Sweet Potatoes For Better Health. If you would improve your health, eat more sweet potatoes.

Reports coming into the office are the greatest number of grasshoppers are now being found along the edges of the fields and even beginning to attack crops to have been found in the county in many years.

The latest information regarding poison is that oranges, lemons, or any acetate do not cause the grasshoppers to consume any more of the poison.

356 AGED PEOPLE ARE NOW GETTING AID IN CALLAHAN

There are in Callahan county 356 aged persons receiving old age pension checks monthly, according to H. Brelsford, Jr., supervisor for this district, who was in Cross Plains Thursday checking several applicants.

"The average check," Mr. Brelsford said, "is slightly under \$15.00 per month."

280 applicants in this county have been denied old age assistance because of their inability to qualify under the new law, the Review was told.

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to be known as Section 50d, which shall provide that no property of any kind shall be assessed under valorem taxes at a greater rate than its fair cash market value; and giving the Legislature power to provide that the State and governmental or political subdivisions or taxing districts may at a discount for payment of ad valorem taxes before the date when such taxes otherwise become due; and providing that this Amendment shall become effective January 1, 1939; providing for an election on the question of adoption or rejection of this Amendment; and making appropriation therefor; and prescribing the form of ballot.

RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section to Article VII to be known as Section 50d and shall read as follows:

The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial assistance to destitute children as that Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions herein above provided.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the 23rd day of August, 1937...

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election...

Section 4. The sum of Eight Thousand Dollars (\$8,000.) or so much thereof as may be necessary...

Section 5. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.) or so much thereof as may be necessary...

Section 6. The above is a true and correct copy.

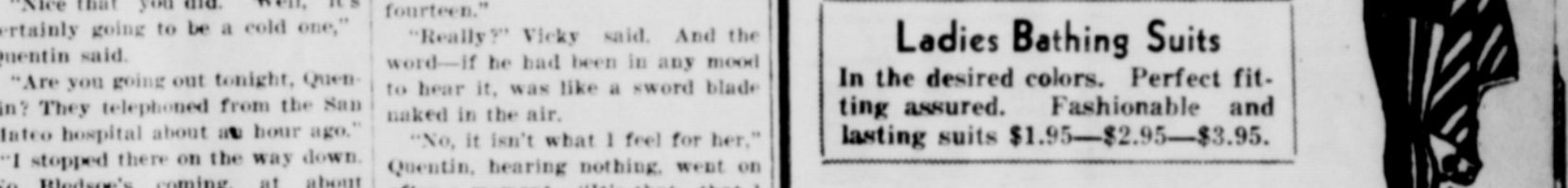

Local Home Economic Girls Continue Work Month After School Concluded

Texas has 106 Home-making Departments set up under a ten months contract with the teacher on the job ten calendar months. We are glad to recognize Cross Plains Homemaking Department one within that list.

The teacher will guide the students in the assumption of educational jobs which will give them needed experience, and in making plans which will carry through satisfactorily. The Homemaking district supervisor grants the extra one half credit or credit to the school carrying on a program of supervised summer achievement project for improving home and family life as follows:

First year program 1 1/2 credits, two year program 3 credits and three year program 4 credits.

It will be the Home-making teacher's, local superintendent's and principal's privilege and responsibility to see that only those students who merit the extra one half or credit will receive it.

While some of the students may plan and carry out projects worthy of the extra one half or one credit many of them will be merely practicing and acquiring skill in activities repeating class exercises. Some may idle the time away. If will therefore be left to the local authorities to grant the extra one half credit upon merit rather than a blanket reward to all students. The school receives the credit, individual students receive only that credit which they earn.
