Evergreens Have Wide Range of Usefulness

Every home grounds should contain some trees, either fruit or shade, un-

less the owner purposes a formal arrangement and will include evergreens as a part of the decorative scheme. In any case, trees have a valuable place both as moisture conservers and usefulness as fruit bearers or for land-

scape effect.

There need be no attempt at formal arrangement if the latticework of a front or side porch is to be hidden, and a specimen tree to break the monotony of front or back lawn needs no expert to place it properly.

Evergreens have such a wide range of usefulness, they are so seldom attacked by disease or pests and, if planted well and carefully, soon become established and live indefinitely. Some of the ornamental firs and spruces can be shaped, if necessary, to some extent, but an anturel their beauty is pronounced.

When evergreens are once established.

to some extent, but au naturel their beauty is pronounced.

When evergreens are once established, a little good, bone meal and a small quantity of nitrate of soda, worked into the surface of the ground around them, will increase speed of growth if growth its desired. Moderately rich soil at time of planting will not produce excessive growth. A good garden soil put into the hole dug for each evergreen should carry along growth at a fair rate for four or five years. If at the end of that time additional growth is wanted, food must be supplied. Cultivation need be slight; a gentle raking of the surface is about all that is required after the first year. After planting it is best to stir the ground only on the surface, but frequently, to prevent escape of professive continuity to develop the development. but frequently, to prevent escape of moisture, particularly in dry weather.

"Also it would be well for public-spirited, organizations to re-member its truth in their campaigns to boom their home city. All the floods of publicity and advertising will not wield so influential an appeal as the mute testimony that a city's streets and homes and buildings will present."

This fruit is so well liked that it is a favorite with most people. It is not a favorite only because of its delicate flavor, but excels many fruits in food value.

A simple little dessert which can be

20 A simple little dessert which can be quickly prepared is made from two or three bananas put through a ricer adding a dash of lemon juice and a little sugar, not too much, or the dessert will be cloying. Stir in whipped cream and have all well chilled. Serve with cookies

Mixed Fruit Salad,—Use one-half cupful each of shredded pineapple, chopped utts, orange pulp, grape fruit pulp, halved maraschino cherries, and one and one-half cupfuls of diced bananas. Serve with any desired dressing

Butterfly Salad .- Arrange slices of pineapple cut into halves on head let-tuce, the curved side toward the centhee, the curved side toward the center, leaving a space between in which to put the body of the butterfly—the pineapple slices are the wings, Make a head of a green grape peeled, the feelers of finely cut green pepper. Decorate the wings with slices of stuffed olives and pass the dressing when serving.

Marquise Cake.—Cream one-fourth
cupful of butter, add three-fourths of
a cupful of powdered sugar, two eggs,
two bunanas, one cupful of flour and
three teaspoonfuls of baking powder. Cream the butter with the sugar, add the beaten eggs, then the mashed pulp of the bananas and then the flour sifted with the baking powder. Mix well and spread in three layer tins, leaving the dough thinner in the

Mix well and spread in 'hree layer this, leaving the dough thinner in the center. Bake twenty minutes.

Banana Croustades.—Cut stale sponge cake into two-inch cubes, hollow out to form a box, butter and brown lightly in the oven. Fill with the following: Cook one-third cupful of seedless raisins in orange juice until tender. Other fruit juice may be used; cut four bananas into cubes and are to the cooked raisins with half a cupful of sugar. Cover and cook until thoroughly hot, shaking the dish to keep the contents from scorching. Fill the croustades with the fruit and pour the sirup over the whole. Serve hot, A Symphony of Soups.

On a chilly night in any senson of the year a dish of hot soup is much enjoyed if the meal to follow is a substantial one, the soup should be light and merely stimulating, with but little nourishment. If the ment is a dight one, the soup provided should be a cream soup, bisque or a chowder.

Simmer for several hours, strain and season to taste. Thicken with butter and flour cooked together and serve with a little cream added at the last or a well-beaten egg stirred in just before serving.

Soup a la Clermont.—Take the up-

Soup a la Ciermont,—Take the upper crust of a loaf of French bread, cut into small pleces, remove the crumbs and put into a bowl with two cupfuls of seasoned stock. Place in a moderate oven for half an hour. Silce four iarge onions, fry brown in two tablespoonfuls of butter, drain and boil for twenty minutes in beef stock to cover for twenty minutes. Add the onions and the bread to two quarts of hot beef stock. Pour into a tureen, and serve with grated cheese.

Liver Soup.—Take one-half pound of cold cooked liver; grind it. Fry one large onion in two tablespoonfuls of butter, then add the liver. Add a cupful of sifted bread crumbs, season well with salt and pepper and add six cup-

with salt and pepper and add six cup-fuls of soup stock. Boil fifteen min-utes, press through a colander and thicken with one egg, just before

Bean Soup.—Put into a soup kettle two cupfuls of baked beans, two cupfuls of canned tomatoes, an onion chopped fine and six cupfuls of cold water. Simmer until the beans are soft enough to rub through a sleve,

reheat, season and serve.

Combination Soup.—Put into a soup Combination Soup.—Put into a soup kettle a ham bone, a beef bone, and a pod of red pepper with two cupfuls of split peas. Cover with cold water and simmer until the peas are soft. Re-move the bones, season and serve.



This girl had the misfortune to encounter Appius Claudius one day on her way to school and the politician became inflamed with a desire to possess her.

When Virginia repelled his advances, Appius coached one of his clients to claim the girl as a slave. This client, Marcus Claudius, seized the girl and declared she was the daughter of a slave, owned by him and that she had been adopted in infancy by the wife of Virginius who wished to impose on her husband. The trial came up before Appius in accordance with his design and he decided in favor of his henchman's claim. The people of Rome were greatly excited by the horrid injustice. The judge was compelled to grant a delay. Messengers informed Virginius of his daughter's peril, and he left the army to hasten home. His plea to Applus, backed by the entreaties of the matrons of Rome, was denied.



PETER AND THE RISEN LORD

LESSON TEXT-John 20:1-10; 21:15-

17.

GOLDEN TEXT—Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ which according to His abundant mercy hath begotten us again unto a lively hope by the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead.

I. Peter and John at the Empty

Tomb (John 20:1-10).

John does not enter into a description of the resurrection of Christ or attempt a proof other than that the tomb was empty and that Jesus had repeatedly manifested Himself to the disciples after the tomb had been found empty.

1. How they came to know tvv.

1, 2).

The information was brought by Mary Magdalene out of whom Jesus had cast seven demons (Mark 16:9, Luke 8:2). Prompted by love for Himshe went early to the tomb, "while it was yet dark," "she was last at the cross and first at the grave, she stayed longest there and was soonest here." Her love for Jesus was genuine, though her knowledge of His resurrection was defective. She could not rest till she had done her utmost for Him because she realized that great good had come to her from His hands. The reason we work so little for the Lord is that we have such a dim sense of His saving grace.

2. Their investigation (vv. 3-10). The news of the empty tomb, which Mary brought with breathless haste, so moved John and Peter that they both ran to investigate. Upon arrival at the tomb John guzed upon it, but Peter entered it. John, with holy reverence, hesitates. Peter, with impulsiveness, enters the tomb at once. Their respective actions are not to be explained on the basis of degrees of love for the Lord, but to temperament. The investigation convinced them. The removal of the stone from the sepulcher, the arrangement of the grave-clothes all convinced them that it had not been done by an enemy.

II. The Charge of the Risen Lord to
Peter (John 21:15-17).

Jesus put to Peter the thrice repeated question, "Lovest thon me?" Then
He gave him a commission. This shows
that supreme love to Christ is the one
essential qualification for serving Him.
Love is the spring from which all
Christian activity flows. He asked,
also, to show that there are three
classes in the church which demand
care and attention. These three
classes need special care and food.

I. Feed my lambs. (v. 15.)

This first charge relates to those
who are beginning the Christian life
—the babes in Christ. The word
"feed" means more than instruction. It means in addition to instruction that proper surroundings,
influences and examples should be
provided. As a Christian minister,
Peter was to be an example, provide
the proper surroundings and do the
proper teaching for the young Christians, those just beginning the Christians, those just beginning the Christians, those just beginning the Christians these (v. 16).

2. Tend my sheep (v. 16).
This charge shows a different class. It means to shepherd the sheep. It has application to the mature class of Christians. The duty enjoined therefore is to care for those who have passed out of their childhood into maturity. He must feed the sheep, give them proper instruction, guide them, lead them and discipline them. For this ministry the essential qualification is love.

3. Feed my sheep (v. 17).
The implication here is that Peter was charged with the responsibility of caring for aged Christians. The word "feed" is much the same as in the first case. It means that for the aged Christians the instruction ought to be such as will be suited to their needs. This needs special emphasis today because much attention is given to the young people, but in many instances the old people are neglected.

III. Follow Me (vv. 18-23).
In verse 18 is given a clear prophecy concerning Peter's death. It was to be by crucifixion. Peter once shrank from the cross, but now the Lord's death on the cross, but Peter's own. He teaches here that the Christian's death is for the glory of God. Whatever may be before us, even the cruel cross, the Lord's command is to follow Him.


