Herd Due In Dublin Friday For Finale

Cross Plains Buffaloes will have just one more chance to get back into the winning column this football season. The opportunity will come Friday at Dublin.

Both teams are winless in District 10-A competition, and both have fallen to each other league foe by similar scores. Friday's hosts blasted the Herd 52-6 last year.

Pre-season polls indicated that the Lions would finish ahead of both Bisons and Early Longhorns, but Early rallied to whip Dublin by two touchdowns. Cross Plains bowed to the Horns by eight points. Loser of Friday's clash will dwell in the league cellar.

Dublin is not long on returning letterment, but at this late stage of the season, that is not a key factor. Most Lion strength appears to be in the line where size is a trump. The forward wall is headed by last year's second team all-district tackle Alan Traweck, a 195-pound senior. Guard Paul Warner, another senior weighing 795, and Terry Green, 212-pound senior end, add to problems Buffaloes will have Friday.

Mike Boucher, a senior 180-pounder, is the signal caller and the only back with more than one year's experience. He is helped by senior halfbacks Steve Hightower, 145, and Oran Christian, 150.

The Callahan County Farm Bureau is very proud that the queen of the local organization, Miss Terry Edgington of Cross Plains was also selected as queen of District 7 and will be representing this district at the state convention.

Postmaster Urges Early Yule Mailing

R. C. (Dick) Brown, Jr., Cross Plains postmaster, has urged local citizens to mail Christmas packages early this year to insure delivery by Dec. 25 date.

He listed the following dates for various means of mailing for members of the armed forces overseas, for delivery before Christmas. Surface mail Nov. 5 for parcels and Nov. 15 for cards. Parcels should be mailed not later than Nov. 19 in the post office department's SAM and Nov. 26 in PAL means of transportation. Parcels and cards mailed airmail should bear a post mark of not later than Dec. 10.

Mailing of parcels to distance states should be made by Dec. 1 and cards should be mailed by Dec. 10. Delivery in local or near areas should be made on parcels dated Dec. 10, and cards by Dec. 15.

Brown urged, however, that earlier dates of mailing would doubly insure parcels and cards reaching the desired destination by Dec. 25.

Open Horse Show Set Here Saturday

An open horse show will be held at the Callahan County Junior Livestock Show Barn, a mile north of Cross Plains, Saturday. The event is being sponsored by the Cross Plains Riding Club.

Judging will start at 10 a.m., and will include halter, performance and showmanship at halter classes.

Judge for the event will be Mrs. James Stimmel of Midland, a licensed horse show judge and internationally known horsewoman. She has judged shows throughout the United States and in Canada and Mexico. A spokesman for the local sponsoring club said, "We feel honored to have her judge this show".

Entries may be made by con-

tacting Doyle Burchfield in Cross Plains, or post entries will be accepted. Entry fees are \$2 for halter classes, \$3 for performance classes, and \$1 for showmanship at halter.

Trophy will be awarded for first place and ribbon rosettes through sixth place. Awards will be made through eight places in showmanship at halter classes.

Concession stand will be on the ground, managed by the riding club.

Halter classes follow: Class 1, fillies of 69, 70 and 71; Class 2, mares of 68 and older; champion mares; Class 3, geldings, all ages; champion gelding; Class 4, colts of 69, 70 and 71; Class 5, stallions of 68 and older; champion stallion; Class 6, open showmanship at halter.

Performance classes follow: Class 7, open western pleasure, 14 and under; Class 8, open western pleasure, 15 and over; Class 9, open reining; Class 10, open barrel racing, 14 and under; Class 11, open barrel racing, 15 and over; Class 12, pole bending, 14, open english pleasure; Class 15, open western equitation.

High point rosette will be presented to high point horse-rider combination. To be eligible the same horse and rider must be shown in both halter and performance.

Eula-Clyde Area Due New FM Road Project

The Texas Highway Commission has approved development of 3.8 miles of Farm to Market Road in Callahan County as part of the 1971 Texas Farm to Market Road Program.

District Highway Engineer J. C. Roberts of the Texas Highway Department said the estimated cost of the work is \$188,600.

The work authorized for this county is part of 304.3 miles of new construction and additional financing for 177.1 miles of F.M. and R.M. Roads previously designed and constructed in stages. Estimated cost of the program Statewide is \$20.9 million.

Texas has some 40 thousand miles of paved secondary roads under state-maintenance in the Farm to Market system.

Of the new construction in the program, 290.8 miles are new roads being added to the system. Of this total 192.8 miles or 66 per cent are school bus routes and 178.6 miles or 61 per cent are mail delivery routes.

Originally intended to get Texas farmers and ranchers out of the mud and to provide for movement of agricultural produce to markets, the F.M. system also now afford city dweller and rural residents alike access to hundreds of new lakes and other recreational areas in the state.

In addition, the F.M. system supports the movement of goods and workers to the many new industries now operating in smaller cities and towns in Texas.

The proposed project of the usual Farm to Market Road design will extend from FM 604

East of Eula, East and South of Clyde Lake for a distance of 3.8 miles. The project will provide for construction of grading, structures and surfacing.

The work will be under the supervision of Mr. C. W. Westbrook, Supervising Resident Engineer of Abilene.

Ranger Bulldogs Rumble Past Bisons 41-0 Friday

Ranger Bulldogs rolled to scores in every quarter in defeating homestanding Cross Plains Buffaloes 41-0 in a district 10-A gridiron contest last Friday. It was the home final for the Herd this season.

Neither team could muster much of a ground attack, but Ranger used the air lanes well. It was somewhat unusual with Cross Plains netting nine first downs to six for Ranger.

The Bulldogs wasted no time gaining the upperhand. Bulldogs sputtered to a touchdown on first possession. Seven plays after the kickoff quarterback Bill Fox passed to Back Mike Myers for 43 yards and the tally. An attempted two-point con-

version failed, but with 8:50 left in the first quarter Ranger led 6-0.

Ricky Kirkham brought Cross Plains fans to their feet as he returned the ensuing kick 80 yards for an apparent touchdown. It was all for naught, as a clipping infraction nullified the sparkling run, and brought the ball back to the 45.

Ranger held and in 11 plays later scored a safety as a Buff was tackled in the end zone after receiving the punt, favoring the margin to 8-0 in favor of Ranger.

The Bulldogs took the free kick and after a 30-yard return, marched the remaining 35 yards to paydirt in four plays. Halfback Jerry Williams circled right end from 21 yards out for the tally with 1:50 left in first canto.

Ranger's Ricki Hughes intercepted a Buffalo pass and returned it for the Bulldogs' third six-pointer. Benjie Jimenez kicked the point for a 21-0 bulge. With 20 seconds left in the first half Ranger scored again. Fullback Jerry Williamson rammed up the middle for the touchdown, and Jimenez's placement made the score 28-0.

Cross Plains made its best offensive showing in early part of the third period. Buffs picked up six first downs in three offensive thrusts with two fumble recoveries, by Tony Winfrey and Kirkham, and two pass interceptions by Bulldog Mike Lebrede sandwiched between possessions. Buffs' deepest penetration was to just outside the Bulldog 20.

After Lebrede's second pass theft, Ranger tallied in just two plays with 2:15 left in the third stanza. Score came in a long pass to Flanker Austin Chamness. Conversion failed leaving the score at 34-0.

In wanning minutes, Ranger's Fox hit Myers with a 25-yard pass with Myers covering the final similar yardage. Fox kicked point for the 41-0 tally.
