LOCAL TAXES TAKE THE DOLLARS

DOLLARS

One might almost say that when he writes the check for his property tax, the dollars go to local taxes and the cents take care of the others.

Local taxes raise the revenues for county, city, township and school, as well as most of the drainage, park, road and similar funds.

How these figures have grown since 1913 is indicated by figures compiled by the finance department of the United States Chamber of Commerce. The amount has increased until every day \$19,000,000 must be earned to pay expenditures by local units of government.

The increase in taxes, it is pointed out, grew faster than the population, so that the revenues thus obtained (in 1926) amounted to \$34.87 per capita, instead of the \$12.36 of 1913.

Local taxes are heavier largely because we have demanded local improvements. In the period of high prices improvements were made, at an excessive cost. Many a community built a \$100.000 high school plant, that a few years later would have been just as proug of one costing one-half that amount or less.


