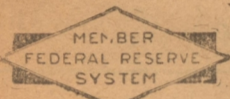

### STREET PAVING PROGRAM ON SCHEDULE

A petition was circulated here this week, requesting the city council to order and election to vote on the adoption of the state paving law. The required number of signatures were secured with some to spare. So as soon as the necessary legal papers can be prepared it is understood that said election will be ordered, and also an election for a bond issue for street paving. It is proposed to pave about eight blocks—4 on Main Street and two blocks on 8th and 9th. It will require a tax levy of about 23 cents it is stated, the property owners on said paved streets to pay for one third of the streets on each side. It is declared that a tax to provide these streets may be voted—and then the taxes be less than last year, as a 34 cent tax was levied last year to provide funds for the water bonds, but this year the water dept. will pay its own way and that tax will not be required. So the street paving tax may be ad-

ed and then the taxes be less than last year—approximately a one dollar rate while last year it was one dollar and ten cents. That is worth thinking about and an election will likely be ordered in the immediate future to provide for street paving.

### PEOPLE ANXIOUS FOR NEW HOTEL HERE

A move was recently launched by M. E. Wakefield to build a \$50,000 hotel building here, and it is understood that prospects are good for plans to materialize in a few days, and we hope to be able to make a definite announcement to that effect next week. The public is very anxious that the Hotel be erected, and be ready for operation in the near future, to meet the present demands.

Brown and Co. brought in their wildcat well on the Edwards lease 6 miles west of town, for a good producer estimated at 200 barrels, at 1642 feet, creating the greatest excitement recorded in this section since the townsite oil was discovered in 1925.

Leases and royalties in that section are selling at several hundred dollars per acre. Some is priced as high as \$1,000, it is stated. Oil scouts are busy in the interest of various companies large and small. Big development is expected to start in that section at an early date.

P. O. & G. completed their E. E. and E. Baum wells west of town for about ten barrels each. The Andy Gump Oil Company are shut down for repairs at 320 feet.

In the Cross Cut section the Roxana Petroleum Company completed their Newton Number 4 for 200 barrels. No report on other wells drilling.

J. W. Jones has moved back to Cross Plains from Breckenridge and has his old job again at the Neeb Produce Co. He will move his family back as soon as he can secure a house, he states. Mr. Whitely Smith who has been with the Neeb Produce Co. has accepted position with the Amerada Company out at the lease.

LAST STATEMENT OF BELOVED PIONEER ON THOUGHTS OF LOVE AND FIDELITY

### ADVICE TO YOUNG FOLKS

Lays out Simple Rules for Happy Journey Through Married Life and Urges Duty as Only Safe Guide. Beware of Inclination, Is Warning. Last Statement is Made Public.

"Uncle J. Q. Thompson, cheerful patriarch who died Saturday within a few days of his 96th birthday at his home near Troy, was a believer in Valentines and during his last few hours composed a comic yet philosophical valentine to be published in this morning's issue of the Telegram.

"Uncle J. Q." lived to be one of the oldest men in the state through right living and temperate habits, he said. He fought through the Civil War, taught school in three Central Texas Counties, endured the hardships of Pioneer days and by thrift and hard labor overcame many obstacles, raising a wealthy farmer and stock raiser. He knew life as a soldier, a teacher, as a man who often felt sorrow having lost his first wife and one son while he was away with the Confederate Army and having lost other children.

His last signature was placed to this Valentine he dictated to his granddaughter, Celeste Finnerf. It is a most interesting message, particularly in view of the fact that it was the last lengthy statement he ever made. His reference to a "guide book" in this cheery little Valentine greeting refers to the Bible. His Valentine to his friends follows, being written to a fictitious character, "Embolden":

"A novel Valentine. Perhaps some of my friends have failed thus far to receive a Valentine. For the benefit of such I submit the following which contains more good sense than any they might have received through the Post Office.

"My Dear Embolden: For license afforded I have ventured to beg you to be my companion in a journey I propose taking, but if you accept my invitation it may be an important event in life. It will be but justice to give you some information as to the character of our ride,

"The Vehicle in which I am going is called Matrimony. We will drive the road of life. My horse is an old gray steed named Time, he is a rapid courser We will ascend the vehicle by steps called love, fashioned by cunning Cupid. The door will be closed upon us by a Clergy and he will lock the door and throw the key away.

We shall find in the road certain rough places caused by the stones and roots of selfishness, pride, vanity, and temper which have never been entirely removed from the pathway of life. That we may get over these without injury the carriage is provided with springs of mutual affection, which assist us wonderfully in softening every jolt. And indeed if we would keep these springs oiled with sympathy of mind our whole journey will be as pleasant as we desire.

The Vehicle is furnished with glass, called cheerfulness of content, which we may draw up if assailed with storms of adversity. Moreover when the landscapes are pleasant through the medium of this glass, with their magical power we shall see. At some points along the way we shall be in doubt which path to take and we will be met by two individuals, duty and inclination who may direct us differently. 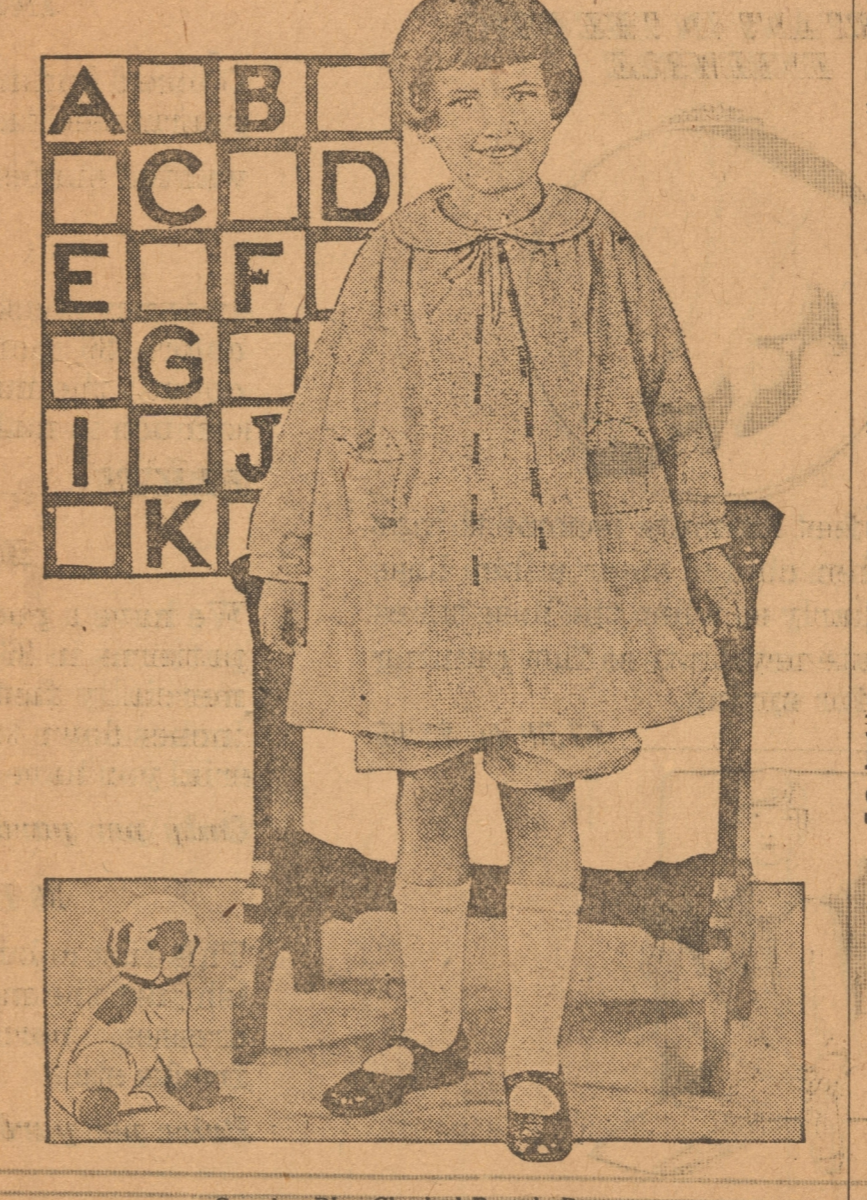

## Kenmore House to Be Preserved for the Nation

George Washington's Virginia kinswoman was present to bid visitors welcome to the one exhibit at the Sesquicentennial where floated the flag of the Old Dominion.

She was very much at home there, Miss Fannie Washington, for the exhibit of the Kenmore association in the Palace of Education was a reproduction of the back porch of the mansion at Fredericksburg, Va., where once dwelt her great-great-granddaughter, Betty Washington Lewis, George Washington's oldest sister.

Her great-great-granddaughter, George, sat on that pleasant porch through many a summer twilight in the days when as a young man he used to visit his sister at Fredericksburg or drop in from his mother's home, right next door.

Generals Met on Porch.  
And when he virtually had achieved the independence of his country George Washington invited all the generals who had helped him win the battle of Yorktown to visit Fredericksburg and to meet his mother and sister. There on that porch they talked over the great victory and the happy days that dawned ahead.

At the exposition, Miss Washington, who comes from Fauquier county, Virginia, sat on the steps of Great-Great-Granddaughter Betty's house, looking out into the bit of garden before the door, where ivy grew from four of Washington's Virginia homes, and strummed a banjo, and sang old songs that have been handed down in the family since the days of her great-great-grandfather, Samuel Washington, George Washington's brother.

She is a Carter as well as a Washington—her mother descended from "King" Carter, a baronial Virginian of early days, who earned his title by the way in which he ruled over the destinies of the colonists of the Northern Neck, a great domain ceded to him by his monarch and personal friend, King Charles II.

Many strange vicissitudes did the old mansion suffer before the Kenmore association was formed, four years ago, to rescue Kenmore and preserve it as a historic spot.

Site and Mansion Bought.  
The site and the mansion now have been bought, thanks to gifts of \$30,000, from a host of generous donors. But further funds still are needed to complete the work of restoring the mansion to its pristine state—that's the reason why the Kenmore association made this exhibit at the Sesquicentennial. Its officers have proud to say that not one dollar of

the funds given ever has been used for "overhead expenses." The service of the association's administrators is all volunteer service.

When George Washington's sister, Betty, married Fielding Lewis, the bridegroom was a man of wealth—quite the richest man in old Fredericksburg. He provided a fine home for his wife—a capacious mansion with brick walls two feet thick and with a slate roof, set in the midst of a plantation of 851 acres. Brother George surveyed the site and himself designed the beautiful plaster ornamentation, in elaborate Georgian modeling, which enriches the ceilings and panels about the fireplaces. He sent Hessian prisoners to execute this work—after the battle of Trenton.

At the outbreak of the Revolutionary war, Colonel Lewis made the first guns for the Colonial soldiers. To

ward the end of the Revolution, when funds were low, Colonel Lewis raised £40,000 to aid the cause of independence. He himself advanced £7,000 of his own funds for the guns that won the battle of Yorktown—and never was repaid! He died two weeks after the battle of Yorktown, and the old house was seized for debts.

George Preserves Mansion.  
But George Washington, the richest American of his day, came to the rescue of his sister and her seven children, and saw to it that the mansion remained their home till all the young folks were grown.

The mansion and the plantation eventually passed into other hands. At last only two acres of the original 851 remained attached to the house. Meanwhile Fredericksburg had grown—it now has some 7,000 inhabitants—and there was talk of tearing down the old mansion, or turning it into an apartment house.

Then patriotic Virginians came to the rescue. The Kenmore association was formed, to protect this home, as an important historic monument of the Fredericksburg Washington called "the place of my growing infancy," the Fredericksburg where Washington threw a Spanish dollar across the Rappahannock, the Fredericksburg opposite which was the Ferry farm, his boyhood home.

Mrs. Fleming Heads Society.  
The president of the Kenmore association is Mrs. V. M. Fleming of Fredericksburg. Its field secretary is Mrs. Fleming's daughter, Annie Fleming Smith—Mrs. H. H. Smith—herself great-great-granddaughter of Patrick Henry and Dolly Madison. Mrs. James Starr is chairman of the Pennsylvania branch of the Kenmore association, and there is a chairman in every state.

In the Kenmore association's exhibit at the Palace of Education photographs were shown of many details of the gracious and dignified interior and exterior of the old mansion, of its historic furnishings, many of them Washington family heirlooms, and of a horse-chestnut tree still flourishing next to the house—sole survivor of 13 planted there by Washington himself, to shade his mother when she walked over from her home next door.

There were historic pieces in the exhibit, too—such as the side-table once used by Mary Ball Washington, the mother of George Washington, when she dwelt next door to Kenmore.

"Having seen the porch of Kenmore, now don't fail to pay a visit to Kenmore itself!"—so Miss Washington and Mrs. Smith adjured a visitor to the Kenmore association exhibit at the Sesquicentennial.

### Historic Battle Scenes.

They promised much reward in such a visit, a sight of the Rappahannock valley, of the rare picturesqueness and natural beauty; a chance to visit the scenes of the battles such as Chancellorsville, the Wilderness, Spotsylvania and the two battles of Fredericksburg—all fought during the Civil war, within fifteen miles of Fredericksburg; and a chance to see the home town of the Washingtons and the Lees, of John Paul Jones, and the seven generals of the Revolutionary war—the town, too, where Madison and Monroe were educated.

Also the scene of the first American Declaration of Independence. The Declaration was adopted at a meeting in Fredericksburg of a committee of which Colonel Lewis was chairman, on April 23, 1775, fifteen months before a certain well-known Fourth of July, and twenty days before the Mecklenburg (N. C.) Declaration of Independence.

## Improved Uniform International Sunday School Lesson

(By REV. P. B. FITZWATER, D.D., Dean of the Evening School, Moody Bible Institute of Chicago.)

Lesson for February 20  
SERVING IN AND THROUGH THE CHURCH.

LESSON TEXT—Matt. 5:13-16; Acts 2:42-47.  
GOLDEN TEXT—We are laborers together with God.—1 Cor. 3:9.  
PRIMARY TOPIC—Praising God in Church.  
JUNIOR TOPIC—Serving in the Church.  
INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—The Meaning of Church Membership.  
YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—Living and Working Together in the Church.

There is an utter lack of connection between the subject chosen by the lesson committee and the passages of Scripture selected. The first exhibits the responsibilities of the subjects of the Messiah's kingdom, and the second pictures the graces which were upon the members of the primitive church. Definite recognition should be given this in our interpretation of the passages.

I. The Responsibilities of the Subjects of Messiah's Kingdom—(Matt. 5:13-16).

The whole mass of mankind is shown in the Scriptures to be corrupt—the whole world in moral and spiritual darkness. It is the high privilege and solemn responsibility of the subjects of the kingdom to exert a saving and uplifting influence on the world in which they live. They are to live such lives as to purify and enlighten. This can only be done in the measure that they personally know Jesus Christ, the King, and strive to make known His glory and power to others.

1. "Ye are the salt of the earth" (v. 13).

The properties of salt are:  
(1) Penetrating. This means that the disciples must not separate themselves from the world, but thrust themselves into its activities. Salt must be brought into contact with the substance to be affected by it.

(2) Purifying. The influence of the disciples of Christ is to uplift and purify.  
(3) Preserving. Salt has the tendency to arrest decay. The influence of believers tends to save the world from perishing in its own vices.

2. "Ye are the light of the world" (v. 14).

Light illuminates and warms. In order to perform its mission, light must not be hidden. The city built on a hill was not intended to be hid. This world is dark and cold. Many are the pitfalls and snares set by the devil. Believers in Christ should so live that the unwary ones be kept from falling into them.

II. Characteristics of the Primitive Church (Acts 2:42-47).

The behavior of the members of the early church was as marvelous as their gifts of speaking with tongues and performing mighty miracles. It was the result of the Holy Spirit in their hearts.

1. They sought instruction from those who knew the Lord (v. 42).  
This is always so. The unfeeling mark of the spirit-filled believer is eagerness to receive instruction from those who have been taught by the Lord.

2. They abode in fellowship with one another (v. 42).  
Spirit-filled believers have an affection for their kind.

3. They observed the memorial sacrament of Christ's death (v. 42).  
Those who have entered into fellowship with Christ will faithfully observe this memorial.

4. They continued in prayer (v. 42).  
A sure mark of the spirit-filled believer is a life of prayer.

5. They were together (v. 44).  
This unity was the result of their having been baptized into the one body of which Christ is head (1 Cor. 12:13).

6. They had a community of goods (vv. 44, 45).  
They sold their possessions and distributed them to all men as they had need. This proves that they were under the power of the supernatural. It is not a natural thing for one to abandon his title to earthly possessions.

7. They were filled with gladness and singleness of heart (v. 46).  
Those who are really born from above are filled with great joy and will devote themselves to the doing of good to others.

8. Praising God and having favor with all the people (v. 47).  
Such unselfishness gained the attention of the people and induced them to yield themselves to God and such as were being saved were added unto them.

Fullness of the Spirit  
God cannot give fullness of the Spirit to him who does not have such fullness of trust as to yield his life to Him.—Echoes.

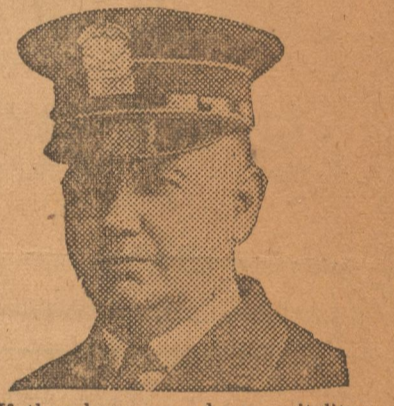

Just before press time he appeared on the street looking fresh and clean and we pleaded with him to go back home and go to bed until the paper was out and he brutally refused. That item just filled a hole in the paper so we went to press. This is only one of many things the people do to discredit the press".

The newspaper man's life is just like that—one thing after another. The people expect newspapers to report happenings just as they happen, but they never consider the newspapers side of it—how happenings change before the type can be set and the paper taken off the press. In the case above related, the East Texas paper gave the news concerning Charley Kennedy, but Charley as a news article changed without giving notice, leaving the paper in the lurch. The blame should not be on the editor's head but upon Charley Kennedy's. Very likely the latter was not really sick in the first place, and where the editor erred was in not waiting until he got well or died. If he had been sick and got well, the paper might have reported him up and about, if on the sorrowful other hand, he had got sick and died the paper could have reported him down and out. It all goes to prove that there are no fixed principles. A news item may be a vital thing at 10 o'clock, and a waste of space at 2 o'clock. Or vice versa. The thing about newspapering that comes nearest to being a fixed principle is that there will be things in the paper that some readers will think should have been left out, and some left out that other readers will think should have been put in.
