Store Bud Wood Now

To those persons who plan to do any budding this spring or who wish to graft upon the older stocks this spring should cut their bud wo'd now and store it. Of course bud wood is in cold storage but : cut the wood and bury it on the of wet sand. This will keep cold enough to retard growth until as late as about the 15th of May will give plenty of time to do all budding and grafting.

The wood so preserved for later use should be cut in lengths of about eight inches and have each end dipped in hot paraffin so as to prevent the ends from souring. Graft-ing may be done any time after sap begins to rise by using the dor-mant wood on growing stock, budding is done by taking the stored wood from the cold sand and keeping in warm room for three or more days until the dark slips then the buds are taken off and placed on the growing stock. If any further information is desired on this
