Texas has been assured by federal authorities that unless the state votes the bond issuc.
to assist in the relief work, thet no more federal monies will i forthcoming. Apparently Sam has adepted the policy of helping only those who help he has.

## PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION

 OF THE UNITED STATESThe Congress has proposed an amendment t othe Constitution of the United States which reads as follows:
: proposed an amendment t othe Constitution of the United States Section 1: The Eighteenth Article of A mendment to the Constitution of the United States is hereby repealed.
Section 2: The transportation or importation into any state, territory or possession of the United States for delivery or use therein of intoxicating liquors, in violation of the laws hereof, is hereby prohibited.

Section 3: This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by conventions in the several states, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress.

## SAMIPLE BALLOT

FOR the amendment to Article 9 of the Constitution of Texas, adding section providing authority for the adoption of a ies having a population of sixty-two thousand $(62,000)$ or more, 'to effect more efficient and economical government within such counties, an dto authorize mergers of separate governmental agencies within such counties as may from time to time be authorized by vote of the people therin.

FOR the Amedment to the Consti tution providing that the Legislature may authorize the issuance of bonds of the State of Texas, not to exceed Twenty Mil lion ( $\$ 20,000,000.00$ ) Dollars, for relieving the hardships of unemployment and for the necessary appropriations to pay said bonds.

FOR the amendment to the Constitution of Texas, authorizing the sale of vinous or malt liquors of not more than three and two-tenths per cent (3.2\%)
alcoholic content by weight.

FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas exempting Three Thousand Dollars $(\$ 3,000.00)$ of the homesteads from State taxes
