This big bond issue has been agitated in Brown county for the past twenty years but had met defeat at each former election held for the purpose, the rural vote, as in this election, being largely against it. It was carried this time by the majority vote of 18 to 1 in the city of Brownwood. The road running from the McCulloch county line through Brownwood to the Comanche county line, which is a federal highway, will receive two to one aid, and the road from Brownwood to Rising Star will be built on a fiftyfifty basis. A concrete road from Rising Star to Brownwood is contemplated.
