Despite the 19-point pitching of Bobby Vaught, the Buffaloes were never able to seriously threaten the Bulldogs and lost by a score of 59-37 in the final game.

Trailing Vaught for individual scoring honors were Farmer, with 15 points, Pringle with 14, and Taylor with 12.

Clyde gained the final playoffs by beating three opponents - Rising Star 63-44; Bangs, 71-52; and Wylie 61-54. Public School Week To Be Observed In Texas, March 2-8

Fort Worth.—Thousands of Texas adults will go back to school during the week of March 2-8 in observance of the Second Annual

Supt. Newell H. Odell stated this week that local plans for the observance of Public School Week in Cross Plains calls for patrons of the school district to attend school (as students) one day, Thursday, March 6, and observe the teaching methods used at the present time. He stated that school officials were especially anxious to have at least one representative from each home in the district present that day.

Odell said that visiting patrons would be afforded an opportunity to really understand how the schools of today are operated, and visitors will be welcome to dine in the school lunch room at the regular price of 20c each and those living in the rural areas and needing transportation are invited to ride the school busses into school with the students.

He stated that there would be ample room for everyone and urges all who possibly can to attend classes on this date.

Public Schools Week, which has as its theme "Democracy in Action." Governor Allan Shivers has proclaimed March 2-8 as Public Schools Week in Texas. In his proclamation the Governor said:

Public schools by enabling every child to gain a liberal education regardless of station in life, -promote recognition of the responsibilities of citizenship and constitute a major bulwark against subversive doctrines.

Governor Shivers' proclamation follows a resolution adopted last summer by the Texas State Board of Education designating the week of March 2-8 as Public Schools Week. The resolution urged that every citizen visit a public school during the period to become personally acquainted with the programs and accomplishments of the

state's system of public schools. The Texas Education Agency has requested local public officials throughout the state to invite the citizens of their respective communities to visit classrooms, and to plan programs with the purpose of giving the pupils and the citizens a better understanding of the

Public Schools Week was observed officially for the first time in Texas last March. In hundreds of communities thousands of citizens visited their public schools in groups. Many visitors had not been inside schools in years.

Statistics compiled by the Texas Citizens' Committee on Public Schools Week following the first Public Schools Week program revealed a great awakening on the part of the public to the problems of their local public schools.

Girl's District Cage Tourney Starts Here Thursday Night

The old Planters Cotton Gin, owned by the Sweetwater Cotton Oil Co., and the last cotton gin in the county is being dismantled here this week.

Workmen started the dismantling job the latter part of last week and the work is virtually completed now.

The gin was built by the Farmers Union here in 1905, and was operated by that organization until 1919, after which a number of owners operated it for short terms until 1926, when it was sold to the Planters Gin Co. of Sweetwater and moved to the present location.

The gin was sold to S. F. Bond in 1929. Mr. Bond states that he operated the gin until 1931, when, he said, "the Democrats paid for plowing the cotton under" and he was unable to operate any longer. Bond said that the gin sold at a sheriff's sale on the courthouse steps at Baird in 1932. At that time it was appraised and declared to be worth a sound value of \$16,221.80, with a replacement value of \$19,-969.91. However, the Planters Gin Co. bought it at the sheriff sale for \$2,500.

With the dismantling of the gin here, the last evidence of old "King Cotton" as a big business in Callahan County passes into history.

Some of the more popular grasses in this area are Weeping and Sand Lovegrass, Buffelgrass and Bluestem Mixture.

There are some important things to keep in mind in seeding permaadapted and is a high producer of home in the next few days. good forage. For example, our lovegrasses and buffelgrass do better on sandy lands whereas, K. R. Bluestem and Side-oats grama do better on tight lands. Little Bluestem, Indian grass and Blue panicum seem to do equally well on either sandy or tight land.

On cultivated or "out-land" the preparation of a seedbed is important to the success of a grass seeding. On land that is subject to blowing we should seed in sudan or sorghum stubble on in heavy crop residue. On land not subject to blowing, we should seed in a clean, firm seedbed with or without dead stubble or cover.

Seedings on native pasture and rangeland should be limited to areas disturbed by burning, dozing, chaining or other mechanical brush treatment or where a seedbed is prepared by pitting, chiseling or similar tillage. Seeding should be done immediately after the disturbance or treatment or before rainfall crusts the surface

of the soil and starts weed growth. Seeding dates, rates and methods are also important to the success of a grass planting. The more successful grass seedings in the Rising Star area were obtained from spring plantings. Generally speaking, we can start seeding in this area after danger of frost is past, provided we have sufficient ground moisture.

Depth of seeding is important. In no case should the seed be covered more than one-half inch, as near one-fourth inch covering as possible should be ideal. The seeding should be done with a grass drill for uniform depth. The Upper Leon Soil Conservation District recently purchased a Hancock grass drill and a cultipacker for use in this area. This equipment should be available for this spring's seeding operations.
