Washington - Facing a declaration by President Coolidge against any new tax invies, the Segate Finance Committee restored to the revenue bill the taxes on telegraph and telephone messages as a step toward menting an apparent deficit of \$75c-000,000 in revenue under the bill as passed by the House.

The committee action restoring these taxes was taken after President Coolidge had let it be known that he was opposed to any new levies unless they were designed to shift a tax borden from one class or interest now heavily taxed to another botter able to bear additional 17-18).

The message taxes, repeal of which was recommended specifically by Secretary Melion, would bring in about \$34,000,000 annually, it is est mated. They were repealed by the House, but Chairman Smoot has said the House bill would fail by \$75,000,000 of raising sufficient rovenue in the next fiscal year, including previous changes made by the Pinance Com-



The state insurance department up der John M. Scott, commissioner, colected \$1,138,000 in March on occupation taxes and fees, Mr. Scott anounced this week. This is much larger than for the same mouth last year and shows a large general increase in collections from this source.

A maximum credit of 15 per cout on the final rate of insurance was arant ed by the state fire insurance commission to the town of Miami, because of good fire record for the last tures years. This credit applies on all fire insurance policies written on or after March 21 and extends to February 28,

Nucces county is practically from from cattle ticks. This fact is shown in the monthly report of C. M. Cor. best, live stock annuary inspector, which shows that only two ticked cuttie were found among the 100 herds dipped during the month. The angregate of all herds amounted to 2072 Cattin.

Extensive regain work has been done upon the roads of DeWitt county with in the past few weeks, and they are in perhaps the best shape in the his fory of the county. The destinated highways have been put in repair with the money from the state highway department and roads not designated have been put in good shape out of the regular funds of the commissioners

Taxpaying voters of El Pano will be called upon to vote upon a proposal to Issue \$1,045,000 in honds for the school and municipal purposes. This decision was reached by the city council after the achool board had formally notified the council that it had agreed to hold its portion of the bond issue down to \$500,000. The board originally asked for \$1,300,000. This was later reduced to \$800,000, and fidate for the election has been set for

"There is more road construction activity in South Texas at the present time than in any other part of the state, and more money is being spent in that section of Texas than in any other on construction of durable types of roads," declared R. M. Hubbard, chairman of the state highway commission. When the work now under construction in South Texas is finished there will be more completed sections, more mileage of hard-surfaced rouds and more connecting highways than to any other part of the state.

The railroad commission has given the newly organized Waco, Beaumont. Trinity & Sabine railroad a valuation of \$2,304,904, which will abortly be increased by \$124,000, representing additions and betterments made to the line, which, with other items, will bring the grand total to \$450,000. Of the first figure, \$933,811 is represented in the value of the Beaumont & Great Northern and \$2,371,093 in the Trinity & Sahine, both merged under the new name. At this time the combined securities outstanding aggregate \$2,

Plans for the addition of additional room at the East Texas hospital for Insane at Rusk when completed will permit the entry of approximately 200 more patients. This will relieve the several county jails of the state of these patients who now have no place to go. Plans have already been submitted to the board of control for the remodeling and conversion of an old barn at the institution. This will serve as an annex to the present hospital, The last legislature appropriated \$85. 000 to defray the expense of these improvements.

Materials are being assembled at Sanatorium, sixteen miles north of San Angelo, for a dormitory for women and an addition to the library building at the state inberculosis sanita rium. 

Preparation for this war should be "Don't bother me; look at your gin before the crop is planted, experis declare, and efforts should not be lessened throughout the season and into the winter. It is a hard buttle, the experienced say, but the results in actual dollars and cents more than pay for the time and labor and a bonus Is collected after each year's battle.

Experts say that the battle with the boll weevil is nothing more or less than a race between the setting of holis on the cotton plants and multiplication of the weevils. Everything possible should be done to assist the plants in winning this race.

Like athletes who go in training before running a race, "training" must be administered to all the factors entering into the cotton field race. The first, and not the least important, step is preparation of the soil us early us possible in order to have a firm, smooth and well-settled seed bed at planting time. It is preferable that this he done in the full or winter us unfavorable weather conditions shortly before planting often prevent plowing at that time and early preparation does away with that risk

Planting should be delayed until all danger from fromts and cold is past and the soil is warm enough to insure quick spreading and vigorous growth. It is not resommended that planting be done at abnormally early dates as It is possible that when this is done the plants may become stanted during the early days of their growth, One bushel or more of seed should be planted to the acre. A perfect stand be most important. As nearly as practheable all cotton in the same community should be planted at the same time and in the same variety.

"One of the most important steps which have been taken to ceduce weevil damage." "yerument experts declare, "has been the development and introduction of arieties of corron which mature the crops earlier in the season than the starteties which were planted before the weevil invasion. The variety to be planted to obtain a profitable crop under weevil conditions depends in local conditions but by all means be seed should be selected and the va lety should have a staple of not less than seven-eighths inch. It is defin sly proved that incrossed yields worth from \$10 to \$40 an acre may be obtained by planting selected seed."

Information as to the variety best suited to a certain locality can be obtained from either the county agent or the state college of agriculture.

The width of cotten rows should be from three to four feet, depending on the fertility of the soil, and spacing in the rows should be from eight to twelve inches with one to three stalks to the hill. The clover specing and thicker stands are especially recommentied for the poorer soils and for sections which commonly suffer from beavy weevil infestation and frequent summer rains. Tests show that thick spacing hastens maturity and increases the yield and profit.

The Association of Southern Agricultural Workers, composed of scientiats and experts of the United States Department of Agriculture and the state agricultural colleges, recommends that the best soll on the farm be selected for cotton production and stresses the importance of using only the well-drained, fertile lands and the enrly solis.

"The intelligent use of commercial fertilizers is un important step in profitable production of cotron," government experts declare. "On most solls a fertilizer containing high percentuges of quickly available nitrogen and of acid phosphate seems to give the best results. On very sandy land, or sotis on which cotton is subject to rust or will, some form of potuah should also be included in the fertilizer used.

Further information on boll weevil control can be obtained from the county agent or by requesting it from the state college of agriculture.

Early Hatches Are Best

Late-batched chicks are rarely at profitable as early-batched ones. When hatched lare, they are not able to make as good growth during the hot summer months and do not mature in time to start laying in the early fall. There is little danger of farmers hatching chicks too early.

Economical Dairy Ration In general, the most economical

dairy ration is the one which can be made up largely of home-grown feeds. Corn, cane, or kafe, if put up properly, makes excellent allage or may be used as dry roughness. Although a ton of corn silage is somewhat more valuable for milk production than a ton of cane or katir slinge, the much greater tonnage obtained from the orghums, especially in a dry year, makes them favored over corn by many people.





However, if the facts show innocence, prejudice can do nothing because the public will make itself felt, and if there is guilt it will be brought out and exerybody will forget that the majority of the investigators possibly had prejudged the case.
