## RAIN WEDNESDAY BENEFITS CROPS HERE

### COVERS MOST ALL OF CROSS PLAINS TRADE TERRITORY

Atmosphere Is Refreshed By First Noticeable Spring Precipitation

Blistered soil throughout the Cross Plains trade territory was given new life Wednesday night, when a Spring shower—about a fifth of an inch—blanketed this immediate locality.

Farmers and ranchmen said yesterday that the precipitation, although light, was invaluable to crops and pasture land through-out this section. Grain and row crops were beginning to suffer materially and Wednesday night's moisture completely revived them, giving a much brighter outlook to the local agricultural situation.

Temperature in Cross Plains dropped eight degrees from Tuesday afternoon until the same hour Thursday.

### ELECT 3 TEACHERS COMPLETING LOCAL SCHOOL'S FACULTY

Trustees of the Cross Plains independent school district in session Monday night elected three teachers to complete the faculty for next year. Mrs. Mack Underwood, of this place, was chosen to replace Vernon B. Bowers, teacher in grammar school, who has recently accepted a position as Superintendent of schools at Tye next year. Miss Louise Nelson, of Abilene, was named to fill the vacancy recently created when Miss Vivian Jennings recently announced that she would not teach next year and that she planned to attend Texas University to work on a higher degree.

V. A. Underwood, vocational agriculture instructor, was also re-elected to serve in the same capacity next year.

Cross Plains high school is the only one in this county and one of the few in this section to offer vocational agriculture training, a member of the board of trustees told the Review yesterday.

The faculty is now made complete for the school year of 1933 and 34 unless there are some resignations, or reason for increasing the teaching staff.

### COTTON, WHEAT AND OTHER COMMODITIES SHOOTING SKYWARD

#### \$1. Bushel And 10c Pound Is The Prediction Of Local Men For Wheat, Cotton

Local prices on farm commodities were reported considerably strengthened Thursday morning as middling cotton was quoted at six and three quarter cents and wheat about 52 cents per bushel.

"Indications of even better prices are already looming on the horizon", said a veteran cotton and grain buyers to the Review yesterday.

The six and three quarter cent price quoted for middling cotton is approximately 40 points above that offered seven days ago. Wheat prices are advanced proportionately.

"10 cents a pound for cotton by fall and a \$1.00 per bushel for wheat", were predictions made Thursday by a group of local buyers. Farmers and businessmen, when interviewed as to the outlook for agricultural markets within the near future, by the Review yesterday.

### TIRES STOLEN HERE FOUND AT ABILENE; NEW BOND IS MADE

Bond of \$750. was made at Abilene Thursday for C. A. Dickenson, Tuscola automobile dealer, who was indicted in the February term of district court at Baird, in a complaint charging him with accessory to burglary and receiving and concealing stolen property.

The indictment was the aftermath of the theft of 25 truck and automobile tires from the Sinclair Service Station, operated by Loran Barr, here on the night of January 20.

A bond arranged for Dickenson shortly after indictment was sent to Baird for examination by Sheriff Robert L. Edwards, who did not approve it. However he approved the new bond Thursday. Dickenson had been at liberty pending completion of the bond.

Cross Plains officers have announced that three truck and two passenger casings were recovered last week in Abilene, four blocks from where a part of the loot was located soon after the robbery here in January. Loran Barr and Deputy Sheriff W. A. Peterson, of Cross Plains, were in Abilene Thursday and Barr identified the tires as a part of the number stolen from his station here. 18 automobile casings and several tubes are still missing.

Three Abilene men, Roy Roberts, Dave Walden and 'Curley' Bowden, were indicted on burglary charges at Baird in February, in connection with the theft. The case was continued in the May term of the court. Dickson, who was indicted when the grand jury reconvened near the end of the term, was placed on the May docket, without having been set for the Winter term.

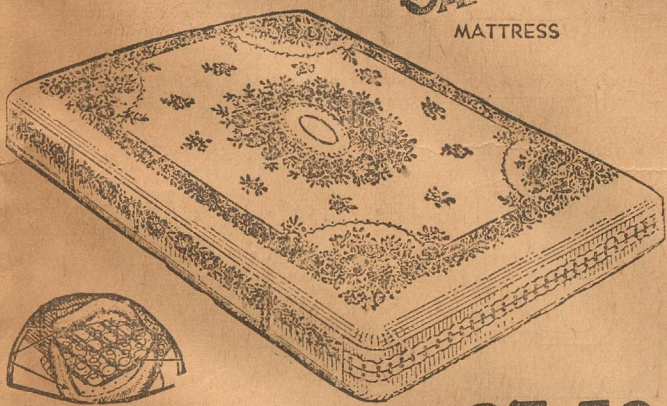

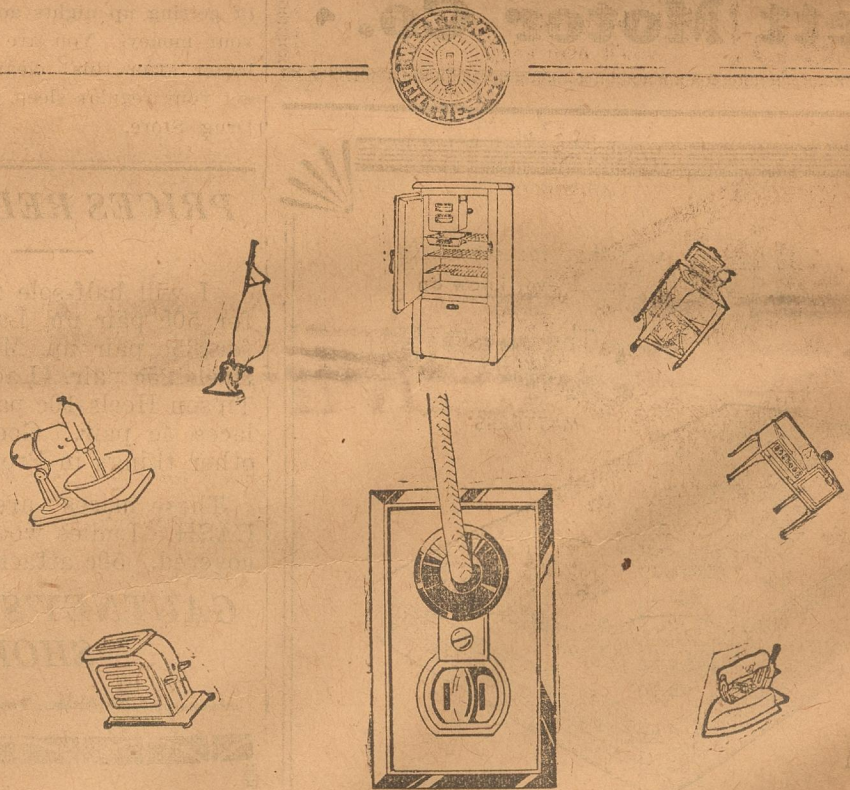
