





QUEER QUIRKS IN HUMAN DESTINY

How the West Touched Japan THE first contact between the peo-ple of Japan and modern Europe occurred in 1542 when a Portuguese

occurred in 1542 when a Portuguese ship was blown upon one of the smaller islands of the Japanese group. For many centuries the island empire had maintained complete isolation, evolving its own civilization. The Portuguese adventurers expected nothing less than instant death at the hands of these "dwarf Chinese." To their surprise they were welcomed, closely questioned about Europe by inquisitive hosts and royally entertained.

This adventure was followed by Catholic missionary expeditions. Thirty-two years later 150,000 Japs had become Christians. In 1687, however, the government decided that for all their marvelous firearms the people of

the government decided that for all their marvelous firearms the people of Europe had little of value for Japan. Missionaries were ordered away and 20,000 of their converts were killed in 1591. Contact with the western world was almost completely severed. It was left for an American, three centuries later, to resume the intercourse begun by the Portuguese. Commodore Perry with four warships sailed into Uraga bay in July, 1853, bringing sewing machines and frowning cannon. The Yankee's desirable merchandise enabled the signing of a commercial treaty, which was the forerunner of treaties with European powers. Popular feeling was stirred against this welcome of foreigners and the shogun was bitterly attacked by the daimios—feudal nobles. The mikado was now backed against the shogun—a sort of all-powerful prime minister—to expel foreigners. Ten years after Perry's visit, however, a squadron of British, French, Dutch and American ships bombarded Japports after the daimios had fired on foreign vessels. The efficacy of European gunnery caused a new change of heart in the mikado's party. European gunnery caused a new change of heart in the mikado's party

was established in Peking at the instance of Pope Innocent IV, but the
Chinese had stood steadfast in their
desire for continued isolation.

Great Britain, from her base in India, gained some trade through the port of Canton prize to 1840, the main community being oplum, which the Chinese government soon discovered was debauching its people. The quarrel resulted in a British fleet attacking the coast of China. The emperor was compelled to throw open the ports of Amoy, Ningpo, Foochow, Shanghal and Canton to foreign trade. The tea and silk exports of China soon grew to large proportions. Sixteen years later a French missionary was slain and about the same time the sailors of a British ship were seized as pirates. France and Britain sent fleets up the Pel-ho river towards Peking, the capital. The outcome of this war was the opening of additional ports to commerce and the granting of new rights to missionaries. The exploitation of the vast empire of China with its 360,000,000 people was now

"HOME TRAGEDIES"—SELECTED FROM NEAL'S SCRAPBOOK

A well meaning mother said to me the other day, "I don't know what to do with that boy; he wont mind a word I say". I said, "How old is he?" She said, "He is four, going on five". Then I said—and I didn't mean to be dis-courteous or cruel—"If you can get along with him three or four years longer the state will take him off your nands and the state can make him mind The state has detention homes, reform schools nd penitentiaries for that purpose and the state can always make a boy mind." This was not a pleasant thing to say for this selfish sentimen tal woman to hear. Then I continued, "A boy that is raised to disobey the authority of his mother will when he gets older disobey the authority of both God and the state. That is why we have juvenile courts, reform schools and penitentiaries, and if a boy gets with the state to where you say your four-year-old boy has got with you, the state will either shoot him down as bandit or hang him. I heard a judge say the other day that 98 per cent of the tens of thousands now in the boys that would not mind their mother in the home."

I asked her, "Do you punish him for disobedience? "Punish him! I don't believe in punishing children. Why it would nearly kill me to punish or whip him; I just couldn't do it". "Well", I said, "there is your trouble; you are not willing to hurt yourself for the good of your boy. You allow your own feelings to control you and in doing so you are making a criminal of your boy, who later will break your heart. The best and only genuine love is the love that regards and is willing to suffer for the welfare of the one loved, The diamond to be of value, must be cut and ground and polished. There are very many diamonds in the rough and jail and penitentiry today, just because they were not polished in the home lapidary. Some disobedient boys mother sits shamefaced and with bowed head and breaking heart in our courts every week and hears the sentence, maybe of life imprisonment or of death on the gallows, pronounced against her little boy who wouldn't mind a thing she said. The state can 'make them mind" and if you don't make your boy mind the state will. After all, the fault is not originally

with the boy who in the end will have suffer; no, he was innocent pure when like a pearl of great price he was dropped into the lap of life, now at the age of four, says the mother He wont mind a word I say".

There was a little boy in one of our middle states a few years ago just like this little four year-old boy; he would not mind and his selfish sentimental mother "couldn't make him mind", of ourse when he was a little older, 23, I think, his mother saw him ascend the caffold and as the black cap was being adjusted before springing the trap, she sobbing, broken hearted, got as a last word from her boy an oath with the additional words, "No use to soo now, old woman, you're to blame for this If you'd raised me right when I was little—" but the trap was sprung and the little boy who wouldn't mind planged to his reward and the mother swooned into unconsciousness. mighty unfair to the boy or girl. It is as true as Milto said "The child shows the man as the morning shows the day







To obey meant sacrifice, painful separation, the giving up of all business interests and leaving father behind.
Regardless of the cost, they yielded premut chedience.

Soon after the call of Peter and Andrew, Jesus called James and John, after which they entered the synagogue at Capernaum, where He cast eut an evil spirit. This miracle caused His fame to be spread abroad.


