

With favorable conditions the yield might total 5,000,000 bales the report said, but it is more than likely that the crop will fall below this figure. Acreage was increased 2 per cent over last year, but abandonwill offset the gain.

"Considerable damage is reported by boll weevil and the leaf worm is cleaning some of the fields in South Texas," the agricultural survey said. "Many of the growers are now poisoning cotton. This, however, should be done on the first appearance of the worm unless the cotton already is matured," Terrell advised.

The corn acreage is practically the same as last year, according to the report. Oll corn is in good condition, but the late crop is described as having been cut short in Central. East, North and South portions of the State.

The committee here is working in cooperation with a movement in Abilene and San Antonio to establish an air line from the border through San Antonio and north throu h Abilene. The possibilities of such a line are not yet definitely determined.


