V A Expenditures In Callahan County

V A payments of \$ 3,161,375 in Callahan county for Fiscal Year 2004 (ending 9-30-04) increased by \$169,357 over Fiscal Year 2003. District payments to Veterans, their dependents and survivors, totalled \$2,996,883, an increase of \$151,212. Education and Rehab increased by \$17,951 to \$68,375 while Insurance and Indemnities only grew by \$195 to \$96,118.

Callahan County Veterans and their families now enjoy \$1,534,404 more income each year than they received twelve years ago. New claims are being filed weekly and \$2,128/ monthly new awards were approved just last week.







# Loans Available

Small Business owners urged to apply

Businesses in some Texas deadline for filing an applicounties can now apply for low interest Economic Injury Disaster Loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA). These loans are available to help businesses meet normal operating expenses that cannot be met due to the effects of a disaster. Excessive rain, flash flooding, flooding, hail, high winds, and lightning that occurred November 15, 2004 and continuing, caused many farmers and ranchers to experience reduced incomes which may have had an adverse economic effect on businesses depending upon these producers. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible for this loan program but may be eligible for disaster assistance through other Federal agencies. Businesses in the following counties are eligible to apply:

Brown, Callahan, Comanche, Coleman, Eastland, McCulloch, Mills, San Saba

To obtain an application or receive additional information, interested business wners may call the SBA toll-free at 1-800-366-6303 or TDD 817-267-4688 for the hearing impaired. The

cation is November 7, 2005. Due to the weather, many producers experienced crop losses and were not able to purchase goods and services at normal levels. Businesses that are dependent upon these producers may have experienced decreased sales, reduced gross profit margins, increased accounts receivable or difficulty in moving inventories at normal levels. The loan can help a business meet installments on longterm debt, accounts payable and overhead expenses that would have been met had the disaster not occurred. Refinancing of long-term debt, however, is not eligible under this program. The loan is designed for those businesses with substantial disaster-related needs and is intended to supplment monies the business owner can provide

from other sources. Loans may be approved for up to \$1,500,000 for actual disaster-related financial needs of the business. Interest rates are four percent (4%) and terms may extend to thirty (30) years, depending upon the repayment ability of the individual applicant. To quality, businesses must be small by SBA's size standard. Businesses which can meet their financial needs through other sources are not eligible.

Clyde Jennings, 84, of Clyde, died Wednesday at an Abilene Care center.




