TO SPEND \$13,800 HOWEVER-ONLY \$7 00 IS COST TO SCHOOL

Work on a \$13,800 W.P.A roject at Cross Plains project at Cross Plains schools was launched Thursday morning, with laborers staking off ground prelimin-ary to beginning construction of a home economics building

on the campus. Although \$13,800 will be spent on the project and probably 50 men given employment for several monhs, the total cost to the school district will only be \$700. The re maining \$3,100 is an outright grant by the Works Progress Administ

Aside from the home building, which will be a four room thoroughly modern frame struct-ure, plans call for the moving of the football field field and sodding it with Bermuda grass together with the remainder of the entire cam-pus, the construction of concrete sidewalks at vantage points. gener-al beautification, drainage struct-
