Area UF Will Seek \$4,000 In Canvass

Plans are being made this week for the upcoming annual Cross Plains Area United Fund drive which will be seeking \$4,000 in a door-to-door canvass of the sector Friday, Oct. 6.

The UF budget was increased

by \$700 by officers and directors in a meeting September 18. Mrs. Hadden (Gretna) Payne, secretary of the United Fund, furnished the following figures: on disbursements of the 1978-79 proposed budget: West Texas

Rehab Center \$1,300, M. D. Anderson Hospital Tumor Institute \$700, American Red Cross \$500. Another increase was deemed need in the local and \$100, Southwestern Diabetic Foundation \$200, Christmas cheer program \$300, local and transient relief \$600 and unallocated \$400.

Largest increase in the local budget was made to the West Texas Rehabilitation Center in Abilene which was raised from \$800 to \$1,300, in increase of \$500. Another increase was deemed need in the local and transient relief program. It was raised to \$600. The other \$100 was to be allocated, and will be used for special projects or as emergency funds as needs dictate, it was explained.

For the past several years the Area United Fund budget has been \$3,300.

Mrs. Raymond DeBusk and Mrs. Frank Ferrell, co-chairpersons of the community canvass, are working to obtain workers for the drive on October 6. Both that phase of the drive for past few years, stated that local persons have always been very cooperative in donating time and money for the charitable endeavor, and believe that will again be the case.

Dale Bishop, UF president, stated that details of the campaign for funds will be announced in next week's Review. He is urging cooperation in the undertaking, noting that it will take extra effort to reach the higher goal on part of the workers and extra generous gifts by the donors.

It is noted that the Cross Plains Area United Fund is the only sanctioned charitable drive conducted locally.

Mistakes Cost Game Herd 20-12 Defeat By Baird

Costly Cross Plains Buffalo mistakes led to the Baird Bears delighting a large homecoming crowd by beating the Herd 20-12 Saturday night in a non-conference football game.

Cross Plains Athletic Director Chuck Eoff stated that we simply made too many mistakes to win. "We did not tackle at all well on defense; missed execution on tackling," he added.

Buffaloes, who went into the game fresh from a 14-6 win over Jim Ned which broke a 12-game losing string, and Baird owned a flawless record in two outings.

Cross Plains got on the scoreboard first after gaining possession of a missed Baird pitch-out at mid-field, Buff Running Back Randy Dillard carried four times for 34 yards, one a 25-yard jaunt, before Fullback Glynn Nickerson rammed over from the one with 40 seconds left in the quarter. Conversion failed.

Baird quickly retaliated as Bear Danny Stovall rambled 69 yards on first play after the kickoff to score. Conversion failed for a 6-6 deadlock. Baird moved ahead with eight points on next possession. A 15-yard personal foul infraction was tacked on to a nice run by Stovall which put the Bears on the

Bison 10 yard line. Stovall scored two plays later, and Quarterback Chris Vestal passed to Jesse Aguirre for the two-point conversion and a 14-6 lead.

Again the Buffs countered, as Cross Plains scored with just 14 seconds left in the first half. Scoring play was a 50-yard pass from Quarterback Bud McCorkle to End Allen Phillips. It culminated an 83-yard drive. An aerial on the two-point conversion attempt failed, and the Herd trailed 14-12.

Buff Michael Clark rambled 90 yards for an apparent touchdown after taking a Bear punt, but a clipping penalty nullified the score.

Four plays later Baird held the Buffaloes on a fourth and two-foot situation at the Bison 23. Five plays later Vestal passed to Bear Allen Bohannon for 11 yards and the tally. Conversion failed.

An apparent Baird touchdown was also called back due to a penalty. Stovall intercepted a Buff pass and ran it back 59 yards.

A question call on a pass at the Baird 11, which was ruled a Baird interception, was possibly the turning point in the game.

Free Brucellosis Test Program Not Used

Most cattlemen and dairymen in Callahan County are not taking advantage of the free brucellosis vaccination program for their herds, says Greg Gerngross, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension service with office at Baird.

The program is designed to protect beef and dairy herds from brucellosis, a disease that often causes reproductive failure in cows.

All female beef and dairy calves should be vaccinated as soon as possible after they are two months old, explains Gerngross. After vaccination by a local veterinarian, the calves are tagged and tattooed and the owner is issued a certificate.

The Strain 19 vaccine used in the program provides complete protection against most levels of exposure to 65 to 75 per cent of the vaccinates, while the remainder receive various degrees of protection.

Vaccination should be a continuous thing since herd immunity increases along with the number of calf crops vaccinated.

The vaccination program can help beef and dairy heifers more

valuable since the demand is high for vaccinated animals. Several states require that all replacements brought across state lines be officially vaccinated.

In buying herd replacements, it's also wise to buy only vaccinated stock, adds Gerngross. All replacement stock should be tested for brucellosis, isolated for at least a month, and then retested.

Through active participation in the free brucellosis vaccination program, chances are good that this costly livestock disease can be eradicated, the agent stated.
