Warning of the government penalty for meddling with mail receptacles was called to public attention this week by Postmaster I. H. Kendrick.

"The U. S. postoffice department will pay not exceding \$200. for the arrest and conviction of any person on the charge of stealing mail or any valuable thing contained therein or money or other property of the United States, from or out of any mail, post office, or station thereof, or from any person pro-perly having custody of any mail, money or property as afor esaid, or of larceny from any let ter box, street letter box, or othsignated by the Postmaster General for the receipt of mail on any rural delivery route, star route, or other mail route, or from a box rented in a post office, or from any public recept-acle or other authorized depository for mail.

The mantle of the highest office in the gift of the peo-ple of Texas was hoisted Tu-esday upon the youthful sh-oulders of James V. Allred. While cannon boomed an official salute, the former Bow-ie newsboy was inaugurated Governor of the biggest state in the union, and Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson, Texas' first first and only woman Governor retired to private life.
