


















## The Kitchen Cabinet

ECONOMICAL DISHES

Careful planning of meals, using leftovers in an attractive way, will make even the common dishes palatable.

Bits of fruit, either fresh or canned, may be put through a sieve and added to cream when partly frozen, making a great improvement on plain ice cream.

Lemons may be prepared into lemon sirup and kept in-

Lemons may be prepared into lemon sirup and kept indefinitely; they are always ready for a quick hot or cold drink. Take one cupful of water, one-third of a cupful of lemon juice, and one-half cupful of sugar; boil for ten minutes. Bottle and keep in the ice chest.

Apple Dessert.—Take one cupful of chopped apples, one-half cupful of raisius, place in center of a rolled-out pastry shell. Pinch up the edges and place in a deep baking dish, add one cupful each of boiling water and maple or brown sugar with two tablespoonfuls of butter and bake, basting often until the fruit is cooked and the crust. until the fruit is cooked and the crust

Another way of serving three or four kinds of leftover fruits is to add them to jello or gelatin; alternating the colors a very prett; dish will result. Still another method—put the fruits through a sieve and add to cornstarch pudding, serving with cream.

Chicken Custard—Reheat two curv-

Chicken Custard.-Reheat two cupfuls of chicken stock, add the beaten yolks of four eggs, mix with a little cold stock. Cook in a double boiler until the mixture becomes soft and creamy. Season to taste. This is an invaluable dish for an invalid.

Combination Vegetable Soup.—Cut two carrots into dice, shred one-fourth of a small cabbage, half a turnip, half

of a small cabbage, half a turnip, half an onlon, a potato, two stalks of celvery. Fry In a little hot fat, add six cupfuls of stock and salt and pepper to season. Simmer for half an hour and serve very hot with croutons.

Salad of Smoked Herring.—Skin and bone the herring and flake the fish. Use as much hard-cooked egg chopped as the herring and twice as much diced potato as herring. Season with grated onlon and mix with French dressing.—Rice Cream.—Blend one tablespoonful of rice flour with a little cold milk,

Cook until thick, then beat a few moments, fill a baked shell and cover with a meringue made of the egg whites with sufficient sugar to

Cream Prune Pic.—Put one cupful of stewed prunes through a sleve, add one cupful of milk, one tenspoonful of cornstarch, one-third of a cupful of sugar, the yolks of two eggs well beaten; mix all together and pour into a pastry-lined plate. Cover with the beaten whites and lightly stir in.

Sour Cream Pie.—Take one cupful of sugar, one cupful of chopped raisins, one-half cupful of sour cream, one-half cupful of sour cream, one-half cupful of sour milk, one egg well beaten, one-fourth teaspoonful of cinamon, the same of cloves, one table-spoonful of flour. Cook all together. Cool and bake in two crusts.

Pineapple Pie.—Take one can of pineapple (grated), one cupful of sugar, the yolks of two eggs well beaten, two tablespoonfuls of cornstarch mixed

tablespoonfuls of cornstarch mixed with the sugar. Mix all well and bake in a rich crust. Cover with a merngue and brown.

### QUEER QUIRKS IN HUMAN DESTINY

Andre's Fatal Error

THE confiscation of a Hessian uniform coat by a straggling follower of the American Revolutionary army saved Washington's struggling forces from the designs of the traitor, Benedict Arnold.

dict Arnold.

One dark night in September, 1780.

Arnold, who was then in command at West Point, met Major John Andre, adjutant general of the British army, on the banks of the Hudson river near Stony Point. There they discussed Arnold's treasonous plan to turn over Hudson valley to the British by surrendering West Point, which, with the successes just attained by the British in the south, they believed, would destroy American hopes. Next day Andre intended returning to the British sloop, Vulture, anchores in the river, but American batteries began firing on her and his boatman, Joshua Smith, refused to row him out.

gan firing on her and his boatman, Joshua Smith, refused to row him out.

To escape this dangerous predicament, Andre started on the Journey to British headquarters in New York overland. As he was nearing Tarrytown and safety, Andre was suddenly confronted by three armed men. One of them wore a Hessian uniform coat. That led Andre into his fatal error. He concluded these were British soldiers and cried out that he was a British officer. Then to his dismay he discovered they were Americans. Andre begged, threatened and offered a huge ransom but in vain. The men searched him and papers in Arnoid's handwriting were found in his stockings. The prisoner was turned over to an American officer, who sent a letter to Arnoid, telling of the capture, unaware as yet of Arnoid's implication. The papers were dispatched to General Washington. It so happened that General Washington had unexpectedly arrived on the Hudson. He had sent Alexander Hamilton and others of his staff ahead to breakfast with Arnoid. The message telling of Andre's arrest reached Arnoid and the table. He folded the paper, excused himself and hastened to his room. There he told his beautiful wife of his impending ruin and left her weeping with their child. He made good his escape. Andre was hanged.

John Paulding, David Williams and Iranc Van Wert were the Americans who captured Andre, Each received a medal and an annual pension of \$200 but their fame was dimmed somewhat when it developed that they were not soldiers but army stragglers, apparently devoid of patriotism. Andre testified that they were willing to be bribed but he could find no way to insure payment of the money he promised them.

he went up to London he was accompanied by a retinue of 600 men.
Six fat oxen were required for breakfast at his house in Warwick lane
and all persons who possessed acquaintances in his household enjoyed
the privilege of carrying away from
his kitchens all the meat they could
take on their daggers. Needless to
say he was a powerful and popular
noble.

Warwick espoused the cruse of the

In the famous War of the Roses, Warwick espoused the cause of the Yorkists and was the mainstay of this house in its struggles with the Lancastrians. The weakling, King-Henry VI, was Warwick's prisoner throughout much of that tempestuous period, while Henry's wife, Queen Margaret, made war ngainst the earl in the interest of their son.

Out of the fierce clashing of ambitions and welter of blood, Warwick emerged with his candidate, Edward, duke of York, placed upon the throne. It was his desire that King Edward IV abould marry a foreign princess of some powerful family and to this end, the famous earl, who never believed in entrusting to others what he could do himself, set out for France where he obtained consent for a match with Bonn, sister to the wife of King Louis XI of France.

In the earl's absence, however, the god of love had taken a hand in Eng.

god of love had taken a hand in England's badly disordered affairs. King Edward had met Lady Elizabeth Gray while on a hunting jaunt in Witchwood forest. The widow had sought the royal favor to regain some conscited lands and had won far more than she sought, towit, the royal affection. The king married her.

This wayward gesture of Edward, This wayward gesture of Edward, setting at naught the pains and labors he had borne for the family of York, estranged the earl of Warwick and he joined the king's enemies. In the battle of Barnet, April 13, 1471, Warwick was slain, fighting against the man he had made king.

The dispute over this point was complicated by the irregularities of the time of full moon in relation to the year. The Hebrew sacred year began at the Instant of the vernal equinox, but this time is subject to slight changes due to the astronomical fact of perturbations of the motion of all bodies in the solar system. The Hebrews based their years on lunar changes, whereas we now determine the exact length of a year by the sun and stars, which is more accurate. It is notable that the ancient Hebrews always had trouble with their chronology because they based the beginning of each month on the first slight of the new moon. of the new moon.

The trouble was principally due to the fact that the moon revolves around the earth in 27 days, 7 hours, 43 minutes and 11½ seconds, and the earth around the sun in 31,558,149 seconds. Theerfore the moon makes 13,9687 revolutions to the earth's one. Full-moon times are also out of harmony with the spring equinox, and

HIS year on April 17 the whole Christian world will be celebrating Easter Sunday as the Festival of the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. Because Easter means so many different things to many different things to many different things to many different things to take stock of our knowledge of the history of this annual festival, and after doing that we may, perhaps, have a clearer idea of what it should mean to us.

cearer idea of what it should mean to us.

Nearly everybody knows that the date of Easter varies from year to year, that unlike Christmas it does not come on one certain day of the month in one certain month, that unlike Thanksgiving day it does not come on a certain day of the week in a certain month and that it may come on a certain day—Sunday—In either of two months. That is to say, Easter Sunday may fall either in March or April. But they do not know, perlaps, that it cannot come earlier than March 22 nor later than April 25 nor the reasons therefor.

The festival now known as Easter was celebrated by ancient Israel as the Passover for many centuries before the birth of Jesus Christ. It was based upon the events which took place when the Hebrews were saved from the destruction which was visited upon the Egyptians, 9s given in Exodus 12:27. The first Christians, being in the main Jews, continued for a long time to observe the Passover as well as other ancient ceremoles. But gradually these early followers of the Cross began to substitute the Christ for the paschal lamb of Israel in the Passover ceremonies.

Eventually there arose a difference of opinion between the Christians of Hebrew descent and those of Gentile descent as to the time when these ceremonies should be celebrated. Those of Hebrew descent declared that the day of the death of Jesus should be the date of the ending of the paschal fast, which in Hebrew rites, always was on the fourteenth day of the moon in the evening. Therefore the Easter festival, which followed, might fall on any day of the week. Those of Gentile descent, however, wanted the first day of the week, Sunday, to be the first day of the resurrection, festival. Thus the Friday preceding would be observed as the date of the crucifixion without paying any attention to the day of the month, the fast continuing until midnight of Saturday.

Accordingly Easter is now observed by both the Roman Catholic and Protestant churches on the first Sunday after the full moon (or fourteenth day of the moon) on or next after March 21. So it cannot be earlier than March 22 nor later than April 25. Thus it is possible for the astronomers and mathematicians to tell in advance on what dates Easter will come each year, and they are now known for more than a century in advance. This, of course, may be changed, especially if the proposed new calendar which is to contain 13 months is put into effect universally. In that case Easter Sunday will be a fixed date. Just as Easter is a variable date, so it has a variable meaning to re-

this fact caused trouble in determining time in ancient times. The result of all these compileations was that by applying the Jewish rules to Easter, the dates of the crucifixion and the resurrection, two days which were supposed to be fixed for all time, varied constantly.

For 325 years the difficulty between the Christians of Jewish descent and those of Gentile descent continued. Not being able to decide the recurrence of Easter, the council of the early Christian church finally appealed to the astronomers in Alexandria, Egypt, for ald. However, these scientists were not of much assistance, for they had no lunar tables such as we now have, computed by master mathematicians. They attempted to make rules, but the variations of the full moon in reference to the year would not cause Easter to fall on Sunday any more than any other day. All wanted it to come on Sunday, so each nation celebrated to suit itself so that it would come on that day. Thus in A. D. 387 the Gauls celebrated Easter on March 21, in Italy it fell on April 18, and in Egypt on April 25.

Eventually the selection of a certain Sunday was definitely fixed during the Sixth century A. D. It was designated as the Sunday between the fifteenth and twenty-first days of the moon in the first month of the Jewish lunar years. It was directed that the computation should be made according to the fibiles of Victorious of Acquitaine, Introduced in 457 A. D. Because of the fact that Britain had ceased to be a part of the Roman empire, the Sixth century decree did not affect the British church at first, and it continued to calculate Easter on a basis previously approved at Rome. The egg is the simplest and most-easily-understood symbol of potential life. Within its shell is concealed the germ which can be warmed into life. So it becomes what can be regarded as the primary symbol of the Easter season. When that germ is warmed into life and develops to a certain point, the baby chick emerges, and life, real life, begins. So these fluffy little balls of down, beloved of all the children, are also symbols of Easter.

Doubtless His reason for this was to keep them from entanglement in the movement of the people to make Him King, for in John 6:14, 15, It is shown that the people were so excited by the feeding of the 5,000 that they were about to make Him King by force.

This may be taken as typical of His

rejection by the nation whose rulers had already rejected Him.

3. Christ praying alone in the mountain (v. 23).

Temptation to earthly honor and power had come to Him, therefore He went to the Father in prayer for relief and strength. The need of prayer is greatest at such times. According to Mark 6:48 He saw from the mountain the disciples tolling on the stormtossed sea.

II. Jesus Walking on the Sea (vv.

1. It was in the fourth watch of the

night (v. 25).

He did not come to them immediately, but waited till almost dawn. However, it was the darkest part of the night. Their physical danger was great, but no doubt their mental perplexity was greater. They knew that the Lord had sent them, but why should they be in such straits if He sent them? The stormy sea is no evidence that the disciple is not in the Lord's appointed way.

2. The disciples alarmed at His com-

2. The disciples alarmed at His coming (v. 26).

At the sight of Him they cried out for fear. They said: "It is a spirit." It was the coming of their best friend to deliver them from danger.
