATHER

Nature Undoubtedly Has Endowed Many Birds and Beasts With Keenly Prophetic Instinct.

Do birds and animals sense weather changes in advance? P. Connor, who forecasts weather for Kansas City and vicinity, referred to a weather bureau bulletin on weather folklore. "Observations of naturalists and herdsmen," said the bulletin, "go far to prove that birds and animals are cognizant of approaching changes in the state of the air, before we know of their coming by other signs.

"To many kinds of animals and birds," it continued, "the weather is of so much more importance than to us, that it would seem strange if nature had not endowed them with a keenly prophetic instinct. It is not difficult to imagine that the physical organism of animals may be sensitive to weather changes, and that it has become an inherited insentative Judge Russell of Baird stinct to associate the sensations exdefeated both his opponents in their | perienced with the different kinds of weather."

As to signs in trees and flowers, Mr. Connor explained they simply expressed past and present conditions. "They are influenced mostly by the varying degrees of humidity, and are weather indicators only in so far as an increase of humidity might portend rain," he added.

## JAVA WOMEN SEEK 'EQUALITY'

Movement Toward Emancipation Said to Be Making Headway in the Dutch East Indies.

Women's suffrage movements have reached the Dutch East Indies, the colonies whose history and ancient savagery were chiefly known to credulous Americans through circus side-shows, wherein the "Wild Man of Borneo" and "The Terrible Dyaks, Ferocious Head-Hunting Cannibals," drew many dimes while the crowds waited for the "big tent" to open.

Head hunting and kindred savage pastimes still continue, to some extent, within the jungles of these Dutch islands, but, according to the Dutch press, most of the natives are rapidly adopting modern theories.

In Java, the upper class native women, under leadership of Raden Adjeng Kartini, a woman of high birth, are reported to be making rapid strides toward emancipation, although the Mohammedan custom of polygamy still prevails. In all the "Kartini schools," the girls of the upper classes are being taught occidental theories of equality with the men. 
