(Continued From Page 1) for Callahan County, was by Joe Nunn, who filed N U N on the left side, on Aug. 15, 1877. The second brand was recorded by W. H. Nunn, M B on the left_ hip,_ on August 15, 1877. Other brands recorded on August 15, 1877, were I. W. Ficlds, S E P on left side; Fields & Embry, A P E on left side; J. M. Embry, X O on both sides, and J Frent, J T on left side and hip.

The seventh brand to be recorded in Callahan County was filed on Aug. 18, 1877, by A. R. Strother & Co., and probably was called a run-ning M on left side and hip. On for ear marks but no brand was

Brand No. 9 was registered Aug. 22, 1877, by W. J. Maltby. It was ceccecerere ee cirUB k).t.F.b._SB1 a character instead of a letter or combination of letters. It was reg-istered for either side. It could istered for either side. It could have been called Heart-H-B. One tem of the H was used for the upper part of the heart which extended to the left, and the other stem of the H was the stem for the

letter B. This column is well aware that brands are read differently in various portions of the county. It is not at all certain this is the correct/reading of this Callahan Coun-ty brand and if this is incorrect it will be corrected gladly. T R is the tenth brand in the rec-

ord and was filed on Aug. 22, 1877, by Thomas Russell. It was applied on the left shoulder of horses and on the left side of cattle. On Aug-C. R. Westerman filed 777 on left side for cattle and had filed on 1 Monday. July 3, 1879, the same brand for horses on the left thigh.

horses on the left thigh. Three brands were filed on July 24, 1879. No. 12 went to S. R. Dunaban, who listed S. R. D; G. Waddell & Co., listed C 8 for brand 13. Rhoda Byer listed a heart with the figure 7 in it. Ella Byler listed brand that looked like CF con-

• Texas had a 101 brand in the early day. It was the twenty-eighth brand in Callahan County J. G. McDonald. Merchants McCoy listed 74 as No. 29 on Se

1877. Brand 30 was listed for D. Dodds on Sept 7, 1877 It was a combination of the figure 7 and the letters U and P and read

Smart listed brand 99 on Oct. 2, 1877, as Y Z. On Dec. 28, 1877 Marshall Cook registered his brand I C. 2 with a bar under it as brand 224. An unusually long brand was reg-

istered by A. W. Booth on Aug. 14, 1882, as No. 470 with the letters KKKU on the left side. Mrs. Lucinda Weaver registered

Mrs. Lucinda Weaver registered for brand 475 on Nov. 18, 1878. It was on the left side and was long as well as unique in a way. It was W E A E R R. The right slant of the letter W was used for the stem of the letter E. Then the let-ter A E was connected as the letters A E were connected at the bot-tom and this made an additional letter, V. This completed the spell-ing of the name, Weaver, Just why "he extra R was included is not

pparent. Hadley was registered as the brand of T. B. Hadley on Aug. 25. 1879. It was No. 650. His daugh-ter Mrs. Ada Carmichael, now lives on the old Hadley Ranch about five miles east of Baird, N.M. George whose wife was Mrs. Carmichael's daughter, lives on a ranch east of Baird and he attended the cattle-men's meeting in Baird last Saturday.

Brand 979 was registered on Feb-2J, 1881, to D. S. Babb and was made up of the letters in his name D S B A B B, placed on the right side and hip. Such brands were not very good for the hide when it was ready for tanning. The last brand in Volume 1 of

the brand records for Callahan County is No. 2337, registered by M A. Bush on Feb. 19, 1895. He list ed for his brand O Y E S on left side. Some of the recent brands in

clude: D on left side, registered by Loyd Deakins on Jan. 2, 1936; C. by J. D. Cauthen on Jan. 4. 1936, and L-Bar by J. A. Scroggins on Feb. 7, 1936.

Some of the most interesting brands were characters for which there is no suitable type in print-ing. The many include: Hat, Boot, Fish Hook, Buzzard on a Rail, Traveling Turtle, pig's eye and then a very great many which the conduc-tor of this column would not attempt to read. 
