COMMITTEEMEN ARE STILL SIGNING UP FARM WORK SHEETS

Farmers who have not filled out 1937 work sheets are being urged to contact local committeemen at the Citizens State Bank here Tuesday or at the Baird Branch school building Wednesday. County Agent Ross H. Brisson points out that work sheets must be secured on every farm, regardless of whether or not it was signed with the federal program last year.

Fred W. Stacy and Ed Henderson, local committeemen, who are compiling data for this locality report work sheet must be filled out on every farm and if the owner, or tenant, is unwilling to supply the information estimates will necessarily be made. "We want to handle this little detail in a business like manner and urgently solicit the cooperation of all concerned, for the good of every farmer in the county," said Fred Stacy to the Review yesterday.

Core Test Locates New Oil Pool For Cross Plains Area

A new oil producing area in the Cross Plains vicinity, one and one-half miles northeast of Burkett, on the A. E. Wright, tract, has been opened by the Priebe Exploration Company of Brownwood. Extent of the area, which is four miles southeast of the old Amerada field, has not been fully determined and exploration work is being continued.

Three exploration holes have been drilled by the company's core drilling machine, which is now drilling a well for production. A second well for production has been started with a spudder rig.

Pay is in the Amerada sand at 325 feet. Test of a core from one of the exploration holes showed 6,000 barrels of oil per acre, about 75 per cent of which is recoverable with present production methods.

Members of the company are M. L. Priebe, C. A. Rogers and M. E. Neiswander.

UNLESS J. V. HOWELL IS SUPERSTITIOUS; TRADES BEING MADE

Unless J. V. Howell is superstitious drilling will probably begin Friday on the E. I. Vestal number one 4,000 foot test, two miles Northeast of town. Rigging up had been completed yesterday at noon with the exception of filling pits and connecting pumps from the water well to the "mud-hogs."

Already 100 feet deep, after having used a spudder to drill that depth to permit the cementing of surface pipe, before assembling rotary equipment, first operation will be to drill through seven feet of concrete left in the hole to assure a perfect cementing job.

Perhaps no well drilled in the area in the past 10 years is causing more interest than is the test. Already several royalty sales have been made and others are said to be in the process of culmination, however, no authentic information in regard to proposed trades was available as the Review went to press Thursday afternoon.

Local operators will observe closely the progress of rotary equipment in the hard times expected to be encountered. With only one exception this will be the first hole ever drilled by rotary tools in this immediate vicinity. The other was to a comparatively shallow depth.

Location of the well is about 400 feet Southwest of the old Vestal well which came in a gusher in the early twenties and then quickly went to the pad after producing thousands of dollars worth of oil.

Rumor has it that another well will be drilling in the vicinity of the Vestal well before it reaches the Ellenberger of a depth of 4,000 feet.

Cross Plains Lady Has Copy Of Old Paper Telling Of Lincoln's Death

America will pause Saturday to honor the memory of one of the republic's most illustrious sons—"The Great Emancipator"—Abraham Lincoln, the Virginia farm boy who rose to the Presidency to guide the nation during one of its most perilous periods only to be assassinated upon the eve of tranquillity.

Like a page from the past is a 73 year old copy of the New York Herald, now in the possession of Mrs. M. E. Baldwin, of Cross Plains, which in blazing type tells the story of Lincoln's assassination. Though yellowed with age, the old edition has been carefully preserved, and is today easy to read.

Paragraphs from the historic news story, exactly as they appeared in journals throughout the world on the morning of April 15, 1865, appear hereunder:

"Washington was thrown into intense excitement a few minutes before 11 o'clock last evening, by the announcement that the President and Secretary Seward had been assassinated and were dead. The wildest excitement prevailed in all parts of the city. Men, women and children, old and young, rushed to and fro, and the rumors were magnified until we had nearly every member of the cabinet killed. Some time elapsed before authentic data could be ascertained in regard to the affair.

"The President and Mrs. Lincoln were at Ford's theatre, listening to the performance of the American Cousin, occupying a box in the second tier. At the close of the third act a person entered the box occupied by the President and shot Mr. Lincoln in the head. The shot entered the back of his head and came out above the temple.

"The assassin then jumped from the box upon the stage and ran across to the other side, exhibiting a dagger in his hand, flourishing it in a tragical manner, shouting the same words repeated by the desperado at Mr. Seward's house,

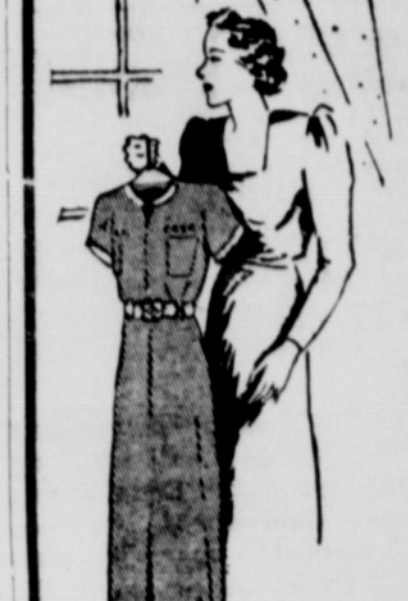

County Has Only 289 Idle Says Government Survey

Callahan County has 289 persons totally unemployed and who want to work, 178 employed in Federal emergency projects and 255 who are partly employed and desire more work, according to the census on total and partial unemployment recently made public in Washington. In the entire State there are 451,769 men and women who are entirely or partially unemployed or are working on WPA, NYA, CCC or other emergency work. Figures for the Nation show 5,821,055 totally unemployed and desiring work, 2,901,577 emergency workers and 3,209,211 part time workers who need additional employment, making a grand total of more than 11 million men and women in the army unemployed and partly employed.

Legislative proposals to control hours and wages by the Federal Government are now pending in Washington and are advocated by their sponsors as a remedy for unemployment. However, many labor leaders fear that the application of Federal administrative law to wage rates, hours of work and working conditions would have the opposite effect and prevent normal, peaceful negotiations between labor and employer. This threatened deprivation of freedom led the American Federation of Labor to oppose basic provisions in the proposed Fair Labor Standards Bill in the last session of Congress and brought forth the following declaration from a high Federation official in an address delivered in Philadelphia last December: "Labor in unalterably opposed to any Department of Government attempting to control or direct the relations of labor and industry from a Washington office." Such opposition is well founded for the power to fix a minimum wage either carries with it or will lead to the authority to fix maximum wages and the graduation of wages between the minimum and maximum.

Employers of labor in a recent meeting in New Orleans declared that the passage of any such legislation would result in serious economic disturbances, create more unemployment and would in effect place both labor and industry under bureaucratic control. This conference also pointed out that every similar effort to control wages and hours by law in foreign countries signally failed except under complete dictatorships and then with a total loss of freedom of action by

Poultry flocks over the state will be increased by some 40 million baby chicks during the next few months, according to Geo. P. McCarthy, poultryman of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service.

Purchasers of baby chicks can realize extra profits by buying early and by securing chicks from nearby hatcheries, McCarthy said.

Early hatched chicks are usually in a higher priced bracket than those hatched after March 15, he said, but the difference in price is more than made up by other benefits. Early chicks grow off faster and cockerels from this group find a better market as fryers. There

is also usually less loss from disease, especially in the case of coccidiosis.

Pullets from early hatched stock come into production earlier and lay more during the late summer, fall, and winter when eggs are relatively high, he pointed out.

Many Texans feel that they can purchase chicks of higher quality if they order from distant states. It is far better to buy chicks from hatcheries whose products are known than to depend on the reputation of out of state operators, according to McCarthy.

"It is perhaps an old thought that the farthest pastures are the greenest, but in reality we find these at our very door," McCarthy pointed out. "I say this because Texas breeders and hatchery men are producing and selling chicks that are of as high quality as can be found anywhere."

The importance of preparing for the chicks was stressed. The brooder house should be cleaned and disinfected and the brooder stove set up and adjusted before the chicks arrive, he warned.



If anyone in his community knows of a farm that has not been covered by the 1937 work sheet, he would be rendering the county a great service if he would see that this farm was covered by a 1937 work sheet. In explanation—suppose there are 100 or 200 farms in the county not covered by work sheets. The county goal would be short all the crops grown on these 100 or 200 farms. This would seriously handicap the county. Therefore, every farmer in the county is urged to do his bit in obtaining the best possible goal for Callahan county.


