E. T. Kilborne, Eastland county jailer, said Smith was in a cell Kilborne that Smith, who had been ill for several days, asked for a drink of water.

Ferguson said be turned away from his cellmate to obtain the water, and that when he turned around with a lighted match in his hand, he saw Smith was bleeding profusely from long, deep gashes in the throat, and that he gasped "I'm innocent of what they have me charged with. Don't let them blame this on anybody else."
