Local prices on farm commodoties were reported considerably strengthened Thursday morning as middling cotton was quoted at six and three quarter cents and wheat about 52 cents per bushel.

"Indications of even better prices are already looming on the horizon", said a veteran cotton and grain buyers to the Review yesterday.
