Crude Activities Lively Throughout Area

CROSS CUT SAND IS GETTING PLAY SOUTHEAST HERE

Data on drilling wells throughout the Cross Plains trade territory was secured this week by the Review from Carmen Wright, gauger for the Sinclair-Prairie, who makes regular reports to his office headquarters. His check-up was made Tuesday. The following information is, therefore, as of Tuesday.

Gunn production Company (C. C. Neeb and Marion Harvey) were setting eight inch pipe at 1,015 on the J. C. Dickens lease, eight miles Southeast of here. They plan to drill to the Cross Cut sand. The test is an offset to a good producer. Cunningham and Shearer, only a few hundred feet from the Gunn Production Company's well, were mudding a string of five inch, preparatory to cleaning out and deepening.

Ehlinger and Gulley's number one on the Armstrong tract, which joins the Dickens lease, will also be deepened to the Cross Cut pay. Their number three was dry.

Root, Rhodes and the Phillips Petroleum Company on the Williams topped the Elemeberger at 3,000 feet. The hole now belongs to the Humble. They will drill 800 feet in the line.

The Bryant well on the Breeding farm is about 700 feet deep. The test was delayed early in the week as a result of mechanical difficulties.

E. N. Schaffner on the Vestal was straight reaming at 1,260. The grass-root test on the Gattin place was reported 600 feet deep.

The King test on the O'Neil farm, near Cottonwood was said to be drilling at a depth of 800 feet. Logs appear favorable, it was said.

McNeel brothers were about 300 feet, the Review learned, on their well on the John Carlson place.

QUOTA FOR EDISON DRIVE HERE IS \$40; HEMPHILL CHAIRMAN

A quota of \$40 has been assigned the city of Cross Plains in the Thomas Alva Edison Memorial campaign, being carried on in Texas under the direction of Col. W. B. Tuttle, of San Antonio. Chas. F. Hemphill was named chairman of the memorial drive here, and the work is scheduled to begin immediately.

In short, the purpose of the Edison Memorial program is to furnish opportunity to young men and women of ability, who are unable to attend schools of higher learning and otherwise develop their talents. The project is being planned on a nation-wide scale, in accordance with the original plan conceived by Edison just before his death, by which, in his own words, he hoped "to bring unusual youth and unusual opportunity together."

The following statement about the plan was issued from the offices of Col. Tuttle at the time the Cross Plains assignment was made:

Cooperating in what is perhaps the most unique and far-reaching educational effort ever undertaken in America are the nation's leading corporations. Many of them owe their origin to Edison's inventions. From the ranks of the Edison scholars not only will many future leaders of industry be recruited, but it is also hoped that there may be discovered one or more unusual geniuses qualified to follow in the pioneering paths of invention blazed by Mr. Edison himself.

Annual competition for Edison Scholar grants are to be drawn from three general classes of applicants. These include young men and women now employed in industry who, though lacking scholastic qualifications for matriculation in scientific schools, nevertheless possess special aptitude; graduates of colleges and universities who have shown brilliant scientific promise; and finally those outside industry or the universities chosen on the basis of personal achievement or of unusual ability. Details of the annual competitions to be supervised by regional councils set up in 12 geographical areas, with final selections passed upon by a national qualification board.

10,000 SEE SECOND ANNUAL REGATTA ON JUNE'S HOTTEST DAY

Speed boat racers from Tulsa captured first places in every event of the second annual Lake Brownwood regatta Sunday afternoon. Between 8,000 and 10,000 spectators lined the banks along the measured mile course as the speedy outboards zoomed over the choppy waters.

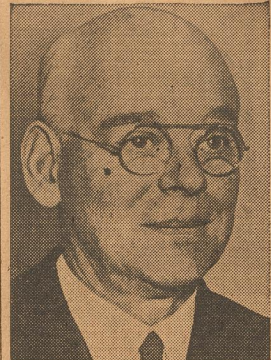
Games, outdoor contests and a picnic spread will be choice features of the occasion. "Remember the time and place come and bring a well filled basket," said a member of the lodge.

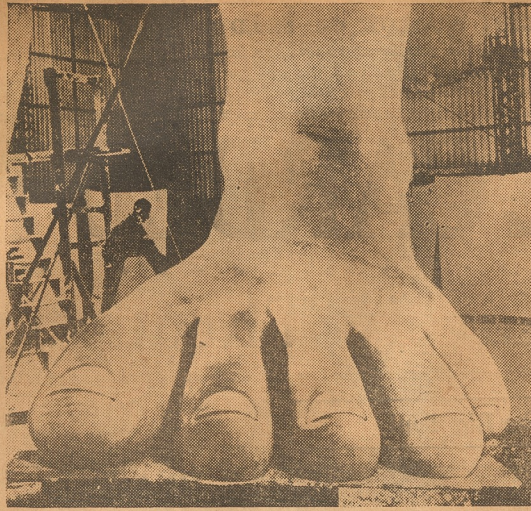

Friends and about 42 descendants of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Dill, parents of M. F. Dill of this place, gathered at the home of the pioneer couple in Cisco recently to honor and felicitate Mr. Dill on the occasion of his seventy seventh birthday.

And to fittingly celebrate the occasion the event was set apart for a general family reunion. The descendants of the couple, now living have reached the number of nearly 50, the house and grounds were pretty well occupied.

The honoree of this celebration, Frederick William (Bill) Dill, was born in Montecello, Drew county, Arkansas, May 29, 1859, (only Mr. Dill insists on pronouncing his native state "Arkansaw,") and came to Eastland county when a young man, locating near Rising Star, where he met and married Miss Clara Bell Rae, the daughter of an old and prominent family of that section. 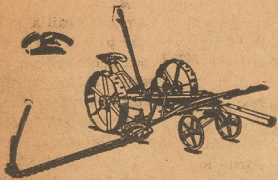

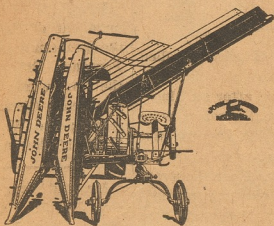

"THE DARK ANGEL" AT LIBERTY WEDNESDAY

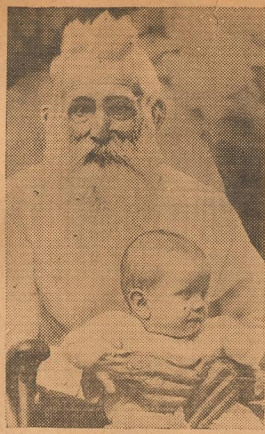

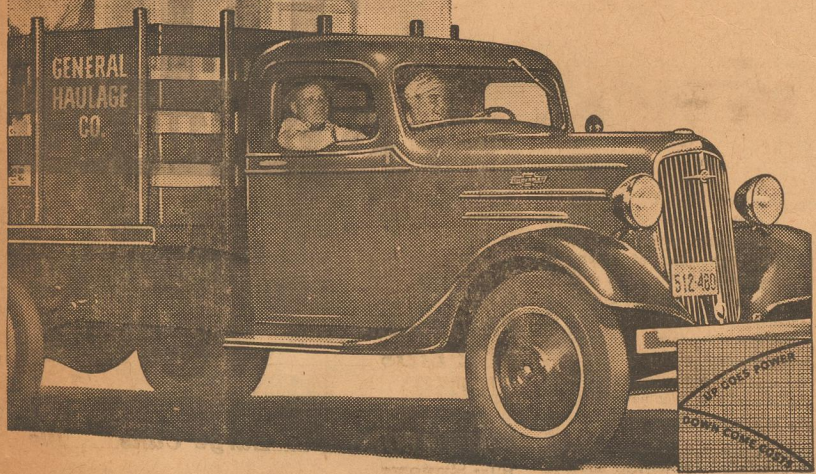

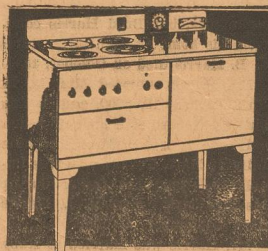

COUNTY AGENT'S COLUMN

County Agents Column Corn-Hog Acceptance Received Many inquires have been made recently relative to when the corn-hog payments would be received. This office is never in position to know exactly when any large shipment of checks will arrive but when acceptance on any group has been received the checks for that number usually follow within ten days to two weeks. We have received acceptance on 60 out of the possible 90 contracts that will be paid soon. As soon as these checks arrive they will either be distributed by the county agent from the main community centers near the producer or cards will notify the producers where they may receive the checks. If the county agent has sufficiently improved from the recent accident the checks will be brought to the main communities. The office would appreciate it if each man will wait until he is notified about asking for a check as all the time is needed in the office now to speed up the soil worksheets and every time that one of the hands is called off duty to look up this information it slows down the other program and could not possibly be of any benefit to the producers. In working out a few of the payments we found that the producers will receive about 77.7 per cent as much this time as the last payment. For instance, if he received \$52.50 the first payment he will receive about \$40.80 the second time. If he received \$7.50 the first payment he will receive about \$5.85 the second payment.
