ALTERNATIONS LONG FARMERS INCLUDED

Hightlights and changes of the 1936 A.A.A. cotton pro-gram were outlined this week by County Agent Ross B. Jenkins, who declared the plan contains many features which have been "long de-sired", by Callaban county which have been "long de-sired" by Callahan county farmers. 13 important ch-anges were cited by the counv agent. The principal changes are: the

new program covers a period of four years instead of only one.

The national base is reduced from 45,500,000 to 44,5000,000 acres. Reduction for 1936 not less than 36 percent, nor more than 45 percent.

Benefits of five cents per pound or \$8.60 average per acre will be paid in one check after compliance is made.

Share croppers will share 25 percent instead of 15 percent as now: managing share tenants will get 50 percent instead of 57 and one half; landlords are to receive 50 percent. Rented acres may be put to feed or food crops but must not be sold or exchanged off the farm. Landlords get no part of such production from tenants.

Same number of tenants remain on farms as from the last previous years.

Tenants will mark off rented ac res before planting so that there will be no misunderstanding after the crop is made.






